Mr. Piepho: I think you should take into consideration fees other people get and also payment for extra hours. My deputy puts in extra hours and I don't pay her extra, because I feel she is paid a salary to do her job.

RE: Setting Wages for County Employees

Dear Board Members:

On January 14, 1985, this office received a request from County Board Member Gretchen Hirschbach to issue an opinion as to whether or not the County Board could enforce a 2% salary increase limitation on county employees' salaries, which may be contrary to the desires of the elected officials who employ those employees in their respective offices. I issued a verbal opinion at that time stating that it was my opinion that such a limitation could be enforced by the County Board imposing a 2% maximum salary increase on county employees. Since that date, this office has researched the matter further and has found an Attorney General's opinion issued April 23, 1983, Number 102, which specifically addresses this area. This opinion generally states that the elected county officials, and not the County Board, have the power to establish the salaries of the elected official's employees working in his or her respective offices. Quoting from the Attorney General's opinion:

> "From this case, it is clear that the county official and not the county board has the power to establish the salaries of the official's employees. Therefore, if the county board attempted to or did, in fact, negotiate a contract with employees of an elected county official concerning wages, this portion of the contract would not be binding on the elected official because the county board has no power to set wages for such employees and would be acting outside of its statutory authority. The same would be true of any terms of a contract negotiated by the county board when the determination of such terms is specifically left to the discretion of the elected county official."

It is now this office's opinion that the County Board may request that the elected officials comply with the 2% salary increase for their respective employees, however, the Board may not force such an elected official to comply with that request.

It is this office's opinion relative to acting on a claim submitted, that the County Board may approve in whole or part that claim.

Please govern yourself accordingly.



# COMMISSIONERS MEETING FEBRUARY 11, 1985 PROCEEDINGS BASEMENT MEETING ROOM DAKOTA COUNTY COURTHOUSE

Chairman Engel called their meeting to order at 1:00 p.m. Present: Bill Stone, Gretchen Hirschbach, Pat Engel, Charles Rush, Daniel Rohde, County Clerk Ted Piepho and Bev Gradert, stenographer.

Rush moved, seconded by Rohde to approve the minutes of January 28, 1985 as presented. Voting Yea: Stone, Engel, Rush, Rohde Abstaining: Hirschbach Motion carried

Arnie Mellick and several other Road Department employees appeared before the Board in regard to an article in the South Sioux City Star about county road maintenance.

Arnie Mellick: The main reason we are here is to find out why the Board doesn't back up the road crew. After the article appeared in the paper, we were jumped about who run the maintainer without a tire. Does the Board think we're that ignorant?

Mr. Engel: We have to check these things out first.

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Curt Greenfield: That particular day was the only day we plowed snow. I sent Walt Heinemann, with the new machine, north of Highway 20. Phil Jensen took Atokad and Tompkins Addition and that area. The new machine never went south of Highway 20 that day. To the best of our knowledge, the tire in the ditch fell off a truck.

Arnie Mellick: But couldn't you have backed us up?

Mr. Stone: We didn't have anything to back you up with.

Dick McNear: Can't you get the facts before it's printed?

Mrs. Hirschbach: I'm unhappy with the way it was handled. It was given the front page of the paper. I think it's typical of the Star. This was one man's story, he had no witnesse .

Mr. Stone: We would have had Curt here had we known what he was going to bring up.

Arnie Mellick: I've never seen anything in the paper about anything we've done right, except when Gretchen Hirschbach mentioned 2 years ago that we done good on snow removal.

Mr. Engel: Some things Mr. Gosch said didn't have clout.

Julie Goodsen: In defense, I've always said you could come to me, Mr. Mellick, when Union negotiations were going on and you never come to me. I just write the news, I don't create it. What Henry does with it, I have no control over.

Mr. Rohