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Morgan moved, seconded by Rohde to approve the minutes of January 13 as typed. Unanimous motion carried.

Mildred Jorgensen (County Welfare Director) appeared before the Board with the monthly report from her office.

Robert Giese (County Treasurer) appeared before the Board with the monthly report from his office. Mr. Giese reported the interest from C.D.'s in December being \$15,681.75. The interest collected for the first half of the fiscal year, July-December 1980 was \$79,171.97. Mr. Giese said the Federal Law regarding municipal bonds has changed. Banks can no longer use municipal bonds as pledge securities. Mr. Giese also said we were able to catch up on the payments of the high school tuition fund being December was such a good month.

Joy Nixon (County Assessor) appeared before the board regarding the contract to appraise commercial property. She presented copies of the two bids to the Board, those being Midwest Appraisal \$13,200.00 and Le Grand \$15,500.00. The bid submitted by LeGrand does not include Northern Natural.

Chairwoman Hirschbach said we will make a decision next week on this matter.

Morgan moved, seconded by Rohde to convene in executive session to discuss possible future litigation. Unanimous motion carried 9:34 a.m.

Rohde moved, seconded by Garvey to reconvene in regular session. Umanimous motion carried 9:40 a.m.

Joy Nixon read a letter from the Department of Revenue stating all improvements will have to be reappraised

according to the Marshall-Swift manual.

Mr. Morgan asked what the difference between the Nebraska manual and Marshall-Swift manual is.

Ms. Nixon said the Marshall-Swift Manual is more detailed and the improvements are up-to-date.

Mr. Culbertson asked how often revaluations are made.

Chairwoman Hirschbach said effective January 1, 1981, revaluations must be made every 2 years.

Chairwoman Hirschbach said we will make this an agenda item, so we can discuss it further.

Bruce Hovey (Highway Superintendent) appeared before the Board regarding items of discussion in the road department. He said he had informed each of the road dept. employees that they are not to buy fuel at the Crystal Oil Corp. in South Sioux City due to the fact the county is given Green Stamps instead of a discount on the fuel they purchase.

Chairwoman Hirschbach said we will let Mr. Hovey handle the problem in this manner unless he has additional problems.

Mr. Hovey said equipment is being moved into the new gravel pit site near Homer and everything should be ready to go by Spring.

Mr. Hovey told the Board repairs on the snow plow are almost finished. He said this is a good, heavy plow and would recommend the Board not purchase a new plow now, but to maybe include it in the budget in June.

Chairwoman Hirschbach appointed Daniel Rohde and Larry Morgan to work with Mr. Hovey on formulating policies for the road department, with a March 1, 1981 deadline.

Mr. Hovey said the road southwest of Hubbard is closed, but people are still using it.

Mr. Morgan said the road should be closed permanently.

Chairwoman Hirschbach said we will ask Maurice Redmond (County Attorney) if we can close the road and what the legal procedures are.

Mr. Hovey said we are having problems with right of way fences. The fences are right next to the road, making it difficult to clean out the ditches.

Mr. Morgan said we should send a notice to the land owners asking them to move their fences back.

Chairwoman Hirschbach said if further action is required, we will send letters to the landowners.

Mr. Hovey said the road department has begun a sign inventory.

Mr. Morgan said Northwestern Bell has suggested the county set up a road designation system making it easier to locate certain roads when necessary.

Mr. Culbertson said he would like to be involved in a road designation committee.

Morgan moved, seconded by Culbertson to rescind the acception of the original bid from Abbott Construction for the replacement of some windows in the court house.

Rohde moved, seconded by Garvey to accept the revised bid from Abbott Construction for \$10,385.00 with a spring installation date, as stated in Option #3 of Abbott's contract and the replacement of 14 windows.

Chairwoman Hirschbach appointed Ted Piepho (County Clerk) as chairman of the committee to discuss court bouse hours. She asked Mr. Piepho to work with the Board on a decision to be made by March 1.

Chairwoman Hirschbach read a letter from Goldenrod Hills Agency asking the Board to consider the appointment of George Shrader as an alternate delegate to their agency in Mr. Morgan's absence.

Mr. Morgan said he recommended that a member of the Board be an alternate.

Paul Culbertson was authorized as the Board's representative in Mr. Morgan's absence.

Chairwoman Hirschbach read a letter and an opinion from Maurice Redmond, County Attorney, regarding the ruling on tax exemption applications. The Board acted earlier this month on the applications. Mr. Redmond stated in his letter that the Boards decision is void because it has no authority to act as Board of Equalization except between February 1 and June 1 for the purpose of approving or disapproving applications for tax exemptions.

Mr. Morgan said we have made an error and it should be corrected.

Before approving or rejecting this bill, Rodney Smith suggested the Board procure a legal opinion from either the Attorney General's office or independent legal counsel.

Mr. Rohde said we should deny this claim because this is a 5 member board; we shouldn't have to pay 7 commissioners.

Mr. Morgan said we cannot resolve this matter ourselves; we need a legal opinion.

Morgan moved, seconded by Culbertson the request of the Attorney General's opinion be submitted through Maurice Redmond's (County Attorney) office and the voting responsibility of the two current Board members involved in the litigation be determined. Unanimous motion carried.

Beginning at the N.E. corner of the N.W.¼ of the N.W.¼ of said Section 28; thence south along the one-sixteenth section line for 252.81 feet; thence east for 258.58 feet; thence in a southwesterly direction on a bearing of S 01 degree 26'20"W for 836.20 feet; thence in a northwesterly direction on a bearing of N 78 degrees 29'50"W for 263.71 feet; thence south along the one-sixteenth section line 1250.00 feet; thence west for 625.00 feet; thence north for 1527.84 feet; thence in a northeasterly direction on a bearing of N18 degrees 51' E for 347.51 feet; thence in a northwesterly direction on a bearing of N18 degrees 51' E for 347.51 feet; thence in a northwesterly direction on a bearing of N 05 degrees 07' 20" W for 207.00 feet; thence in a northeasterly direction on a bearing of N 05 degrees 07' 20" E for 250.44 feet to a point on the north line of the NW¼ of the NW¼ of Section 28; thence easterly along the north line of said NW¼ of the NW¼ of Section 28 for 542.00 feet to the point of beginning, containing 38.22 acres more or less.

Chairwoman Hirschbach said the Board is in a unique position during this Landfill hearing because another site has already been approved by the Board. If this site is approved by the Board, it would be 1 of 2 sites to be considered by the Landfill Association which will make the ultimate decision on which site would actually be used. Ms. Hirschbach said the criteria for the Boards approval generally are the zoning regulations set up by the Dakota County Planning and Zoning Commission.

Gene Sturm (SIMPCO) explained the location of the site being 11 miles from South Sioux City, 2 miles northwest of Jackson, 3000 feet off Highway 20. The last 3000 feet will have to be constructed. Mr. Sturm said the major cost would be the construction of this last 3000 feet, approximately \$75,000.00 - \$80,000.00. The operation of the landfill would be by a private corporation and the cost will be negotiated between the Dakota County Solid Waste Agency and the private corporation. The cost, estimated between \$85,000.00 and \$90,000.00, would not be a part of Dakota County's ongoing budget. The operating cost will be finalized after the site is approved. Mr. Sturm said the site has a life expectancy of 20 years if fully utilized. Mr. Sturm said the site will be accesible to licensed haulers using covered trucks, but generally not to people in private cars carrying garbage. Mr. Sturm listed the following pros of the proposed site:

It is a remote site. After leaving Highway 20, the trucks will not pass in front of anyone's house.
 Access to the road is very good. With the exception of the last 3000 feet of road which has to be built, the route to the site is paved. Other sites have not had this advantage.

3. Based on cost, it is financially feasable for the 3 communities who currently compose the Dakota County Solid Waste Disposal Agency.

4. In regard to weather, there is only one small drainage to be controlled on the site.

Mr. Sturm listed the following as cons to the proposed site:

1. There will be additional road construction.

- 2. The distance from South Sioux is 11 miles.
- 3. There is always the possibility of litigation.

Mr. Sturm said because of a conflict in Lincoln today, a representative from the Department of Evironmental Control could not be here to make a presentation. Therefore, Mr. Sturm read the following letter from Fred Sebesta, P.E., Department of Environmental Control regarding the general stability of the proposed site.

Gene Sturm of the Siouxland Interstate Metropolitan Planning Council

requested by telephone that we send a statement to be entered into testimony at the public hearing on Monday, January 19, 1981 concerning the landfill site proposed by L.P. Gill, Inc.

On November 25, 1980, a representative of the Nebraska Department of Enviromental Control visually inspected the proposed disposal area. We have also reviewed the license application and partial operational plan and feel that the site can be developed and operated in an environmentally acceptable manner. Subsequently, in the letter to Dakota County requesting this hearing, the Department recommended that the Dakota County Commissioners approve this application, especially in light of the need for a facility of this type in the area.

This Department will not, however, issue a license to operate the disposal area until a completed operational plan and soil tests, indicating further that the site is environmentally acceptable, have been received and approved.

Dick Leitschuck from the ASCS office explained the soil type of the proposed site. Mr. Leitschuck said as indicated in prior hearings, the soil is an important criteria in the evaluation of the site for purposes of a landfill. Mr. Leitschuck said the basis of his information is from the soil survey of Dakota County published in January, 1976. The information is about soil to a depth of 5 feet, normally used for agricultural purposes. Mr. Leitschuck said the D.E.C. will require that soil tests be very similar to the soil in sites considered before. He said landfill soil should be deep soil, easy to excavate, able to stand traffic, have moderately slow permeability and considerable depth to ground water. As far as conservation aspects, Mr. Leitschuck said the problems were very similar to the other sites.

Mr. Sturm made the following statement to the Board.

Statement presented to the Dakota County Board of Commissioners regarding the landfill site proposed by L.P. Gill, Inc., located 2 miles northwest of Jackson, Ne.

To supplement my oral presentation and to insure that items identified in Section 505.5 of the Dakota County Zoning Regulation are addressed, I am submitting this statement and request it be included in the record and considered by the County Board in making their determination.

I am specifically addressing items listed as minimum consideration to be made by the County Board and minimum distance requirement identified in the County Zoning regulation. As a professional Land Use Planner, I feel qualified to comment on these items. My comments are as follows:

Section 505.5 Dakota County Zoning Regulation minimum items to be considered by the County Board prior to approving or denying a sanitary landfill under this section.

### Item 1. Need for a Sanitary Landfill.

The need for a sanitary Landfill in Dakota County is well documented. Currently none of the three units of governments composing the Dakota County Solid Waste Disposal Agency have adequate landfill facilities. Dakota County does not have a landfill, South Sioux City has only a temporary landfill, and Dakota City has a questionable site which is only allowed to operate because of the small size of the city. Additionally, other small communities in the county will be required to close their landfills in the event more stringent state regulations are adopted.

Item 2. Use of Surrounding Property.

The land use around the proposed site is agricultural. This use is compatible with the operation of a sanitary landfill.

Item 3. Cost of Public Improvements.

The cost of public improvements appears to be comparable to other sites considered in the past. These costs are lower than those for other sites which were located in remote areas.

#### Item 4. Long Term Effects on County Development.

Land use in this area is expected to remain agricultural in nature. The operation of a properly run sanitary landfill at this site should not detract from future development in the county.

#### Item 5. Adverse Effect on Groundwater.

Department of Environmental Control guidelines require that ground water not be contaminated. That agency has submitted a written statement indicating that this site will probably pass their strict soil percolation rate criteria. Final analysis will be made after soil tests are evaluated. No ground water contamination should occur since the Department of Environmental Control will not license the site if that were the case.

Item 6. Drainage Problem.

No comment. (I have requested that a representative of the U.S. Soil Conservation address this).

Item 7. Specific Conditions Deemed Necessary for Approval.

I did not identify any additional considerations necessary for approving this site.

Section 5. Dakota County Zoning Regulation Minimum Distance Requirements.

Item 1. Distance from Residential Structure.

There are no residential structures within 1000 feet of this site.

Item 2. Distance from Primary or Secondary Highway.

There are no highways classified in this manner within 1000 feet of the site.

Item 3. Distance from Residential Area.

The site is located in the Agricultural zone and is not within 1000 feet of a residential or recreational zone as identified in the County Zoning Regulation.

Item 4. Distance from Runway Used by Piston Type Aircraft.

The site is over 5000 feet from any runway used by piston-type aircraft.

Item 5. <u>Distance from Runway Used by Turbo-Jet Aircraft</u>.

The site is over 10,000 feet from any runway used by turbo-jet aircraft.

Item 6. Location Within the Conical Surface of an Existing Airport.

The site is not located within the conical surface of an existing airport.

Item 7.. Area not Approved by the Department of Environmental Control.

This must be determined by that agency.

The Dakota County Zoning Resolution allows sanitary landfills only in the Agricultural Zone (AG). The official Dakota County Zoning Map, adopted March 13, 1978 by the County Board of Commissioners, clearly shows this site to be in the AG zone.

Chairwoman Hirschbach asked if there were any testimonies.

Harvey Wenther appeared before the board. Mr. Wenther said, "I do not have much to testify. I think most of the people here are not against it; they're in favor of it (landfill site).

Being there were no further testimony, Chairwoman Hirschbach asked the Board members if they had any questions.

Mr. Culbertson asked why the landfill is limited to private contractors if it is a county project?

Mr. Morgan said it hasn't been limited to private contractors at all. He said we do have a private contractor who has made application for a license to operate the landfill. At this time, Mr. Morgan said, we are considering whether to approve this site as a site to be operated.

Mr. Culbertson asked if this private operator has a perogative to determine who goes in and out of the site.

Mr. Morgan said the rules of operation will be set by the Dakota County Landfill Commission.

Mr. Culbertson asked if the fact that only licensed operators with covered vehicles use the site, could be changed?

Mr. Morgan said those are the basic principles on which the Landfill Commission will draw up the rules and regulations.

However, Mr. Morgan said he did not see any reason why the Landfill Agency could not revise the fules from time to time.

Chairwoman Hirschbach asked Mr. Morgan for a brief background on the agency which will be running the landfill and setting up the rules.

Mr. Morgan said the agency is responsible for supervision of this project. The agency is comprised of two members of the Board of Commissioners, 2 representatives from South Sioux City, and 1 representative from Dakota City.

Mr. Culbertson asked if individuals could appeal to the agency if they felt they were entitled to use the site.

Mr. Morgan said, "Definitely".

Chairwoman Hirschbach said the Landfill Agency will be holding regular scheduled hearings which will be open to the public,

Mr. Morgan added the Landfill Agency holds monthly meetings which are open to the public.

Chairwoman Hirschbach asked Mr. Gill if oral agreements on the easements required for access to the site

and agreement on the contract with the other land owner had been reached.

Mr. Gill said "yes".

Chairwoman Hirschbach pointed out that even if the Board does approve this site, it does not automatically mean this is the site which will be used. She said it is up to the Dakota County Landfill Agency to select a suitable site and to prepare the operational plans for submittal to the State. She said there are several other steps which any prospective Landfill must go through before it will be approved. Ms. Hirschbach asked the Board if they wish to take any action at this time.

Morgan moved, seconded by Rohde to approve the Landfill application of L.P. Gill, Inc.

Mr. Shrader said the center is open at least 4 days a week and an average of 60-65 people are served meals daily.

Mr. Morgan asked what the average donation per meal is.

Mr. Shrader said the average donation is \$1.26.

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Mr. Morgan said the cost of each meal to the taxpayer is much higher than \$1.26 and over \$10.00 a plate by the time you figure from the time it gets to the local government from the Federal Government.

Chairwoman Hirschbach commented that this kind of program is an alternative to putting someone in a nursing home, which is very costly to the county. She asked Mr. Culbertson and Mr. Morgan to attend a meeting of the Area for the Aged to see how their funding is done.

Ted Piepho (County Clerk) appeared before the Board with the monthly report for December from his office.

Eva Krogh Davis appeared before the Board regarding the valuation of her property.

Morgan moved, seconded by Rohde to convene as the Board of Equalization. Unanimous motion carried 9:40 a.m.

Garvey moved, seconded by Rohde to reconvene as the Board of Commissioners. Unanimous motion carried 9:52 a.m.

Joy Nixon presented the Board two bids for appraisal of commercial property in the county; those bids being from Midwest Appraisal Co. and Le Grand.

Ms. Nixon replied that Midwest Appraisal Co. is experienced in working with counties. She added that an outside source would be valuable in court, where an assessor's word is seldom taken.

RE: Unpaid County Commissioner Wages of Rodney R. Smith

Dear Board Members:

In the past few weeks, this County Board has requested the County Attorney's office to seek an attorney general's opinion on the liability of the County to pay the bill submitted previously by Rodney Smith for unpaid county commissioner wages. On behalf of Mr. Smith, we have been provided with a copy of the County Attorney's response to this Board's request. In all fairness, we believe the County Attorney's action in this regard to be unresponsive to the needs of this Board for an unbiased opinion.

As you may recall, we asked that this Board defer any decision, pending an opinion either from the attorney general or independent legal counsel. The purpose for the request was based upon our observation that an unbiased objective opinion on the legal issues involved was clearly necessary. Under more usual circumstances, the opinion of your County Attorney would be proper. However, it is plain to see that the County Attorney is cloaked with a shroud of biasness do to his public and private involvement in removing Mr. Smith from public office. By this statement, we do not necessarily mean the County Attorney is deliberately taking sides on the issue, however, we do question the refusal of the County Attorney was not only responsible in removing Mr. Smith from public office, but also in helping to appoint his replacement. Clearly everyone's interests would be best served in obtaining such an opinion.

At this time, we do not believe it would serve a responsible purpose in responding to the County Attorney. Countering that office's position with legal opinions and case law in Mr. Smith's favor would merely lead to confusion and opinions on both sides of the question.

It is our recommendation that this Board again make formal request to the County Attorney's office for an attorney general's opinion. We believe the Board is entitled to such an opinion, and should make every effort to obtain the same. If the County Attorney's office once again refuse to cooperate, then we propose that this Board seek an independent legal opinion from another unbiased source.

Your continued cooperation is much appreciated.

The following is the information you requested.

Under the Uniform Anatomical Gift Act the person who resumes responsibility for final disposition of a human remains has the authority to bequeath the remains to the Nebraska Anatomical Board.

The Nebraska Anatomical Board will help deffer the expenses by allowing \$110 for embalming and the securing of the necessary papers. We also allow  $42\phi$  per loaded mile up to 200 miles from Omaha for transportation. The most we can ever pay is \$194.

## Statute

71-1002. State Anatomical Board; dead human bodies subject to burial at public expense; delivery to board; claimant of body; requirements. All public officers, agents, and servants of this state, and of every county, city, township, district, and other municipal subdivision thereof, and of every almshouse, prison, morgue, hospital, or other institution having charge, control or possession of any dead human body, which is not claimed within the time and in the manner provided by this section, are required to immediately nofify the chairman of the State Anatomical Board, or such agent, school, college or person as may, from time to time, be designated by the board. Such institution shall, without fee or reward, surrender and deliver such dead body or bodies to the board, or to such agent, schools, colleges, physicians and surgeons, as may, from time to time be designated by it for anatomical use and study. No such notice need be given, and no such body shall be delivered to the board, if any person shall claim the body for burial within ten days after death nor shall any such body be delivered to the board if the deceased was honorably discharged from the military or naval service of the United States. Any person may claim and receive such body from the State Anatomical Board if (1) application in writing is made to the Board for such body for the purpose of burial or cremation within thirty days after delivery to the board, (2) such claimant agrees in writing to assume the ex-pense of burial or cremation, and (3) the State Anatomical Board determines that such claim has been made in good faith and not for the purpose of claiming social security or other burial benefits payable for burial of the deceased or of obtaining payment for the expense of embalming and burying the deceased. If the duly authorized officer or agent of the board deems any such body unfit for anatomical purposes, he shall notify the county commissioners of the county in which the death occured, and the county commissioners shall then direct some person to take charge of such body and cause it to be buried, the expense of such burial to be fixed and paid by order of the county commissioners from any funds available for such purpose.

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Morgan moved, seconded by Culbertson to adopt a policy regarding the disposition of unclaimed bodies in accordance with statute 71-1002.

Rohde moved, seconded by Garvey to recess. Unanimous motion carried 9:55 A.M. Garvey moved, seconded by Rohde to reconvene. Unanimous motion carried 10:05 A.M.

Morgan moved, seconded by Rohde to authorize the Chairman of the Board to solicit opinions from the Nebraska Association of County Officials in regard to the bill submitted by Smith and the budget and to solicit the attorney general's opinion from the Secretary of State. Hirschbach abstained. Motion carried.

John Corcoran and Craig Tiedtke (Region IV) appeared before the Board per the Board's request to explain the role of Region IV and the process of assessing each county.The amount assessed per county is based on the number of clients in the county. Mr. Corcoran said Region IV represents 20 counties in the state.

Mr. Tiedtke presented a handout on a new proposed assessment process. Counties would be assessed 30% by population, 30% by evaluation and 40% by the number of clients in the county. He said they are proposing a 7% increase per year.

Mr. Morgan said he felt the only fair way to assess the counties would be to base it on population.

The Board asked Mr. Tiedtke and Mr. Corcoran to determine the amount spent within the Region IV program and report back to the Board.

Dennis Donner (Department of Revenue) and Joy Nixon (County Assessor) appeared before the Board to explain the CAPS program.(County Administered Property System)

Mr. Donner explained that a computer could be put in the courthouse which would be connected with the office in Lincoln. Mr. Donner listed the following as some of the advantages of the CAPS program. It provides the assessor's office with the ability to analyze files. It provides outputs for tax-payers to help show them how their property is valuated. Mr. Donner estimated the cost to the county being \$15,000, based on the number of parcels in the county. The cost for the first terminal would be \$239.00 per month, each additional terminal \$94.00 per month and \$300.00 for telephone lines.

Ms. Nixon said the program would not reduce the staff of her office, but it would reduce the jobs performed in the office.

Mr. Donner said the program has many edits built into it, enabling it to catch errors. He said employees are trained to operate the terminal at no cost to the county. However, Mr. Donner said they are considering charging for 1 full time equivalent. The program is purchased on a 30 day lease agreement.

Rohde moved, seconded by Garvey to convene in executive session to discuss possible future litigation, and personnel. Unanimous motion carried 12:09 p.m.

Garvey moved, seconded by Culbertson to reconvene in regular session. Unanimous motion carried 1:04 p.m.

Being there is no sick leave policy for the County road department, the Board discussed a policy for the said department.

Morgan moved, seconded by Culbertson to allow the county road employees to earn 5 days sick leave per year of employment up to a maximum of 30 days; the Highway Superintendent or Board of Commissioners has authority to request a doctor's report from an employee absent more than 2 days.



In Mr. Redmond's office, we were told that the District Judge was concerned over the Boards actions and wanted to see the Board members in chambers. No one other than the County Attorney and the three commissioners were present at that time. After approximately ten minutes, we were told to proceed immediately into the District Courtroom. Gretchen, Dan and I were seated behind one of the two attorney's tables in front of the Judge's bench. The county attorney sat at the other table. The general details of this Court proceeding were reported in our local newspaper as everyone is aware of.

It is important for Board members Culbertson and Garvey to be aware of these events which occured, since they were absent. My concern over this entire episode is not without justification. I believe the meetings with the county attorney and the public courtroom appearance by a majority of the county board members before the District Judge raises some serious questions in my own mind as to how to proceed at this point. Attendance by county commissioners to discuss county business should be done so in accordance with the laws of this state on public meetings. My experience in public office is that this Board cannot conduct official county business unless the meeting has been properly posted before hand and the subject to be considered has been placed on the agenda. Therefore, I am of the opinion that this Board should not and cannot take any further action on the CETA claim in response to the District Judge's actions of February 17, 1981.

If the Judge wishes to address this Board, then he may do so in the proper public forum, which is before the Board at regularly scheduled meeting. He has the right and opportunity to place himself on the meeting agenda. Since the District Judge apparently has some concerns over our decision regarding his CETA worker, we should provide him with the opportunity to address the Board. Any action this Board might take now on the CETA claim would be tainted with the courtroom proceeding of February 17th, thus making any final decision questionable.

I would also like to inform the Board that I have submitted a written request to the District Judge and court reporter for a written record of the February 17th court proceeding. Attached to this statement you will find a copy of my written request. I feel it is important for those absent Board members to be given an opportunity to review what was said and done at that time. This is especially important since county business was the subject of that proceeding.

At this time I would move that my written statement be made a part of the minutes of this meeting.

Chairwoman Hirschbach said Judge Kneifl called a special meeting on February 17 because the Board failed to contact him at the time they denied the CETA claim, and due to a number of court proceedings this week, he felt he would not be able to meet with the Board this morning at their regular meeting. She checked with the CETA office in Fremont regarding the funding of the CETA program. After the first 3 months, the employer pays the employee and is then reimbursed by CETA. In this case, Dakota County is the employer.

Rohde moved, seconded by Garvey to schedule a public hearing to ammend the budget in order to pay the CETA claim. ROLL CALL VOTE: Garvey, Rohde, Culbertson, Morgan Yea Hirschbach Nay

Motion carried.

Ms. Hirschbach said funds for CETA are guaranteed by the State. There is no question about funds being available in the General Fund; nor in regard to the claim of Ray Speer, is there any question as to whether funds are available in either the General Fund or the County Attorney's Fund to pay this claim. She said employees should not have to pay for errors made by the board. Ms. Hirschbach said being no separate fund was established for Child Support, the responsibility is put on the General Fund or the County Attorney's budget.

Ms. Hirschbach said according to Keith Larsen, Budget Director, Child Support funds go directly into the General Fund. Maurice Redmond(County Attorney) appeared before the Board and read the following statement to the Board:

I've requested the Clerk to turn on the tape recorder for the purpose of the recording of the statement to the Board addressing the board in a particular manner in regard to the Child Support portion of the program. I want the records to show and to be a part of the official minutes in the meeting of this Board; that the Board approved and entered into a contract with the State Department of Welfare which it is obligated to comply with and perform, which includes advancing and budgeting funds for the Child Support enforcement program; that there is sufficient funds budgeted within the County Attorney's budget to pay the claim of Mr. Raymond Speer, Child Support Enforcement Attorney. In addition, that the budget as adopted by the Board was improperly adopted and the board has been so advised by the County Attorney, myself, and by the State Auditor's office in a letter dated August 28, 1980, which I have marked as an exhibit, that it be offered also into the official minutes of the Board's meeting as Exhibit A, page 1 and page 2. In addition, the Board and specifically members denying the claim, Mr. Garvey, Mr. Morgan and Mr. Culbertson, have been advised that they are without authority to deny a claim for which there are sufficient funds in the County Attorney's budget and in the General Fund to pay the claim, and that they could be held to be personally liable for any expense necessary to assure the claim is paid. They have been so advised by the County Attorney as to that fact.

In addition, it is my personal opinion the three members of the Board are playing politics with the young man's salary and such act is totally reprehensible, insensitive and cowardly.

I wish my statement to be official part of the Board's minutes. If you have anything to say in response to that, gentlemen, I hope that you put it on record. Do you have anything to say, Mr. Garvey?

Mr. Garvey said, No. (He started to say something, but was then interrupted by Mr. Redmond)

Mr. Redmond said, Do you have anything to say, Mr. Morgan?

Mr. Morgan said, Well, in response to the allogations that we're insensitive; it's not that I'm insensitive; it's just that I want to establish the correct procedure that we'd had. Because of an agreement that we had with you, this session of the Board on to how we would fund the program and how we would handle the payment; this we are going to have to clarify with the budget hearing and further adoption in order to establish this payment.

Mr. Redmond: It's basically the point that I made and the point that you were advised as to the proper procedure by the State offices, the State Auditor's office and in addition, basically the Board then is denying a claim because of it's own error which I say is insensitive, but I wish it to be made part of the record that you be so advised as to the nature of the legality of the act.

#### MEMORANDUM

FROM: Ray A. C. Johnson Auditor of Public Accounts

SUBJECT: Direct Reimbursement for Title IV-D, Child Support Enforcement Costs

TO: All County Board Chairpersons

There is apparently some confusion as to the role of the County Board in recognizing Title IV-D monies earned by the County Attorney, Clerk of the District Court and County Treasurer subject revenue subsequently paid to the County by the Nebraska Department of Public Welfare.

Section 43-512.05 mandates that such reimbursement "shall be added to the budgets of those County officials who have performed the services...."

To comply with the express mandate of the Statute a County Board <u>must</u> allow additional appropriation to the officials referred to in Para. 1 through one of the following options:

- a. For the 1980-1981 budget, adopt an increase to the affected officer's budget, equal to the estimated anticipated income from Title IV-D revenues and/or the actual revenue received in the 1979-1980 fiscal year. This allows the officer to cost out through the budget process the expenses caused by additional workload.
- b. If the 1980-1981 County Budget has been finalized and adopted the County Board should charge the expense of the officers additional workload to the Miscellaneous General Account in the County General Fund and not to the officers budget.
- c. The expense for the additional workload could be charged against the officers budget as it occurs during the year <u>except that</u>, when the officers budget approaches the point of depletion, the County Board, by resolution, must add to that officers budget an amount considered necessary to finish out the fiscal year, by transferring unused appropriations within the General Fund Miscellaneous Accounts.

Finally, Title IV-D reimbursement is fully funded by Federal dollars and, as such, is <u>excluded from application of the 7% Revenue Lid</u>.

Garvey moved, seconded by Morgan to adjourn. Unanimous motion carried 12:18 P.M.

#### STATEMENT

On Feb. 23, 1981, the Dakota County Attorney entered into the record a statement concerning the payment of a salary claim for his assistant, Mr. Raymond Speers, in which he accused several members of this Board of playing politics with a young man's salary and of acting in a reprehensible, insensitive and cowardly manner.

I offer to you this excerpt from the minutes of the County Board proceedings of Sept. 2, 1980:

Smith moved, seconded by Garvey that the County Budget be amended. Following is the resolution. Unanimous motion carried

#### RESOLUTION

That the County budget be amended, as it concerns Child Support collections, through the County Attorney's office and the employment of Raymond Speer as a special assistant in this capacity is approved with the express stipulation that Mr. Speer's salary of \$13,000.00 must only be paid out of Title Four Child Support agreement receipts.

If the County Attorney's office, through said assistant, does not collect funds sufficient to pay his wages, they shall be so limited to funds actually paid into the hands of the Dakota County Treasurer.

I believe this resolution clearly states the County Board's position and intentions on the matter of Mr. Speer's employment.

The only reprehensible act concerning this claim to date, is that of the County Attorney in his accusations against several members of this Board. I submit that the only reason this claim could not be honored, is the inefficiency of the County Attorney's office in submitting the necessary claim to the State for the incentive payments due the County. He can hardly expect the fund to remain solvent if his office is over five months late in making request for reimbursement.

Ms. Hirschbach said we have requested from Keith Larsen, a written copy of his opinion regarding the Child Support and CETA funds.

Mr. Piepho said, The law states these funds be a part of the General Fund. I was not in position to override the decision of the board to hold a public hearing to amend the budget; and if I was to have it printed within the time period given, I had to have the public hearing notice printed last week.

Mr. Giese presented the Board a list of parcels of real estate on which taxes are delinquent for the Board to act on at their next meeting.

Vincent Kramper appeared before the Board to present a plaque commemorating the new addition to the courthouse.

Wayne Wheeler (County Surveyor) appeared before the board for the public hearing to amend the County Surveyor's budget.

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Ms. Hirschbach said the Board under/estimated the amount needed for the County Surveyor's budget. Some claims pertaining to the landfill were paid out of the County Surveyor's budget; these claims will be distributed to the proper budgets.

Mr. Wheeler said about \$5000 more would be needed in the Surveyor's budget to cover claims for the remainder of the fiscal year.

Mr. Morgan said we should transfer a sufficient amount now to avoid another hearing. The Solid Waste Disposal Agency can either reimburse the county or the amount can be subtracted from future bills.

Rohde moved, seconded by Garvey to adopt the following resolution to amend the County Surveyor's budget from \$5,030.00 to \$10,030.00 and the Miscellaneous Fund be amended from \$266,096.04 to \$261,096.04.

This is to acknowledge receipt of your letter of February 20, 1981, requesting a transcript of our visit on February 17, 1981. The visit was not a court proceeding and was not intended to be as such. Upon learning of the Board's action, I wanted an opportunity to visit with the Board. The Board had adjourned and I was going to be busy in other parts of the District the rest of the week. We had a jury trial in Ponca, on the 23rd, and I would not have been afforded an opportunity to visit with you. Such being the case, I requested Mr. Redmond, who I assumed had advised the Board on the matter, to see if he could contact the Board to enable me to visit with them.

Several of the Board Members were unavailable. I noted a newspaper reporter in the Clerk's Office around 4:00 p.m. and out of courtesy to the Board members and to alleviate the suspicion of secrecy; I visited with you in the District Courtroom. The meeting was not intended to embarrass you and I am of the opinion it did not, but merely for the Court to visit with you and set forth the Court's position; since the Court was not given an opprotunity to address the Board prior to their action on the Court Clerk's salary claim.

We will honor your request for a transcript and it will be furnished to you, the other Board Members, and the County Attorney at no cost to anyone. We are presently in the middle of jury work in Ponca, Nebraska, and the reporter has other matters pending, but as soon as time permits she will transcribe the record and deliver the same to all persons concerned.

Dear Judge Kneifl:

I have received your letter of February 24, 1981, and would like to respond to your position on the matter regarding the County Board's action on the CETA worker's salary claim. At the February 23, 1981, county board meeting, I offered to the other Board members a general statement on the entire episode and my opinion as to your involvement and actions on February 17th. I personally take issue with a number of events which occurred that day.

My first concern regards the order directed by you to the County Sheriff's office for a county wide search for the five members of our board, summoning us to appear before you at 4:00 P.M. that afternoon in the District Courtroom. I have received a copy, supplied to me by another commissioner, of what was apparently your written order commanding our presence before you. This written order also told board members they could have private legal counsel with them in court.

I never received this information contained in the order on February 17th, and did not even know I was to be in open Court until seconds before being taken into the Courtroom by our County Attorney, Maurice Redmond. The three Board members present, prior to the hearing, were led into a conference room by Mr. Redmond. At that time. he told us you were infuriated by the Board's action on the CETA claim, and your first inclination was to throw us in jail. However, Mr. Redmond continued by saying he had calmed you down. He then told us that he thought we were to see you in the Judge's chambers.

Mr. Redmond left the conference room for several minutes. He then returned and led us down the back hall, but was met by your Court Reporter and apparently told by her to take us into the courtroom. The rest of what was said is a matter of record in court.

While you have stated to me that our appearance before you was a visit, I am convinced the entire public display was a courtroom proceeding. We were seated behind the attorney's table required to stand when you entered the courtroom and when speaking to the Court. Also, you were

wearing a robe and had your reporter take everything down, As a layman, there could be no impression other than that of a Courtroom proceeding.

However much a written record may reflect what was said at the time, it may not accurately show the atmosphere in which we were standing before you. I personally felt intimidated, especially because of Mr. Redmond's statements to us in the conference room. Also, it was embarassing and humiliating for me as a public official to be led into a Courtroom without adequate notice and an understanding of exactly what was happening. I do not feel this was right and consider it to be an abuse of the legal system.

More importantly is the effect this has had on the integrity of our County Board and judicial system. Public opinion, as I perceive it, is very much disturbed with what happened. Many are questioning our County Board's independence and authority to act responsibly and without undue influence. The appearance before you in open court by a majority of board members for the purpose of discussing county business and without proper procedure in conducting an open public meeting, is wrong, and I believe contrary to the laws in our state.

I am only speaking for myself, however my past experience indicates that this board has always been accomodating in providing people with opportunity to speak to us. I would have been more than willing to meet at a special public meeting with the other Board members later on that same week to hear your concerns. I regret you did not pursue that course of action.

As a matter of information, I am sending a copy of your letter to the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court and to the State Attorney General, becuase of my concern over the entire affair. They will also be receiveing a copy of this letter for their reference.

Ms. Hirschbach acknowledged receipt of a letter and opinion from Maurice Redmond, County Attorney in regard to the claim of Rodney Smith. Board members each received a copy of the same. The Board acknowledged receipt of a letter from Ray A. C. Johnson, State Auditor. In his letter to the Board, Mr. Johnson stated Section 23-135 of the statutes sets forth the procedure for the county board to follow. The county board should act on the claim in either allowing or disallowing and the procedure to follow thereafter is laid out in the above section.

Mr. Morgan said, I would like to read the county attorney's opinion before we take any action on the claim.

Ms. Hirschbach asked the board if they wished to solicit any other legal opinions.

Mr. Morgan said, I think we should postpone action now.

Gene Sturm (SIMPCO) appeared before the board regarding State Lighting and Thermal Standards. Mr. Sturm said LB954 was passed last year and will go into effect April 1, 1981. Residential structures 3 stories or less would be exempt from the lighting standards, but should adhere to the thermal standards. The standards could be enforced by either the State or the county. If the county was to enforce the standards, the County Building Inspector would do the inspecting. The county could charge up to \$25 per home; the larger buildings would be charged 1¢ per square foot.

Mr. Morgan said, To create a minimum amount of hassle, it would be better to handle it on a local basis.

Mr. Sturm said he would be presenting this to the Planning & Zoning Committee at their meeting this week.

Kenneth Beekley appeared before the Board regarding the Block Grant Application. The application by Dakota County was approved. Mr. Beekley explained this is a grant and loan program. Dakota County applied to participate on a loan basis.

Bruce Hovey appeared before the Board regarding the replacement of a tube southeast of Hubbard. Mr. Hovey said the cheapest way would be to repair the existing road rather than open another road in the area. In addition, he said the fence at the county shed in South Sioux need to be replaced.

Ms. Hirschbach said these should be bid items. She asked Mr. Hovey to write up specifications and present them to the Board for review.

Maurice Redmond (County Attorney) appeared before the Board regarding condemnation by the State Fire Marshall of buildings located on Lot 4 and except W2' of East ½ of Lot 5, Block 172, Dakota City, Dakota County, Nebr. Mr. Redmond said the Board can either hire a contractor to take the buildings down or if the county thinks they have use for the lumber, they can take is down themselves.

Ms. Hirschbach asked Mr. Garvey and Mr. Culbertson to check into the situation to determine what we should do and report to the Board next week.

Brad King (Burroughs) and Richard Morse (Morse Data Procedding) appeared before the Board to explain that is available to the county in regard to a computer. Mr. King said, In the past few months, there has been interest in a computer system for the county and city of South Sioux. Two alternatives are possible. South Sioux City and Dakota County can work together on a joint basis or each can work individually. We are meeting Tuesday morning with the people who have shown an interest in this to determine if it is even feasible.

Mr. Morse explained what is available to the county. The computer prints out tax statements which show the taxpayers where the tax money goes. It prints out information necessary for the assessor to send in the reports to the State. In addition, it will print tax collection lists, property record cards, personal property schedules and personal property tax statements. It will print a list of motor vehicles which is used by several offices.

Mr. Garvey and Mr. Morgan said they would try to attend the meeting on Tuesday.

Ms. Hirschbach said, When a claim has been denied, it can only be reconsidered once. This claim should have been tabled, not denied. We can allow the payment to be made by default.

Maurice Redmond (County Attorney) said, It would not be proper for me to represent the Board because of conflict of interest.

Ms. Hirschbach said, The Board can either let the payment be made by default and not contest the petition or we can get outside legal advice and contest the petition.

Mr. Morgan read the following statement and asked that it be entered into the minutes.

## STATEMENT

I am sure all of the board members are aware of the fact that a lawsuit has been filed against Dakota County by Mr. Raymond Speer, an attorney currently associated with the County Attorney's office. The papers were apparently filed with the Clerk of the District Court on March 4, 1981. My understanding of the petition is that Mr. Speer is in disagreement with this Board's previous action in denying his claim for wages.

The purpose of this morning's special budgetary hearing is to consider taking steps to amend the current 1980-81 fiscal year budget as to Judge Kneifl's CETA worker and Mr. Speer's claim problems. Because the county has been sued, I am of the opinion that this Board should take no action on Mr. Speer's budget problem at this time. I make this recommendation for a number of reasons.

First, a reading of the lawsuit papers shows a definite purpose in favorably commenting and defending the County Attorney's actions on this subject before this Board. Is is a matter of record that the County Attorney has threatened several members of this Board with possible legal action as it regards Mr. Speer's claim. The timeliness of filing this lawsuit just prior to our budget hearing and the statements contained in the suit, indicate to me that the judicial system is again being used to force our Board into a decision.

Secondly, the circumstances on Mr. Speer's salary and the County Attorney's involvement place the Board in a position of being without adequate unbiased legal counsel. Therefore, it is imperative for this Board to seek legal advice from an outside source. I believe the Board should immediately ask for help from the State Attorney General's office. This is especially necessary since the County has been sued and obviously, the County Attorney cannot act as legal counsel for the County.

Last of all, it is a matter of record that in September of 1980, this Board amended the county budget by resolution to provide that Mr. Speer was to be paid only from those funds actually collected and deposited with the County Treasurer under the Title 4 program. The County Attorney also agreed to this at that time, but now his office is wanting to alter the budget provision and agreement previously entered into. This Board should live up to it's prior commitments.

It is imperative that this Board turn the matter over to the State Attorney General and that a request be made for assistance and legal representation on this lawsuit. I believe this Board should refrain from taking any action on Mr. Speer's budget matter until the Board has had an opportunity to be advised by independent legal counsel.

Ms. Hirschbach asked Mr. Redmond, Am I correct the Board has no right to appeal and get an Attorney General's opinion?

Mr. Redmond replied, The Attorney General will render an opinion to any state office or to me.

Ms. Hirschbach asked Mr. Morgan, Through what office will we render an opinion?

Mr. Morgan said, Through our own office.

Morgan moved, second by Culbertson the County Board send a letter to the State Attorney General asking for legal counsel in the matter of the lawsuit filed against Dakota County by Raymond Speer.

Ms. Hirschbach asked Mr. Morgan to get in touch with the Attorney General. She said a phone call should determine if the Attorney General will help us.

The Board held a public hearing to amend the General Fund budget figures to include Child Support and CETA within the General Fund.

Mr. Hirschbach said, Child Support is a mandated program. The County Board must supply funds to run the program. We dan't have the option of disallowing expenditures.

Mr. Redmond said he agreed to accept the non-support cases in his budget to eliminate extra expense to the county.

Ms. Hirschbach said the legislature passed the Statute regarding Title IV-D monies to put everyone in compliance. It is supsetting to take the time to work on this problem and then bring it back to the Board and have them not believe or accept it.

Mr. Morgan said, This Board established a resolution and I feel this resolution is still binding. The resolution stated when funds are available, claims will be paid. I think we should defer action until we have a response from the Attorney General. The resolution states where Speer's salary is to come from.

Mr. Redmond, said, The Board has two issues. First, they have a claim. Second, an improperly adopted budget.



In regard to the legal counsel opinion on the petition in error filed by Ray Speer, Mr. Garvey said he and Mr. Morgan spoke to an attorney who said he would talk to the County Attorney and suggest that Mr. Speer file another claim.

Joy Nixon (County Assessor) appeared before the Board in regard to the I.B.P. valuation.

Ms. Nixon: I believe on that protest form there's a place for my recommendation.

Ms. Hirschbach: We don't have copies of the protest here.

Ms. Nixon: Last year we added on the new building at \$3,129,807.00 plus the 21% raise mandated by the State for a total of \$3,787,065.00. Midwest has \$3,653,628.00. That would make a difference of \$133,437.00 actual value or \$46,700 assessed value. It would be my recommendation the valuation on the main site be lowered no more than that amount of \$133,437.00. I'd like to go over the appraisal with you. I'm assuming from the last paragraph in the letter from Midwest that we will get a much more detailed report. I was going over some of the physical and functional obsolescence. If you will notice on the main processing building , it was 20% and 15%; Stockyards 10% & 15%; Chain link fence 10% & 15%; Hide Plain 5% & 15%; Air flotation and inedible Rendering Building 20% & 15%; Employment & Security Building 20% & 15%; Waste Treatment Facility 10% & 15%; Large Water Tank 60% & 15%; Metal Storage Building 5% & 15%; Office Building 4% & 25%; Transient Houses 20% & 15%; Scale House 20% & 15%; Scale 10% & 15%; Guard Shack 30% & 15%; Computer Building 20% & 15%; Old Office Building 20% & 15%; Blood Drying Building 20% & 15%; Truck Wash 10% & 15%; Fuel Tanks 15% & 15%; Railroad Spurs 15% 15%; Hide Flume 10% & 15%; Wells and Pumps 15% & 15%; Old Engineering & Construction 40% & 30%; Steel Shop Building 20% & 15%; Old Refrigerated Building 30% & 15%; Paving 30% & 15%. Going back to the office building, if you'll notice, it's mostly 15% through the functional and economic on the others. On the office building, they have allowed 25%. That's why I was interested in getting their analysis on that. I multiplied it out and starting with the \$5,145,955.00 replacement, the physical 4% would take off \$205,838.00 leaving a total of \$4,940,117.00 and if 15% deduction was taken, instead of 25%, we would come up with \$3,199,102.00. Going on to this worksheet, I tried to corrulate from my old worksheet to what Midwest had. The problem for me in making a breakdown is Midwest put all sites together. It's all in this one total. But if I mecall, the protest was filed only on the main plant site. On these totals here, in the column where it says 1980 corrections, I got a total of \$12,294,982.00 and then with the 21% State raise, it brought it up to \$14,876,928.00, and that's just where the main plant sits.

Ms. Hirschbach: Does the \$12,349,633.00 represent Midwest's figure?

Ms. Nixon: Yes, I would say it would. My original recommendation stands.

Mr. Garvey: We've got a difference of \$2,527,295.00 between yours and Midwest's, right?

Ms. Nixon: Yes. But what I'm saying is the only tract they protested on was on the main plant.

Mr. Rohde: What was your recommendation?

Ms. Nixon: That you lower it no more than \$133,437.00 actual from the fourteen million dollar figure.

Rod Smith appeared before the Board.

Ms. Hirschbach: Rod, what is the school board's position on this?

Mr. Smith: I listen to this with great interest because so many times I listen to these things and I can't understand them. Lots of times when Joy's done, I still don't understand them and I don't understand them this morning. I'd like to ask some questions and hopefully it might clarify things in my mind and in yours, too. First of all, I'd like to know what the actual value was for 1979. You've got to understand that Iowa Beef started building an office building in 79. Joy put a partial valuation on that in 79. What was your actual, final figure for 1979?

Ms. Nixon: \$12,475,125.00 actual value.

Mr. Smith: When the schools come down in August and ask for values, we have to know those in order to prepare our budget. Now 1980 rolls around and if Iowa Beef is going to protest, they must ordinarily protest and have their protest acted upon by May 1. Now, I'm going to ask you, Joy. When the spring of 1980 rolled around, Iowa Beef's valuation was still \$12,475,125.00. In May of 1980, Iowa Beef made no protest because they had their value from the preceeding year and they had been given no notice of any raise. Now, along comes June and July and the schools begin getting active because they have to start getting their figures in August for their 1980 levies and budgets. We're up to September 1980. Now, what figure did you give the schools for Iowa Beef's valuation in September of 1980?

Ms. Nixon: \$14,876,928.00

Mr. Smith: You gave them that figure in September, but you hadn't notified Iowa Beef. You done all the work to compile all of these figures down to even \$928.00, so you gave them those figures and you hadn't notified Iowa Beef. When did you notify them?

Ms. Hirschbach: Sometime in November.

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Mr. Smith: So you didn't notify Iowa Beef until November of 1980 after the schools had already incorporated this almost \$15,000,000.00 into their budgets. Then you ask for professional appraisers. Now there's a big argument between Iowa Beef and your offices and your professional appraisers as to what the outcome of this is going to be. You have gotten the answer from your professional appraisers at \$12,394,000.00, which is about exactly what the figure was early in the year in May. Whats happened now, is the school has counted on these figures she gave them in September, when what she gave them should have been \$12,475,000.00 and now we're out forty thousand bucks on figures that she had no right to give to the schools. It's not this Board's fault, it's not Iowa Beef's fault and now you've gotten a figure that  $2\frac{1}{2}$  million less. I swear to heaven by listening here that you paid \$13,000 for an appraisal that now you don't like too well and are considering changing.

Ms. Hirschbach: Not \$13,000. We did not do the personal property. The figure was about six or seven thousand.

Mr. Smith: Well, six or seven thousand dollars that you now want to disregard because the answer didn't come out and she's working on figures to change that. We aren't here to say that their taxes shouldn't be lowered. I personally think they should. But I'm very concerned that you know what actually happened and we sure as the devil don't want it to happen again. As a matter of fact, I'm wondering who's going to pay us the forty thousand dollars. Like I say, its not Iowa Beef's fault. No way! It appears they were right in the beginning. This Board, at levy time should, of course its been said year after year, the people who make up the budgets have got to be able to count on the figures they get out of the Assessor's office. And it's one of the duties of the Board to at least inquire and to see that those figures are finished and that they're accurate. Ordinarily, the way you do it, you use the figures that you know you have in August, the figures you can count on. That's why you have your hearings up to May. Then if there are some obvious mistakes or if there are some changes made because of the finishing of new buildings or because of some omitted property, which the law allows her to add, she can add them. But good heavens, she can't raise them in August without even notifying Iowa Beef. And taking that as a final figure, have I misstated that Joy? Is there anything wrong with the figures I gave?

Ms. Nixon: No.

Mr. Smith: Our concern is that for heaven's sake, don't let it happen again.

Ms. Nixon: Well, it's a procedure that we follow. When we finish any work on anything, we put it on the cards as quickly as we can.

Mr. Smith: Well, why would you predetermine it? You don't add it on without giving the people the right to protest. A perfect example is here before you. Those aren't final until the time for protest is either up or it's decided by the Board of Equalization. Now if you miss some little house, it's going to make a difference of ten dollars, big deal. But when you start screwing around with forty to fifty thousand dollars I don't know what its cost the county, but it's plenty. It's a pity. You should know it's going on, you should know our concern about it and I think you ought to live with the appraisal you got. Trying to pay taxes in this county is panamont to riding a roller coaster. You can't count on anything. One year it's up, one year it's down, the next year it's up. It used to be when you would try to set up a budget, you could kind of count on what you were going to have for next year in the way of taxes and so on. No more. It's about like interest rates. We don't need to have this kind of mistakes being made, because there's no way for us to recover this. We can't afford it much longer.

Ms. Hirschbach: In Joy's defense, Rod, most of the problems of the last few years have been caused by State mandated actions. She's been required by the State to change the appraisal.

Mr. Smith: I understand about the 30% and the 21%'s and all of that, but we know those in August. To do something like this is inexcusable. I can't do anything but call it the way it is. If I don't, somebody is liable to think it isn't important, and they'll let it go next time. I thank you very much for listening to our position.

Ed Wilburn (Northwestern Bell) appeared before the Board with the results from the study conducted by Northwestem Bell in February. Dear Mrs. Hirschbach:

At the Special Board of Education meeting, Monday, March 30, 1981, Mr. Rodney Smith, School Board Attorney, explained how the reduction in valuation of the Iowa Beef Processors plant would impact the school district. According to Mr. Smith, the district can anticipate tax collections of approximately \$40,000 less than requested

when the mill levy was established by the Levying Board.

After some discussion of how these lost tax revenues could be recovered, Mr. Randy Lanning moved that the school board should request that the County Board remit an amount to the school district equal to that lost by the revaluation from surplus funds now held by the county. Dr. Ronald Bartels seconded the motion and all six members noted affirmatively.

The South Sioux City Board of Education respectfully requests that the Dakota County Board of Commissioners consider this request because the loss of tax revenue does not occur as a result of any action by the Board of Education. Rather, the loss of tax revenue occurs because the assessed valuation used to establish the school district mill levy was incorrect.

A response by the Commissioners will be appreciated.

FLOOD INSURANCE STUDY MEETING April 7, 1981 Civil Defense Meeting Room

Present: Gretchen Hirschbach, Paul Culbertson The following people also attended the meeting: Rich Leonard, Gene Sturm, Tom Barnes, Merlin Chambers, Dewey Krumwiede, Kurt Hohenstein, Bettie Cooper, Darryl Lyon, E.C. Smith, Richard Leitschuck, Rick Niedergesos, Bev Gradert and Ted Piepho.

Gene Sturm (SIMPCO) opened the Flood Insurance Study Meeting at 1:05 p.m. Mr. Sturm: For those of you who don't know, Dakota County is already participating in the National Flood Insurance Program. They have already adopted some regulations. The maps we are reviewing today are more detailed than those we have looked at in the past. They identify areas where relatively severe building limitations would be imposed if they are accepted in the present form. I think it is important for individuals in the county to be aware of the potential ramifications of these maps. Mr. Sturm turned the meeting over to Rich Leonard, with the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

Mr. Leonard: I am with the Federal Emergency Management Agency representing the Federal Insurance Administration

which is a part of FEMA. I am here to talk about the National Flood Insurance Program and in particular, the Flood Insurance Study, which has been done for Dakota County. Presently the county is participating in the Emergency Program where flood insurance is available in the county at a flat rate, for residential structures it's 25¢ per \$100.00 insured property per year. The other aspect of the program is Flood Plain Management in the flood plain to protect it against flooding. That is a requirement of the local government, in this case, the county, if it is to participate in the Flood Insurance Program and have the insurance available. The flood plain management in the emergency program of the present status was based on the flood hazard boundary map which is previously disused, which showed the 100 year flood plain. What the county did in the emergency program was require new development to be elevated in that area based on information on the 100 year level. The Flood Insurance Study is the basis for the county converting from the Emergency Program to the regular program. In converting, both aspects of the program are affected. On one hand, flood insurance is adfected and on the other hand, flood plain management is affected. This is not to say that the insurance is sold to the county. It's saying if the county participates in the program by adopting the Flood Plain Management, the insurance is available to property owners in the county. In the insurance aspect, insurance actuarial rates will be established based on risk. Structures built before the Flood Insurance Rate Map takes affect, will continue to be eligible for the present rates under the Emergency Program at 25¢. After that time, structures will be based on actuarial rates.

A member of the audience asked about rebuilding after a fire or other disaster.

Mr. Leonard: Elevation requirements and actuarial insurance rates apply not only to new construction but to substantial improvements of existing structures. Substantial structure improvements are defined as improvements of existing structures at 50% or more of the cost of the existing structure. To answer your question,

substantial improvement also includes the reconstruction of damaged structures if the cost of reconstruction amounted to 50% or more of the value of the structure before damage. If the structure were to be rebuilt, it would have to be rebuilt to the elevation requirements. Variance could be a possibility based on hardship. Any variance will have to recognize the insurance ramification, being that the county may consider granting a variance to the elevation requirements based on hardship but the insurance ramification would still be there. I would say that would also hold the same for destruction other than flood. There is this provision in the Flood Insurance Policy. Let's say an insured structure is destroyed by flood by more than 50%. The community says you can't rebuild the structure unless properly elevated. The Federal Insurance Administrator can grant constructive total loss and pay off the face value of the policy. Regarding elevation, the requirement for new construction and substantial improvements of existing structures is the lowest floor, including the basement must be elevated one foot above the 100 year flood elevation. It's essentially saying that new residential basements are not permitted in the flood plain. There is only one way around that. The county could apply for a special exception which would allow residential structures the same option as non residential structures. Rather than having the lowest floor, including basement, elevated, you could have a floor below the flood elevation if the structure were made water tight to that elevation. This would require a registered professional engineers certification that truly the structure is water tight. Fremont, Grand Island, and Hall County have been permitted special exceptions. Basically what they have had to plead is: 1. The Flood Plain remains an important area to develope residentially 2. Demonstrate the need for basements in residences and 3. Demonstrate actual feasibility for having a flood proof design for a basement.

The second provision of Flood Plain Management would be the adoption of a floodway. We have 2 maps here; a Flood Insurance Rate Map and the Flood Boundary or Floodway Map. The requirement of Flood Plain Management in the floodway would be open space use only would be permitted in that area. Buildings, Landfills, etc. are not permitted. The purpose of a floodway is to reserve an area for flood flow. The remainder of the flood plain would be open for complete development. To a certain extent, the floodway is negotiable. We have proposed allowing equal encroachment on both sides.

After this meeting, an appeals period will be in effect to the results of this study to warrant any changes. Following the 90 day appeals period, a 6 month compliance period will be in effect. At the end of this 6 month period, the Flood Insurance Rate Map takes effect establishing actuarial insurance rates. By the end of this 6 month period, the county is expected to have adopted the Flood Plain Management Ordinance to continue its participation in the National Flood Insurance Program. If they have not adopted the ordinance by that time, they would be suspended from the program and insurance availability would be suspended which would be the first ramification. From there, the ramification of non participation in the program is this: flood insurance is required as a condition to Federally guaranteed and insured loans in the flood plain. If the county did not adopt the ordinance, FHA, SBA, and VA loans would not be available in the 100 year flood plain, but this is not to say conventional loans would not be available. This would be up to the lending institutions to decide for themselves whether they will lend money.

Gene Sturm: I believe, in that case, the lending institution would have to sign a notice saying it realizes the property owner would not be eligible for federal disaster assistance in case of a flood. It would be extremely difficult to get a loan under that situation.

Mr. Culbertson asked about getting a federal grant if the county chose not to participate in the program.

Mr. Leonard: You could not get a federal grant or a federal loan on insurable property in the 100 year flood plain without flood insurance.

Merlin Chambers: I would like to know how the lines got drawn in the first place. I've been through two major floods in Dakota County, the one in Homer in 1940 and the Missouri River flood in 1952. I've never received any water. If you're talking elevations, I know you're all wrong.

Rick Niedergesos: Places on the map where elevation is shown, the elevations were determined by a math computerized model, based on a field survey of cross sections.

Mr. Chambers: Then where the actual water ran, doesn't mean anything?

Mr. Niedergesos: Records of pass floodings were checked.

Mr. Chambers: I can't see how you come up with these boundaries. I've seen the map of the Homer flood and it doesn't hold true.

Mr. Niedergesos: The boundaries were based on sections that cross the flood plain. We did not have enough money available to develope mapping to show every small area. If you have property you think is higher than the elevation shown, get a surveyor to look at it and a letter of map ammendment saying your land is above the given elevation.

Kurt Hohenstein: What study was done on the creeks in the area?

Mr. Niedergesos: A study was done on Pigeon Creek and Omaha Creek and these were approximate studies.

Mr. Hohenstein: Your asking the county to adopt this proposal when the most you done was an approximate study on the area? Was there any consideration given to recent developements of Omaha Creek?

Mr. Niedergesos: It was studied in its present state.

Mr. Hohsestein: If you didn't study the whole area of Omaha Creek, how can you determine how much water it carries?

Mr. Niedergesos: There were 2 parts to the study. There was a hydraulic study and hydrological study, concerned with the volume of water.

A member of the audience asked if any consideration had been given to Homer due to the fact that there has been considerable conservation done upstream?

Mr. Niedergesos: The levels of conservation applied at the time of the study were used. Any conservation done since that, was not considered.

Mr. Sturm: The area to have detailed study was determined at an earlier meeting with the county.

Mr. Leonard: Yes. That meeting was in 1978. In respect to previous floods, we have to consider that nothing guarantees they were 100 year floods or greater.

Mr. Chambers: I have seen portions of South Sioux under water four different times, but they are not in

the flood area.

Mr. Sturm: The study was based on current dams and conservation methods being used. The dams were not in place when the other floods occured.

Mrs. Hirschbach: For any changes to be made then, the burden of proof is on the applicant who wishes the change be made?

Mr. Leonard: Yes. We ask that appeals be sent to the county, so the county is aware that appeals are being made. We will probably ask for no more than a letter of transmittal from the county saying "the enclosed material is being submitted as an appeal with the Flood Insurance Study of the county.

Mrs. Hirschbach: What would constitute proof, to substantiate their change?

Mr. Leonard: They would have to be arguing either the amount of water, which would take a hydraulic analysissomething to demonstrate water will not go to this property or a hydraulic analysis or the elevation to which that amount of water is going to get.

Mr. Hohenstein: Where can we get data on the 100 year flood to compare it to the floods we've had?

Mr. Leonard: In the report.

Mr. Culbertson: As a member of the group to be responsible, I'm going to appreciate a lot of input. Knowing there are alternatives, I hope you come to me and let me know how you feel about this.

Mr. Sturm: According to the NRD guidelines, in Nebraska, a house cannot be built in a floodway. I don't think this floodway is really meaningfull in rural areas. How would the actuarial rates be determined in approximate A zones?

Mr. Leonard: It will be according to structures having no basement, an unfinished basement, or a finished basement. Concerning approximate zones, we are relying on NRD's determination of the approximate analysis of what the flood plain is. Finally, I would suggest the county appoint a flood plain coordinator for the county.

Dear Mrs. Hirschbach:

The City of South Sioux City, City of Dakota City and the County of Dakota County have been trying to resolve a continuous problem, solid waste disposal for several years. The problem is mutual, all entities are obvious producers of solid waste. The 1980 census Figures indicate the following:

South Sioux City	9,339
Dakota City	1,440
Rural Dakota Co.	4,397
Total	15,176

As a result of the effects of the three entities seeking a common solution to common problems an organization was formed, the Dakota County Solid Waste Disposal Agency.

As is evident, the County now will have two licensed sites, one public, and one private. The overall most economic method of proceeding for all entities is to proceed with the utilization of both sites, according to the Solid Waste Disposal Agency, City Engineer,

and the County Highway Superintendent.

Initially the day to day operation would be disposed at the Gill site with the bulk of the refuse being deposited initially at the Pedersen site.

The organization and participation of Dakota County on the Solid Waste Disposal Agency has been under legal question according to newspaper accounts. The City of South Sioux City and City of Dakota City have requested to appear before the Board of Commissioners Monday April 27, 1981, however since we have been allowed only 15 minutes, it is respectfully requested that all nesessary steps be taken to resolve all the legal questions prior to the Monday meeting.

In order to proceed, the City of South Sioux City, and City of Dakota City hereby request that the County Board of Commissioners decide by Monday April 27, 1981, that they:

- 1) Agree to fully participate with the City of Dakota City and South Sioux City as proposed.
- 2) Remove the participation of the County until the legal questions regarding the Agency formation and activities are resolved.

Any time delay in resolving this issue will be very costly and necessitate an immediate resloution of this situation. The city of South Sioux City is under State Department of

Environmental Control mandate to be in a new licensed site by May 15, 1981.

Your prompt attention to this matter is greatly appreciated.

#### Dear Larry:

I am addressing this letter to you inasmuch as you are knowledgeable about the case involving Ted Saltzman, Dakota Sanitation and Margaret Goodsell, who has been left with a mess of garbage oozing leachate on her land as a result of events these last two years. Finding a remedy to her dilemma is a joint problem of concern to all of us and, if everyone gives a little, we ought to be able to correct the situation. We are appealing for such an effort by all concerned.

You may recall from the copy of my letter of October 1, 1980 to Mrs. Goodsell that the SCS was designing plans for a project which was expected to correct about 98% of the problem as it now exists. Those plans are finished. A 36-foot earthen dam is proposed. Also, the area behind the proposed dam, which now contains the refuse from the Dakota Sanitation operation, must be covered with two feet of dirt and seeded with grass. SCS tells us that this latter job could be done with a cat and one operator. The problem then arises as to who will do the necessary earthwork.

It was agreed at two points in the late court case that the County would furnish a cat to Ted Saltzman who would then finish the work needed bo be done. I realize that Maurice Redmond has been opposed to this procedure, but I think Mrs. Goodsell's predicament justifies the County in loaning the cat to Saltzman in the interest of simple justice. Dan Drain and I, therefore, urge that the County Commissioners reconsider and take such action so that Mrs. Goodsell, certainly an innocent victim of circumstances, is not left with potential litigation as a result of the drainage of leachate from her property onto her neighbor's land. Looked at from that standpoint, it certainly makes sense for the County and Ted Saltzman to be magnanimous and lend a hand to help a beleagured fellow citizen, It would be much appreciated if you would lay the matter before the Commissioners for their consideration.

By copy of this letter to George Hirschbach, Ted Saltzman's attorney, I am requesting his cooperation with the County in cleaning up this item of unfinished business.





Mr. Redmond: We requested they eliminate the County Treasurer's and County Assessor's office's from the idemnification part of the contract. The County Board members, County Assessor and County Treasurer signed the CAPS program contract effective August 1, 1981 as follows.

### CONTRACT FOR THE IMPLEMENTATION AND CONTINUATION OF THE COUNTY ADMINISTERED PROPERTY SYSTEM

This contract is between the Dakota County Commissioners, acting on behalf of the said County, hereinafter called the County, Dakota County Assessor, and Dakota County Treasurer and the Nebraska Department of Revenue, hereinafter called the Department. This contract is for the implementation and continuation of the County Administered Property System, hereinafter referred to as CAPS, for data processing and computer services for use by the County Assessor's and the County Treasurer's offices, as specified in the applicable attached schedules.

This contract shall be effective on the <u>lst</u> day of <u>August</u>, 19<u>81</u>. The Department may terminate this contract without cause by written notice to the County sixty days prior to the first day of January of any calendar year. The County may terminate this contract without cause by written notice to the Department sixty days from the first day of the following month after the notice of termination has been given.

# SECTION 2 WORK

The Department shall establish a CAPS file for the county for real estate and/or personal property, incorporating pertinent characteristics of each file, as designed by the Department. With these files, the Department shall provide the services agreed to and specified in the applicable attached schedules. Data necessary to establish the CAPS files shall be accumulated by the County. The County Assessor shall verify the accuracy of the files and shall make any required corrections. Maintenance and updating of the CAPS files shall be performed by the County Assessor.

The specific services to be provided by the Department for the County as set out in this paragraph are shown on Schedules A, B, C and D, which schedule(s) are attached hereto and incorporated herein as if set out in this contract verbatim.

The meaning and definition of any and all computer terminology as used in this contract is understood by and between the parties hereto as that defined in Computer Dictionary and Handbook by Charles J. and

Roger Sippl. published by Howard W. Sams and Company, Inc., third addition, first printing, 1980, which is hereby incorporated into this contract.

#### SECTION 3 LIMITATION OF LIABILITY

Neither party shall be responsible for any delays that are not due to such party's negligence and that could not have been reasonably foreseen or provided against. Any reasonable delay because of disaster, weather, mechanical failure, act of God, strike, war, order of court or other public authority, will also cause no liablilty to the Department. The Department shall provide the County with advance notice of allotted time for production of services as itemized on applicable attached schedules.

# SECTION 4

PROPERTY

All CAPS software, including computer programs, operating instructions, and other documentation will be the property of the Department. All County source documents, stored data, and other County information shall belong to the County and shall be delivered to the County in the format utilized by CAPS on tape or hard copy, upon termination of this contract and upon request by the County. Access to such information shall be governed by sections 84-712, 84-712.01, 84-712.03 to and including 84-712.09, R.S.Supp., 1980.

#### SECTION 5 ACCURACY

The County shall be responsible for the accuracy of all data within the system.

#### SECTION 6 COST

Computer and data processing service costs shall be the actual costs incurred by the Department in providing the services. Segments of actual costs incurred include, but are not limited to, onetime installation charge for telecommunications line, monthly line cost, individual hardware items cost, postage, forms, microfiche, and price per parcel per month cost for data processing and computer file storage. This price per parcel per month is updated on a regular basis using the previous 12 months as the base period.

Expenses attributable to the implementation and continued operation of the services provided in this contract shall be paid to the Department when billed.

#### SECTION 7 WAIVER

Any waiver by either party of any provision of this contract shall not imply a subsequent waiver of that or any other provision.

## SECTION 8 AMENDMENTS

The County may by written notice, request amendments within the general scope of this contract, in the schedules, specifications, or quantity of work to be performed hereunder. An amended or supplemental contract will then be provided, upon amendment being agreeable to the County and the Department.

#### SECTION 9 PAYMENT

Regular payments to this account shall be on a quarterly basis and shall be due and owing to the Department 30 days from the date of billing. Upon the failure of the County to make timely payments, the Department may cease to perform any services under this contract and may terminate this contract immediately upon the option of the Department. Upon the termination of this contract, a final accounting shall be made.

#### SECTION 10

It is understood by and between the parties hereto that if no appropriated funds are available to the Department necessary to carry out the terms of this Agreement, this Agreement shall terminate at the end of the then current fiscal year at the election in writing of the Department to the County. If any Governor's budget message is such that it does not include funds necessary for the Department to carry out the terms of this Agreement, notice of such fact shall be given to the County. If at any time it appears that appropriations will be depleted in the future, or not available for the performance of this Agreement, notice of such fact and the estimated date of depletion shall be given promptly to the County.

It is further understood by and between the parties hereto that if the County cannot appropriate funds necessary to carry out the terms of this Agreement for the reason of having reached the tax levy or spending lid ceiling, this Agreement shall terminate at the election of the County in writing to the Department in accordance with the terms in Section 1 of this contract.

#### SECTION 11 ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS

This contract contains the binding agreements between the parties hereto. It shall be governed by the law of the state of Nebraska.

# SECTION 12 INDEMNIFICATION

The County agrees to indemnify the Department or the state as a result of any damage to, loss of, or liability incurred by the Department for the computer terminal or terminals leased to the County by the Department while in the possession of said County or County Assessor.

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

Maurice Redmond, County Attorney, appeared before the Board. The Board reviewed the County Attorney budget and the Child Support budget. The official's request for the County Attorney's budget was \$76,879.00 and \$35,150.00 for the Child Support budget.

Mr. Morgan said the proposed for the two budgets should be no more than 12% over last year plus \$4,000.00 from the Miscellaneous General budget, or \$94,182.00.

Morgan moved, seconded by Garvey the total of the County Attorney and Child Support budgets be no more than \$94,182.00 and the County Attorney's office adjust the line items in the two budgets to correspond.

Mr. Redmond: It's unacceptable to my office. We have had a considerable increase in crime in the last three years. My overall budget has not increased at the same rate. We cut back considerably last year. The law requires the Child Support be in my budget and I budget accordingly. There's no fat in that budget. We have taken over contempt citations. There are alot of cases and we need the funds to do the work.

Mrs. Hirschbach called for the vote. Voting Yea: Garvey, Morgan, Culbertson, Hirschbach Voting Nay: Rohde Motion carried.

The Board reviewed the Treasurer's budget. The Board reduced the amount budgeted for salaries from \$42,000.00 to \$41,344.80. The Board reduced the County Treasurer's bond from \$617.00 to \$340.00. The official's request was \$85,015.23. The Board proposed \$84,083.03.

Bob Giese, County Treasurer, appeared before the Board and presented his June report. Mr. Giese reported the interest for June to be \$31,280.76. The total interest for the 80-81 fiscal year was \$183,990.98. The total interest for the last  $3\frac{1}{2}$  years was \$345,206.68.

Board members signed the semi-annual treasurer's report.

A RESOLUTION ADOPTING AND INCORPORATING BY REFERENCE LIGHTING AND THERMAL EFFICIENCY STANDARDS FOR THE COUNTY OF DAKOTA COUNTY, NEBRASKA, AND REPEALING ALL OTHER RESOLUTIONS OR PARTS OF RESOLUTIONS IN CONFLICT HEREWITH.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF DAKOTA COUNTY. NEBRASKA:

Section 1: The Need For and Adoption of Lighting and Thermal Efficiency Standards.

1.0 This Resolution shall be known as the Minimum Lighting and Thermal Efficiency Standards for Buildings.

1.1 The County finds that there is a present and continuing need to provide for the development and implementation of minimum lighting and thermal efficiency standards for buildings to insure coordination with federal policy under the Energy Conservation Standards for New Buildings Act of 1976 and Nebraska State Policy under LB 954, to promote the conservation of our dwindling energy resources and to provide for the public health, safety and welfare.

1.2 The County finds the energy standard enforcement program mandated by state statutes is most easily and economically enforced at the local level in conjunction with building codes, and has determined that it is in the best interest of the citizenry to maintain the authority to do so.

1.3 There is hereby adopted and incorporated by reference for Dakota County, Nebraska Energy Conservation Standard 90-75 of the American Society of Heating, Refrigeration and Air-Conditioning Engineers, Inc. as it existed on April 23, 1980, prepared and published in book form by the Nebraska Energy Office under the title of "Nebraska Building Energy Conservation Standards."

1.4 Three official copies of said standard to be on file in the office of the County Clerk and marked as "Official Copy as Adopted by Resolution, dated

1.5 The area of jurisdiction of this Resolution shall be the county's zoning jurisdiction as identified on the official county zoning map.

#### Section 2: Definition of Terms.

2.0 As used in this Resolution, unless the context otherwise requires, the following definitions shall apply:

2.1 A Prime Contractor shall mean the person, persons, entity or entities who has a contract with the owner and is the one responsible for the overall construction of any building or the installation of any component which affects the energy efficiency of the building. Prime Contractor shall also mean a property owner who performs the work of a Prime Contractor.

2.2 Architect or engineer shall mean any person registered pursuant to section 81-847, Reissue Revised Statutes of Nebraska, 1943.

2.3 Building shall mean any structure which utilizes or will utilize a heating system, cooling system, or domestic hot water system including new buildings, renovated buildings, and additions, but not including any structure which has a consumption of traditional energy sources for all purposes not exceeding the energy equivalent of one watt per square foot.

2.4 Residential building shall mean a building three stories or less that is used primarily as one or more dwelling units.

2.5 Renovation shall mean alterations on an existing building which will cost more than fifty percent of the replacement cost of such building at the time work is commenced or which was not previously heated or cooled, for which a heating or cooling system is now proposed, except that the restoration of historical buildings shall not be included.

2.6 Addition shall mean any construction added to an existing puilding which will increase the floor area of that building by five percent or more.

2.7 Floor area shall mean the total area of a building, expressed in square feet, which is within the exterior face of the shell of the structure which is heated or cooled.

2.8 Standard shall mean Standard 90-75 of the American Society of Heating, Refrigeration, and Air-Conditioning Engineers, Inc., as it existed on April 23, 1980.

2.9 Traditional energy sources shall mean electricity, petroleum based fuels, uranium, coal and all nonrenewable forms of energy.

#### Section 3: Applicability of Standards.

3.0 The standard shall apply to:

3.1 New residential buildings on which construction is initiated on or after the effective date of this Resolution.

3.2 All renovations of or additions to existing residential buildings on which construction is initiated on or after January 1, 1982.

3.3 The standard shall not apply to buildings exempted under Section 4 of this Resolution.

Section 4: Exemptions:

4.0 The following shall be exempt from this Resolution:

4.1 Any building which has a peak design of energy usage for all purposes of less than one watt, or three and four-tenths British Thermal Units per hour, per square foot of floor area.

4.2 Any building which is neither heated nor cooled.

4.3 Any building or portion therof which is owned by the United States of America.

4.4 Any mobile home as defined by Section 71-4603, Reissue Revised Statutes of Nebraska, 1943.

4.5 Any manufactured housing unit as defined by subsection (1) of section 71-1557, Reissue Revised Statutes of Nebraska, 1943.

4.6 Any building listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

4.7 All residential buildings shall be exempt from lighting efficiency standards.

4.8 Any building, other than a residential structure, used for agricultural purposes and located on a farmstead of 20 acres or more and on which farm products of a value of one thousand dollars or more are normally produced each year.

# Section 5: Request for Approval of Alternative Building System.

5.0 Any person who owns or constructs a building to which this Resolution applies may request that an alternative building system, technique, equipment design, or building material be found equivalent to the Standard. The Building Inspector shall make such determination if he finds that the proposed alternative would not result in energy consumption greater than would result from the strict application of the Standard. If the Building Inspector fails to approve or disapprove the request within sixty days from the date of filing, it shall be considered approved.

#### Section 6: Inspections and Investigations.

6.0 The Building Inspector or any person disignated by him or her shall conduct inspections and investigations necessary to enforce the Standard, and may at resonable hours, enter into any building and upon any premises within its jurisdiction for the purpose of examination to determine compliance with this resolution. Inspections shall be conducted only after permission has been granted by the owner or occupant or after a warrant has been issued pursuant to sections 29-830 to 29-835, Reissue Revised Statutes of Nebraska, 1943.

6.1 During construction, the Building Inspector or persons designated by him or her shall make periodic inspections to assure compliance with this Resolution.

#### Section 7: Building Plans and Submission for Approval.

7.0 Prior to the construction of, renovation of, or addition to any building covered by this resolution, the Prime Contractor shall file sufficient plans and specifications with the Building Inspector to enable him or her to make a determination whether such building will comply with the Standard. The Building Inspector shall, within 30 days of the filing, approve or disapprove the plans and specifications. If disapproved, the reasons shall be set forth in writing to the Prime Contractor and the County Board of Commissioners.

7.1 If the Building Inspector determines that such construction, renovation or addition will comply with the Standard, he or she shall issue a written permit which the Prime Contractor shall display in a conspicuous place on the premises where the construction work is to be done. No construction, reonvation or addition shall commerce until a permit is issued and displayed as required by this section.

Section 8: Fees.

8.0 A fee will be collected by the County to cover the cost of inspections made necessary by this resolution.

8.1 These fees will be incorporated into the cost of a building permit and shall be set by the County Board of Commissioners.

8.2 In no event shall the fees charged for inspections requred under this Resolution exceed \$25 for residential buildings and one cent per gross square foot for other types of buildings.

#### Section 9: When an Architect or Engineer is Retained.

9.0 If an architect or engineer is retained, the architect or engineer shall place his or her state registration seal on all construction drawings which shall indicate that the design meets the Standard. The Prime Contractor shall certify that he or she will build in accordance with the Construction documents prepared by the architect or engineer. This certification must accompany the building plans submitted to the Building Inspector for approval.

#### Section 10: Violation; Penalty; Enforcement.

10.0 Any person violating any portion of this Resolution shall be guilty of a Class IV Misdemeanor and subject to a maximum fine of \$500 or a maximum sentence of three months imprisonment,

or both, as provided for by Chapter 81-1626 Revised Statutes of Nebraska, 1943.

# Section 11: Validity.

11.0 If any section of this Resolution or any part of any section shall be declared unvalid or unconstitutional, such declaration shall not affect the validity or constitutionality of the remaining portions thereof.

## Section 12: Repeal of Conflicting Resolutions.

12.0 All Resolutions or parts of Resolutions in conflict with this Resolution and standards as adopted therein and incorporated by reference are hereby repealed.

# Section 13: Effective Date.

13.0 This Resolution shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in book form and publication by reference in the official County newspaper.

WITNESSETH THAT:

WHEREAS, Dakota County, Nebraska, is receiving funds under the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, Project B-81-DS-31-0005, to establish a community development program; and

WHEREAS, said funds include sixty-one thousand, one hundred and eighty dollars (\$61,180.00) for housing rehabilitation loans; and

WHEREAS, expenditure of said funds is subject to statutory and administrative requirements of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and other appropriate federal agencies; and

WHEREAS, Dakota County, Nebraska, desires to retain the services of Equitable Federal Savings and Loan Association to perform certain administrative duties relative to the finances of a housing rehabilitation loan program established with said funds; and

WHEREAS: Dakota County, Nebraska and Equitable Federal Savingsand Loan Association are duly authorized to enter into this Agreement.

IT IS HEREBY MUTUALLY AGREED AND UNDERSTOOD AS FOLLOWS:

1. It shall be the responsibility of the County:

a. To design the housing rehabilitation loan program.

be. To advertise and market the housing rehabilitation loan program.

- c. To receive applications for assistance, review the recommendations of the Lender, and select borrowers.
- d. To prepare the housing rehabilitation loan applications, technical specifications, bid documents, construction contracts and other forms and documents pertaining to performance of the rehabilitation construction itself rather than financial administration of the loan agreement.
- e. To identify housing deficiencies and requred rehabilitation work items, solicit bids to
- perform the work and select a contractor subject to approval by the borrower.
- f. To perform the initial, in-progress and final housing inspections.
- g. To mediate any disputes between the borrower and the housing rehabilitation contractor.
- h. To establish the master filing and recordkeeping systems in accordance with Federal regulations.
- i. To submit the required progress reports and other correspondence to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and the State Historic Preservation Office relative to the structures rehabilitated through the program.
- j. To deposit housing rehabilitation loan funds with the lender to finance eligible loans.
- k. To review the Lender's recommendation concerning appropriate action to be taken by the Lender in the County's behalf relative to delinquent accounts.
- 2. It shall be the responsibility of the Lender:
  - a. To accumulate credit information on loan applicants and report the results including a credit recommendation in a form mutually agreed upon for use by the County in evaluating loan applications and selecting recipients.

	b.	To prepare all documentation relative to establishment of the loan agreement, such as a title opinion, lien search, proof of insurance, mortgage, filing of lien documents, etc. The specific documents shall be mutually agreed upon by the County and the Lender and all preparation costs shall be included in the loan amount as provided for in Part III.C. of the written Housing Rehabilitation Program.
	c.	To establish an escrow account for each loan after approval. Partial payments may be made from the account periodically upon the review and approval by the County of work completed. Payments will be made in the form of a check payable jointly to the borrower and the rehabili- tation contractor.

- 7. Use of funds. All rehabilitation loan funds received by the County under Project B-81-DS-31-0005 shall be deposited into the County's fund account for the purpose of making direct rehabilitation loans to property owners pursuant to the written Housing Rehabilitation Loan Program. Interest earned on any unobligated balance contained in the fund account shall be at market rates for deposits of similar maturity and size and shall be credited to the account and used for a like purpose. Similarly, all principal and interst earned on outstanding loans shall be deposited in the fund account and used for a like purpose.
- 8. Return of Unused Deposits. At the termination of the period of this Agreement, all funds under Project B-81-DS-31-0005 deposited into the County's fund account which remain unobligated (unemcumbered or not disbursed) shall be returned to the Federal Government via the County's letter of credit. This is not intended to include repayment of principal and interest earned on the fund itself. In addition, the County shall reserve the right to withdraw from the fund account any unobligated amounts required by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development in the exercise of corrective or remedial actions authorized under 24 CFR Part 570.910(b).
- 9. Amendments. It may be necessary from time to time to amend the responsibilities and services of the parties signatory hereto. Such amendments which are mutually agreed upon by and between the County and the Lender shall be incorporated in written amendment to this Agreement. While this Agreement calls for annual evaluation, amendments may be proposed by either party at any time.
- 10. Equal Employment Opportunity. There shall be no discrimination against any employee who is employed in the work covered by this Agreement, or against any applicant for such employment, because of race, color, religion, sex or national origin. This provision shall include, but not be limited to the following: employment, upgrading, demotion or transfer, recruitment or recruitment advertising, layoff,or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection for training, including apprenticeship.
- 11. Supersede. This Agreement supersedes any previous Agreement between the County and the Lender relative to the provision of services under project B-81-DS-31-0005.

- 6. Assist the owner and contracting authority in obtaining bids for each of the separate contractors for the construction of the project. We will also assist the owner and contracting authority in evaluating the bids and in assembling and awarding the contracts.
- 7. During the construction phase, we will consult with the appropriate owner and contracting authority officials and act with the owner and contracting authority's representatives as provided in the Standard General Conditions to the construction contract.
- 8. Make periodic visits to the construction site to observe the progress and quality of the executed work, and to determine, in general, if the work is proceeding in accordance with/the contract documents. An experienced and qualified inspector and/ or design professional from our office shall be provided to make the periodic visits to the site. The visits to the construction site will be sequenced so that the critical execution of the work and the quality of the work can be observed.
- 9. Review and approve shop drawings, samples, results of tests and inspections, and other data which the contractors are required to submit for conformance with the design concept of the project, and compliance with the specifications.
- 10. Issue any and all instructions of the owner and contracting authority officials to the contractor, and prepare routine change orders, as required.
- 11. Act as the interpreter of the requirements of the contract documents and judge the performance of the contractors as to the compliance with the contract documents.
- 12. Based on the on-site observations, review the contractor's applications for payment and determine the amounts owing the contractors, and approve, in writing, payments to the contractors in such amounts. The approval of these payments will constitute

a representation to the owner and contracting authority based on such observations and review that the work has progressed to the point indicated, and that to the best of our knowledge, information, and belief, the quality of the work is in accordance with the contract documents.

- 13. We assure you that the inspection of the work will be made by qualified, competent people in order to insure quality construction and protect the interest of the owner and contracting authority.

We propose to perform the engineering services on the HUD portion of the project, as previously outlined, for a lump sum fee of \$3,400 of which 70 percent will be done after the award of the contract. The balance of the fee will be due as payments are made to the contractor. This fee covers all of the engineering services, including construction observation. Furthermore, it is understood that the above-referenced engineering services would be performed contingent on the receipt by the owner and contracting authority of funds for the proposed water system improvements from the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

We have provided a space on this proposal for signature by the chairman of the Dakota County Board of Supervisors and the Mayor of the City of Dakota City, accepting the proposed agreement if the proposal meets with the approval of all parties involved. We would be pleased to perform these engineering services and would proceed with the project immediately upon receipt of notification to proceed.

Re: Approval of Pay Increases Question: You have asked whether or not the Board may approve salary claims which include salary increases approved by the various elected officials as of August 17, 1981, in light of the ruling made by the Commission of Industrial Relations in Case #410 filed July 15, 1981.

Answer: The Board may not approve the salary claims without subjecting itself to an action for contempt and the resulting penalties.

The Nebraska Commission of Industrial Relations in its order filed July 15, 1981, stated as follows:

"It is, therefore, Ordered that the Defendant (Dakota County) cease and desist forthwith from continuing its change in the wages of bargaining unit employees during the pendency of Case No. 386 and that the Defendant rescind all of its actions previously taken which fixed or approved any change in the wages of bargaining unit employees during the pendency of Case No. 386."

This office, in an application filed July 23, 1981, requested that a supersedeas bond be granted to stay the effect of the Commission's final order of July 15, 1981. However, the Commission refused to grant a supersedeas bond. The Commission's order is therefore is full force and effect and the County Board must comply with the order.

Section 48-819, R.R.S. 1943, as amended states:

48-819. Commission; Orders; Effect. Orders, temporary or final, entered by the Commission of Industrial Relations shall be binding on all parties involved therein and shall be deemed to be of the same force and effect as like orders entered by a district court and shall be enforceable in appropriate proceedings in the courts of this state. Failure on the part of any person to obey any order, decree or judgment of the Commission of Industrial Relations, either temporary or final shall constitute a contempt of such tribunal in all cases where a similar failure to obey a similar order, decree or judgment of a district would constitute a contempt of such tribunal, and upon application to the appropriate district court of the state shall be dealt with as would a similar contempt of the said district court.

This office is in the process of making an application to the Supreme Court of Nebraska for a supersedeas bond; however, there is no guarantee that the Supreme Court will grant a supersedeas. The Board must therefore act in compliance with the Commission's order, or subject itself to a possible contempt action.

I must point out, however, that our records show this to be a new company and you may want them to send us some samples of their work to check against state microfilm standards. Again, this is my estimate of the total and may not reflect the company's total estimated cost.

- b. \$70,063 United Business Equipment and Microfilm of Lincoln, Ne. This company has done microfilming for local Nebraska agencies and the film has been checked against state standards and found to be acceptable.
- c. \$70,641 Estimated from the bid sheet submitted by Koch Brothers of Des Moines, Iowa. Not enough information was provided for exact figures, this is rough estimate only.



#### AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT ENTERED INTO AS OF THIS DAY OF \_\_\_\_\_, 1981, BY AND BETWEEN DAKOTA COUNTY, NEBRASKA, HEREIN CALLED THE "COUNTY" AND THE SIOUXLAND INTERSTATE METRO-POLITAN PLANNING COUNCIL, HEREIN CALLED THE "CONTRACTOR".

WITNESSETH THAT:

WHEREAS, The County is receiving funds under the Housing and Community Development Act of 1971, Project B-81-DS-31-0005, to establish a community development program; and

WHEREAS, said funds are for the benefit of the residents of Dakota County, especially those residing in the unincorporated portion of the County, the City of Dakota City and the Village of Jackson; and

WHEREAS, expenditure of said funds is subject to statutory and administrative requirements of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and other appropriate federal agencies; and

WHEREAS, the County desires to retain the services of the Contractor to perform certain duties relative to administration and implementation of the community development program; and

WHEREAS, the County and the Contractor are duly authorized to enter into the Agreement.

IT IS HEREBY MUTUALLY AGREED AND UNDERSTOOD AS FOLLOWS:

1. It shall be the responsibility of the County:

- a. to approve applications for housing assistance based upon the recommendation of its selected lender.
- b. to engage a qualified individual to design the Dakota City water main and sanitary sewer improvements, oversee their construction, and inspect the resultant improvements for completeness.
- c. to retain the overall fiscal responsibilities for the grant in accordance with applicable laws and regulations, including, but not exclusively, the approval of all claims, warrants, requests for payments and other financial documents and forms.
- d. to perform the required closeout procedures, including, but not exclusively, to hire an independent auditor to perform the final program audit, and to resolve any audit findings or recommendations.
- e. to appoint a Fair Housing/Equal Opportunity Officer and Labor Compliance Officer to monitor compliance with applicable laws and regulations.
- 2. It shall be the responsibility of the Contractor:
  - a. to prepare a Final Application for program funds to undertake the community development program as well as the accompanying Housing Assistance Plan and Environmental Review Record.
  - b. to assist the County and its selected architect/engineer or `other qualified individual in preparation of bid documents, construction contracts, advertisements and other forms and documents deemed necessary to administer the Dakota City water main and sanitary sewer improvements projects. It is intended that the Contractor's role will be to insure consistency with program requirements.
  - c. to design an appropriate private rehabilitation leveraging program and assist the County and its selected lending institution innits establishment.
  - d. to prepare the housing rehabilitation applications, technical specifications, bid documents, construction contracts, advertisements and other forms and documents deemed necessary to administer the rehabilitation activities.
  - e. to perform the initial, in-progress, and final housing inspections.
  - f. to adsidt the County in soliciting bids to perform the housing rehabilitation work and select a qualified contractor subject to approval by the borrower.
  - g. to assist the County in mediating any disputes between the borrower and the housing rehabilitation contractor.
  - h. to assist the County in designing the community development program's accounting and master filing systems in accordance with Federal regualations.
  - i. to assist the County in providing for the accounting of funds, preparation of financial forms for drawdown and payment, and performance of other functions in the management of program finances as requested.
  - j. to assist the County in reviewing the selected lender's recommendation concerning appropriate action to be taken by the lender in the County's behalf relative to delinquent housing rehabiltation accounts.
  - k. to prepare the Performance Assessment Report at the program's completion and assist the County in the grant close-out procedure.
  - 1. to assist the Fair Housing/Equal Opportunity and Labor Compliance Officer in monitoring program compliance with applicable laws.

Roger Gruber, Koch Brothers, appeared before the Board and briefly discussed microfilming.

Bruce Hovey, Highway Superintendent; Lance Hedquist, South Sioux City Administrator and Leroy Satrang, engineer, appeared before the Board in regards to South Sioux City going through the County easement. Mr. Hedquist referred to this as the Foundry Road Project. There is presently a storm sewer along part of Foundry Road.

Mr. Satrang: We want to extend the storm sewer another 1500 feet toward the Missouri River.

Mr. Hedquist: The road ditch is there, we have the R.O.W. and there is a storm sewer in part of the road already.

Mr. Satrang: The road would be lowered an average of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  feet.

Mr. Garvey: Would it affect your snow removal, Bruce?

Mr. Hovey: Yes.

Mr. Culbertson: Maybe we could make a trade. They (South Sioux City) could maintain that road if they are getting the dirt from it.

Mrs. Hirschbach: I think Paul's idea would be good for both South Sioux City and Dakota County.

Mrs. Hirschbach asked Mr. Satrang and Mr. Hedquist to work with Mr. Hovey on the legal aspects.

The Board acknowledged receipt of the following letter from Tom Dowd, Union Attorney.

September 3, 1981

Maurice S. Redmond Dakota County Attorney P.O. Box 117 Dakota City, Nebraska 68731

Dear Maurice:

This will confirm our telephone conversation of September 2, 1981 wherein I approved the Court Journal Entry which you prepared pursuant to the direction of Judge John Whitehead. As discussed, the Court also directed Dakota County to recover the 3% increase given to the Sheriff's Department Employees, the 11.2% increase given to the Assessor Office Employees, and the general wage increase granted to all bargaining unit employees in July.

As suggested prior to the Septmeber 1, 1981 hearing, the Union would approve a 12% across the-board increase effective July 24, 1981 for all bargaining unit employees. In consideration thereof, the Union would approve the 11.2% increase for Assessor Office Employees and the 3% for Sheriff's Office Employees and thus eliminate the requirement that Dakota County take action to recover these payments. There was certainly no intention to work a hardship on the employees; however, the County was in error in unilaterally changing employees wages without approval of their collective bargaining representative. It is for this simple reason that the Union was required to file the action with the District Court of Dakota County by way of a Contempt proceeding in order to cause recognition to be made of the County's obligation to obtain Union approval with respect to bargaining unit employees prior to any increase in wages. While there may be philosophical differences of opinion as to the County's obligation to do so, I am sure you will concur that that is the status of the law of the State of Nebraska.

In any event, I feel that it would be in the best interest of the employees, elected officials, and taxpayers of Dakota County that representatives of the County Baord and elected officials return to the bargaining table with the Union and thereby acknowledge and fulfill their clear obligations under law. The Union has no right to determine the composition of Dakota County's bargaining committee; however, a committee should consist of a sufficient representative group so that tentative decisions and agreements can be made concerning all matters pertaining to wages, hours, and terms of employment for all bargaining unit employees. It may well be that the County would find a need to have representative from each elected office as well as a representative from the County Board at the bargaining table. The Union has no objections to such a composition. The employees of Dakota County have been denied their right under law to bargain with the County concerning wages, hours, terms and conditions of employment. They selected the Union under the democratic secret ballot prosess pursuant to law. Yet they had been denied the right to bargain and I believe that it would be in the best interest of the County to correct this unfortunate state of affairs.

Please advise after you have had an opportunity to consult with the County Board and involved elected office holders whether a 12% across-the-board increase effective July 24, 1981 for bargaining unit employees can be effectuated and thus avoid the necessity of recovering the previous wage increases from the effected employees. We will agree in that connection that by doing such will in no way effect your position on appeal before the Nebraska Supreme Court and shall no constitute an admission against interest. Thank you for your assistance and cooperation in this matter.

Voting Yea: Garvey, Morgan, Culbertson, Hirschbach, Rohde Unanimous motion carried 10:25 a.m. Mildred Jorgensen, County Welfare Director, appeared before the Board. She presented the Board with a Dakota County Policy for General Assistance County Poor Relief. The Board briefly reviewed the policy. Mr. Morgan: I recommend we adopt this policy at this time and then make the revisions as necessary. Culbertson moved, seconded by Garvey to adopt the Dakota County Policy for General Assistance County Poor Relief. DAKOTA COUNTY POLICY FOR GENERAL ASSISTANCE COUNTY POOR RELIEF INTRODUCTION General Assistance is a county tax supported program of public aid on a temporary basis for those persons not qualifying for other available support programs, and who do not have the financial means to meet essential and emergency needs. The Dakota County Board of Commissioners has adopted the following policies, and has assigned the responsibility of administration of these policies to the Dakota County Welfare Director. DEFINITION General Assistance shall mean payments made by the county to providers to meet essential and emergency needs of the recipient. Such assistance shall be reasonable and necessary under the circumstances and shall be in such amounts and made at such times as will, at the discretion of the county welfare board, meet the emergency or essential needs of the recipients of general assistance. General assistance will include only the following needs: 1. Food 2. Housing 3. Energy and Public Utilities 4. Medical

- 5. Burial Expense according to Statute 71-1002
- 6. Emergency Transportation

## ELIGIBILITY

Dakota County shall provide general assistance for the necessities of life to those poor persons who have a legal settlement within Dakota County and who are unable to earn a livelihood because of any unavoidable cause. A person shall meet the legal settlement requirement if he or she has resided one year continuously in the state of Nebraska and twelve months continuously in Dakota County. Section 68-115 shall be consulted for exceptions and rules governing minors. In the event that emergency aid is granted to a transient, the welfare director shall recover the funds from the county of his or her residence in accordance with Nebraska State Statute 68-113.

The following criteria shall be adhered to by applicants to be eligible to receive general assistance.

1. Applicant must demonstrate an emergency need for one or more of the items to be covered by general assistance. An eviction notice or utility shut-off notice will be required. Telephone services will not be considered for payment.

2. Applicant must provide sufficient information to allow the county welfare director to determine if the needs of the applicant are being provided by or being applied for under one or more of the following retirement or assistance programs:

a. Social Security

b. Social Security and S.S.I.

c. State of Nebraska Supplemental Income, AABD

d. Aid to families with dependent children

e. Unemployment compensation

f. Workmen's compensation

g. Veteran's pension or disability

h. All other public maintenance programs including veterans relief

i. The state program for emergency assistance to families with children to include provisions for catastrophic illness.

j. All earned and/or unearned income received by any member of the household to include child support, intermittent wages, gifts, civil service pensions and other private pensions.
k. A relative to include spouse, mother, father, son or daughter who is financially able shall be encouraged to provide support.

3. The Welfare Director shall utilize any special organizations such as Travelers Aid to provide emergency aid.

4. Only one payment will be made within any six month period for either rent or utilities.

#### LIMITATIONS

1. Rent payments shall not exceed \$140.00

2. Energy and utility payments shall not exceed \$65.00

3. Food shall be issued in accordance with food stamp standards. A grocery order shall be issued in lieu of cash.

4. The limitations shall be reviewed annually by the county welfare board.

5. The County Board of Welfare may, at its discretion, confide the care of a poor person to a house-holder or householders of good moral character. Every person to whom the care of any such poor person shall be entrusted shall execute a bond to Dakota County, conditioned that he or she will treat such poor persons with humanity, and provide him or her the necessary comforts of life, fitted to his or her condition. The bond shall state the sum to be paid by Dakota County for keeping such poor person.
6. The County Board of Welfare shall provide the necessary medical services for an eligible poor person. The physician and care facilities shall be authorized by the County Welfare Director prior to the receipt of treatment to the poor person. The County shall not be liable for the expense of medical treatment not authorized by the County Welfare Director.

7. General Assistance in an emergency may be granted by the County Welfare Director without prior authorization by the County Welfare Board except in cases involving unusual circumstances or policy considerations. 8. It shall be the intent of the County Board to provide short-term emergency relief only. In granting relief to any poor person, the County Board shall take into consideration the ability of the poor person to perform work. If such a person is strong and able-bodied, the County Board may require, as a condition prior to the granting of relief, such person to perform any county work or labor as will fairly compensate for the relief furnished. Such person shall be paid the federal minimum hourly wage.

9. The County Board shall not grant General Assistance in any case should the issuance of warrants cause the county expenditures to exceed the limitation imposed by statutes.

## RESOURCES

An applicant may be ineligible for general assistance if he or she has resources of any kind which may be converted into monies to purchase those needs for which assistance is being requested. The following exceptions will be allowed:

a. House and immediate real estate being used as a home by the applicant.

b. One currently licensed vehicle used for household transporation and any other vehicles necessary for employment of household members.

c. Household furnishings and personal belongings.

d. Life insurance with cash value of less than \$1000.00 per insured.

## DISPOSITION OF UNCLAIMED BODIES

1. An unclaimed body shall be remanded to the Nebraska State Anatomical Board in accordance with Nebraska State Statute.

2. An unclaimed body not accepted by the Nebraska State Anatomical Board shall be buried at county expense.

#### EMPLOYABILITY

An applicant shall be found ineligible for assistance unless he or she submits a statement of incapacitation from a physician, psychologist, or mental health agency; or can show evidence of active attempts to secure employment through job service and personal contacts. Suitable employment shall be determined entirely by physical and mental capabilities and not on training or previous work experience. The only exception shall be the need for the applicant to provide child care.

#### APPLICATION FOR ASSISTANCE:

Persons desiring to receive general assistance shall make written application to the county welfare director. Application forms will be available in the office of the director. The County welfare director shall provide the applicant written notice of approval or denial of the request with all reasonable promptness.

## DENIAL PROCEDURE - APPLICANTS RIGHTS

Should the application be denied, the applicant shall have 30 calendar days in which to request an administrative review of the finding. The review shall be made by the County Welfare Director and the applicant shall be notified within 10 working days following such request. The applicant has the right to be represented by any representative of his or her choice.

#### APPEAL PROCEDURE

If the applicant is not satisfied with the decision rendered following an administrative review, he or she may request an appeal hearing by the County Welfare Board. The applicant shall have been given, prior to the hearing, a written statement setting forth the reason for denial of benefits. The County Welfare Board shall allow the applicant or his or her representative to present further evidence or arguments to support claim for benefits. The applicant or representative shall be allowed to examine any evidential material used to make the welfare department's decision unless such evidence was labeled confidential by a professional person supplying such information. The applicant shall be given written notice of the County Welfare Board's decision as soon as practicable, showing the reasons for the decision.

The decision may be appealed a second time to the County Board of Welfare within 30 calendar days of receipt of such decision, if the applicant or representative has additional evidence to present in support of the application. Such notice of request shall be filed with the County Welfare Director. The County Board of Welfare shall render a written decision to the applicant as soon as possible following such hearing on the appeal.

It shall be the responsibility of the County Welfare Director to be aware of the published regualations of the State Director of Public Welfare establishing maximum payments for all health services furnished to recipients of General Assistance and to insure that the County does not exceed those maximum payments.

The County Welfare Director shall submit a monthly report to the County Board of all General Assistance relief granted. This report shall include the current monthly expenditures and summation of expenditures for the current fiscal year. A list of these expenditures including the names of the recipients shall be published monthly as part of the proceedings of the County Board of Commissioners.

Relocating the structure about 90 feet away would cost around \$6,000; replacing the dirt would cost about \$2,000 - \$2,500 or we could install a much taller pole and put it deeper in the ground at a cost of about \$6,000.

Mrs. Hirschbach: At Mr. Dorcey's direction, the County removed the dirt for Mr. Dorcey to put in bins or other sheds

Mr. Dorcey: They (County) needed dirt for the Hubbard-Jackson road and I told them they could get the dirt from there. I understood the County was to know how close they could go.

Mr. Rohde: I don't understond why N.P.P.D. doesn't just move the structure.

Mr. Bruer: This is a private easement; its not on the County line.

Lorraine Tillman, County Nurse, appeared before the Board. Mrs. Tillman: Our yearly contract with Marian Health Center is up. Marian Health Center provides a nurse aide and I provide skill nursing care. Each visit is \$19.00. Last year the County made \$2,107.00.

Morgan moved, seconded by Rohde the Board approve the following agreement with Marian Health Center.

## AGREEMENT

IT IS HEREBY AGREED BY AND BETWEEN MARIAN HEALTH CENTER, Sioux City, Iowa (hereinafter referred to as "Hospital"), and the DAKOTA COUNTY HEALTH DEPARTMENT SERVICE, Dakota City, Nebraska, (hereinafter referred to as "Health Department"), as follows:

WHEREAS, the Hospital is an acute care general facility desirous of administering a hospital Home Service Department, and

WHEREAS, the Hospital is desirous of providing a Hospice Program, and

WHEREAS, the Health Department possesses staff resources to administer skilled nursing services, and

WHEREAS, the parties are desirous of entering into this agreement,

IT IS HEREBY AGREED:

I. The Health Department shall refer to Marian Health Center Home Health Services Program those appropriate cases that have been referred to the Health Department who meet the criteria to be serviced by the Hospital.

Criteria for patient referral:

a. The patient lives in South Sioux City, Nebraska.

b. The patient could benefit from the multi-service aspect of the Hospital program.

c. A third party payor (Medicare, Medicaid, Blue Cross, etc.) can be billed for those services rendered.

d. The patient's physician approves of this transfer.

II. Skilled nursing services to be rendered can be furnished by the Hospital Director of Home Health Services or the Health Department, based on existing caseload of each R.N. These services will be rendered on the premises of the patient's residence as ordered by the attending physician under the coordination of the Hospital Director of Home Health Services.

III. The overall coordination and supervision of care provided to patients admitted to the Department of Home Health Services will be by the Director of the Hospital Department of Home Health Services and the Health Department agrees to provide the Hospital with the necessary documentation and information required for medical records purposes within one week subsequent to any and all home visits.

IV. In providing for the Hospice Program, the Health Department will make on-call skilled nursing visits in addition to visits made during regular hours. On-call shall be defined as those hours between 4:30 p.m. and 8:00 a.m. daily, and 2:00 p.m. and 8:00 a.m. on weekends and holidays.

The hospital agrees to provide necessary Hospice inservice, call supportive team conferences, and supply trained Hospice volunteers. The Hospice program will be evaluated at the end of a year.

V. All services performed by the Health Department shall be charged to the Hospital by the Health Department on a fee-for-service basis pursuant to a fee schedule to be agreed upon between the Hospital and the Health Department, a copy of which is attached hereto and by their reference made a part hereof. Monthly, the Health Department shall provide an itemized statement to the Hospital for services rendered by the Health Department.

VI. It shall be the responsibility of the Hospital to bill and collect from the appropriate third parties the amount charged for rendering of services by the Health Department.

VII. The Health Department shall hold harmless the Hospital from any civil liability, including court costs, attorney fees or any cost whatsoever incurred in defending against any demand, claim, or lawsuit against the Hospital for damages arising out of the conduct of Health Department personnel, agents, or designees, while performing the services which are subject to this agreement. Each part shall bear the full responsibility and legal liability, including all

legal and attorney expenses, which might arise out of the acts of omissions of the respective parties, their agents and/or designees; to the extent that such conduct on the part of either party imposes expense or costs upon the non-negligent party, the negligent party shall fully indemnify the non-negligent party for such expenses and costs.

VIII. Nothing in this agreement shall be construed to establish an employer-employee relationship between the Hospital and the Health Department. The Health Department shall be responsible for any workman's compensation liability that arises out of services performed under the agreement by Health Department agents or designees.

IX. In providing the subject services, as a part of the Department of Home Health Services of Marian Health Center, the Health Department agrees to operate under Home Health Services policies, cooperate with the departmental coordinator in the provision of services, the recording of treatments provided, and the ongoing assessment of the quality of medical care being provided, including periodic supervision of Home Health Aide Services as may be required by federal regulations, under the overall preview and jurisdiction of the organized medical staff of the Hospital.

X. This agreement shall be effective from the date of signing hereof and shall continue for a period of one year and from year to year thereafter until terminated. Either party may terminate this agreement upon ninety days' written notice to the other party.

Lloyd and Marvin ask that you consider alternates as to using their property. They do not want a public road.

Mr. Hovey: The shortest route would be to come up from the south, through the Game and Park's land.

Mr. Rohde: The shortest route would be through the Game and Parks.

Mr. Morgan: Is there any kind of road through the Game and Parks?

Mr. Bates: In the north side, but there isn't a section line there.

Mr. Fitch: Mr. Frisbie owns 80 acres to the west. If you go across Chaillie's, you would go across his. He is in favor of a road, the only one who is, of the surrounding land owners.

Mr. Bates: Mr. Frisbie said he would grant an easement.

Mr. Fitch: Something was mentioned about going in from the south. Going that route would be tough. There are canyons about 90' deep.

Mr. Hovey: We can't get through the Games and Parks either on the section line.

Mr. Fitch: Looking from the north, by Taylor Cemetary, it's quite a bit longer stretch across there, but it doesn't look like there are any deep canyons to go across.

Mr. Hohenstein: The Game and Parks Commission basically stated they would not be willing to do this voluntarily.

Mr. Fitch: I think you should have a 66' road.

Mr. Hohenstein: The statute states not more than 4 rods and no less than two.

Mr. Hovey: You couldn't possibly have a road narrower than 24'.

Mr. Morgan: The topography indicated that you probably can't follow a section line.

Mr. Fitch: All Mr. Bates needs is access but that it would still be a county road and the Board would have to determine how wide it should be to prevent liability.

Mrs. Hirschbach: Is there truly a viable route to this property unless we go through the Game and Parks land?

Mr. Bates: If you went through the Game and Parks, I would keep up the road.

Mr. Hovey: It's just about impossible no matter which way you go.

Mr. Hohenstein: It's my understanding that Mr. Bates pays damages to the property owner on which the road goes. The County is going to have to pay for the road and maintain it. This Board decides where the road shall be and establishes damages that Mr. Bates shall pay. The property owner has the right to appeal to District Court in respect to the damage issue.

Mrs. Hirschbach closed the public hearing at 11:30 a.m.

Mrs. Hirschbach: I don't think we are required to take action at this time. I suggest we look at the alternative of going across the Game and Parks property. We should look at the possibility of condemning the land to establish a road there. The Road Committee should meet with Mr. Redmond for an opinion. I would like that issue resolved before we look at any other alternatives.

Morgan moved, seconded by Rohde to adjourn. Voting Yea: Hirschbach, Rohde, Garvey, Morgan, Culbertson Unanimous motion carried 11:53 a.m.

Mrs. Hirschbach asked for reports of Officials, Boards and Committees.		
In regard to the drainage of the Boy Scouts Camp, Mr. Culbertson said the Road Committee believes Dakota County has no responsibility for the drainage because the entrance to the camp is in Thurston County.		
The Board received the following legal opinion from the County Attorney.		
COUNTY ATTORNEY'S OPINION		
REQUESTED BY THE HIGHWAY SUPERINTENDENT ISSUED DECEMBER 7, 1981		
Q: 1. If Harvey Bate's request for a new road is granted, who would bear the cost of obtaining right of way for the new road?		
A: 1. Harvey Bates.		
Section 39-1716, R.R.S. 1943, as amended, expressly states that the county board "is to appraise the damages to be suffered by the owner or owners of real estate over or through which the (public road) shall be laid." The cost of those damages is to be bourne by the person petitioning for the new road. The person petitioning for the road is to pay that amount to the county treasurer before the order laying out the new road is filed. Section 39-1718, R.R.S. 1943, as amended.		
Q: 2. If Harvey Bate's request for a new road is granted, who would bear the costs of the condemnation proceedings, and the engineering, survering, and construction costs of the road?		
A: 2. The County.		
The general rule is well-expressed in Section 39-1701, R.R.S. 1943, as amended: "All costs, expenses, and damages incurred (in county road building) shall be paid out of the general fund of the county or the county road fund." Section 39-1716, cited above, overrides the gen- eral provision in one specific category of expenses: " damages suffered by the owner" of the real estate through which the new road runs.		

In sum, the statutes mandate that the person petitioning for the road pay the condemnation prizes awarded to his neighbors, but the statutes do no say that that person has to pay for the cost of the condemnation proceedings or for the mechanical expenses involved in constructing the road. In the absence of specific legislation shifting those other costs to the petitioner, the general rule governs and the government must pay.

Q: 3. What is the procedure for acquiring right of way from the State Games and Parks Commission?

> The rule is stated in Section 39-1703, R.R.S. 1943, as amended: The county board \*\*\* may acquire land owned, occupied or controlled by the state or any state \*\*\* commission, whenever such land is necessary to construct, reconstruct, improve, relocate, or maintain a county road. \*\*\* The procedure for such acquisition shall, as nearly as possible, be that provided in Sections 72-224.02 and 72-224.03. Prior to taking land for any of the above purposes, a certificate that the taking of such land is in the public interest must be obtained from the Governor and the Department of Roads, and filed in the office of the Department of Administrative Services and a copy thereof in the office of the Board of Educational Lands and Funds. The damages assessed in such proceedings shall be paid to the Board of Educational Lands and Funds, and shall be remitted by that board to the State Treasurer for credit to the proper account.

In practice, then, the proceedings shall be "before a board of appraisers consisting of the Auditor of Public Accounts, the Commissioner of Education, and an appointed member of the State Real Estate Commission chosen by the Commission." Section 72-224.03(1). The County will have first filed a plat and a complete description of the lands to be acquired with the secretary of the Board of Educational Lands and Funds, and shall have given notice to the Governor and Attorney General of the Hearing date, "which shall not be less than ten days from the date of the filing" with the secretary of the B.E.L.F. Section 72-224.03(2).

At the hearing, both the County and the B.E.L.F. may present evidence and the board of appraisers will determine the amount of the condemnation award the County must pay. If we have any complaints, we are to take our appeal to the Lancaster County District Court. Section 72-224.03(4). (In point of fact, since 39-1703 required that we gain the consent of the Governor and the Department of Roads before the condemnation takes effect, the hearing before the board of appraisers will probably be a mere formality. If we do not have the approval of the Governor and Department of Roads aforehand, it would be futile to commence the condemnation proceeding.)

Q: 4. If Harvey Bates can acquire an easement on his neighbor's property that would connect his property to an existing county road does the County need to proceed any further?

Our office refrains from answering this question, as its resoltuion is a factual matter properly decided by the County Board. Section 39-1716, as interpreted by the Supreme Court in <u>Singleton vs. Kimball</u> <u>County Board of Commissioners</u>, 203 Neb. 429, 279 NW2d 112 (1979), says that the County must lay out a road if the County Board finds "that the conditions set forth in Section 39-1713 or 29-1714 exist." Those conditions are:

(1) That the Petitioner owns real estate within County.

(2) That the Petitioner's land is shut off from public roads by being surrounded by real estate belonging to other persons and/or by water; or that his only access to a public road is by an established private road less than two rods in width.

(3) That the Petitioner cannot purchase access to a public road from his neighbor at a non-exorbitant price.

(4) That the Petitioner's petition request that a public road be established for the Petitioner's use.

Judging from your question, the crux of the matter at hand is whether Harvey Bates, the petitioner in this instance, can demonstrate that Condition No. 3 exists. Section 39-1713 obliges him to tell the County Board the lowest price at which he can purchase access to his lot. If the Board decides that price is reasonable, the County may reject Deputy Bate's petition, but if the Board decides that Deputy Bates would have to pay an exorbitant amount to obtain an easement from his neighbors, the County has to proceed with the condemnation process against Deputy Bate's neighbor.

In a sentence, the determination of whether the Petitioner can purchase access to his lot only at an exorbitant price is reserved for the County Board, and this office will not venture an opinion upon that question of fact.

Ron Runge appeared before the Board in regard to the drainage on the Boy Scouts Camp.

Dan Rohde: Paul Culbertson, Bob Jacobsen, Bruce Hovey and I went down there. It looks to us like it's in Thurston County.

Mr. Runge: Then why has Dakota County assessed our taxes ever since we have had the land? Have you had it surveyed? The swale was put in by Dakota and Thurston County as a joint operation.

Mr. Culbertson: I know the people who live there and their car is licensed in Thurston County. Where is the swale?

Mr. Runge: It's on the Thurston-Dakota County line, is what I've been told. It was determined a long time ago. It seems to me it was put in in the 50"s.

Mr. Morgan: Bob (Garvey) and I investigated the law as far as it pertains to bidding. The law was changed in 1943 and again in 1965. In 1967 it was again revised and provides for a purchasing agent in counties with a population under 150,000. This leaves a lot of doubt about if our county is covered. Second, we have had an improper payment process here. I think there is the possibility of personal liability if we approve this claim. The Attorney General's opinion is just that - an opinion. At this point, if we continue to disapprove the claim, no one is out of any money. The claim has already been paid. I feel this is the best course of action to take on this matter. I strongly suggest we ask Jack Mills to consult with us at a meeting and talk to other County Officials to determine if they feel there is a problem here. We should push for clarification of this law by the Legislature.

Mrs. Hirschbach: I agree. I would prefer the law apply to our county as well. We have the authority to set a minimum and require bids over that amount. We have no power other than what the State gives us. Although I dislike the Attorney General's opinion, under the existing law, we don't have the authority. I think the law should be clarified. If I had to go with an opinion, I would prefer to go with the Attorney General's opinion. I assumed at the time, it would be operative and that was the point of soliciting it.

Hirschbach moved, seconded by Culbertson to approve the payment for the Sheriff's Department car.

Mr. Culbertson: What would happen if we would deny this opinion?

Mrs. Hirschbach: Legally, I don't know.

Mr. Morgan: I strongly feel the Legislature intended by include us under this \$5,000 limitation. The payment was made without the Board's approval. We could pass a resolution and let someone challenge it in court.

Mrs. Hirschbach: The Courts interpret the Statutes. In Nebraska, the County Governemnts have only the authority established by law.

Mr. Morgan: There is no mention that we cannot set up our own rules. All we would be doing is setting up a rule to say how we conduct our business.

Mrs. Hirschbach: Once the budget is approved, if there is an item not expressly listed, you would have to come to this Board. We need to look at where the Official's authority ends and the Board's begins.

Mr. Morgan: We have the authority to set the rules by which the item would be purchased.

Mr. Culbertson: I thought we expected that bids would be brought before us.

Mrs. Hirschbach called the question.

Voting Yea: Hirschbach Voting Nay: Rohde, Garvey, Morgan, Culbertson Motion denied.

Joy Nixon and Ted Piepho appeared before the Board for the discussion of official's salaries.

Mr. Piepho: I wish Bill (Whear) was here. It's hard for us to set here when there are three other officials involved. I would ask the Board to table action this week. It should be placed on the agenda next week and I feel the Board should make a decision then.

Mrs. Nixon: I would like the Board to consider the fact that we are a Class 4 county and the minimum slaary should be set at \$19,000.00.

Mrs. Hirschbach: But the assessed valuation and size are less than other counties with our population. We are working on a salary scale for the rest of the courthouse, why not for the officials?

Mr. Culbertson: We have a proposal from the Board and from the County Officials.

Mr. Morgan: I wouldn't recommend staggering at this time.

Mrs. Hirschbach asked if there were any comments from the audience on the proposed recommendations.		
Maurice Crofoot: Why is there such a difference in percentages of raises? Some are receiving a 7% raise, while others are getting 20%. You are all elected officials.		

Mrs. Hirschbach: The Commissioners do not put in nearly the amount of time the other officials do. Four years ago the Commissioners voted themselves a very healthy increase.

Mr. Crofoot asked about the Weed Board members salary being changed from \$25.00 per month to \$12.50 per meeting.

Mr. Morgan: It was recommended that we stay with a per meeting salary. There may be some months when you may not have to meet.

Mr. Crofoot: I think you should set the number of times we should meet.

Mr. Morgan: That should be up to you. You should meet whenever you have business to take care of. I think we should leave it at \$12.50 per meeting to comply with the statutes.

Mr. Crofoot asked if the Board received a counter proposal from the officials.

Mrs. Hirschbach: We did receive a second proposal based on recommendations from the other counties.

Bill Clausen: Do you have the authority to set the salary? If you set it at \$17,500, is that it?

Mrs. Hirschbach: No. We have the authority to build in an increase, which has to be done now. It cannot be changed.

Mr. Clausen asked how many hours the officials put in.

Mrs. Hirschbach: There is a variation in the offices. The courthouse is open from 8:00 to 4:30, but it is not uncommon for some officials to be here until 5:00. Board of Equalization hearings are often held in the evening and are attended by both the County Clerk and the County Assessor.

Mr. Clausen asked how many holidays are observed by the courthouse.

Mr. Morgan: Eleven official holidays.

Mr. Giese: These holidays are set by the Board.

Mrs. Hirschbach: The County currently has the same holidays as the State.

Mr. John Murphy: What is the total cost over-all under the Garvey-Morgan proposal?

Mr. Morgan: Roughly, it will be about \$42,000.00

Mrs. Hirschbach: County Government is big business. One hopes that by raising the salary you will attract competition. It's to your advantage that that be the case. The county does offer a lot in fringe benefits. We have an informal policy of 2 weeks vacation; we have single coverage for medical and workmen's comp is the same as the State plan. The proposed salaries were based on a study done by NACO. It was an extensive salary study which took into account a number of factors.

Mrs. Maurice Crofoot: By being here, do we have any bearing on what you will do today?

Mr. Morgan: Yes.

Mr. Crofoot: Let's keep all the control we can in our hands. It's our county. I'm not strictly against raises. The point I'm trying to get across is you fellows make the decisions here - we have elected you to control our county.

There was a question about the County sick leave policy.

Mr. Morgan: Through our Union Negotiations, we have established that 6 days a year be allowed. Every office varies,

Culbertson moved, seconded by Garvey the annual salary for the office of County Treasurer, County Clerk, County Assessor, County Sheriff, Clerk of District Court, County Commissioner, Superintendent of Education and Weed Board be established as indicated on the proposal recommended by the salary committee, to include the resolution of the 15% in regard to the Sheriff's salary.

Mrs. Hirschbach: County business is big business. I would have supported a higher base salary. I would prefer to see a flat increase pegged to the CPI. I do think these offices are very important. I realize there is no guarantee the present officials will be in office the next four years. I also think the Chairman of the County Board should be paid a somewhat higher salary than the rest of the Board members. Ted Piepho has been a great help to the County Board. He has taken on more responsibilities than he has to. Without one person in charge, things don't get done. The Chairman has to be prepared to put in more hours and assume more responsibility.
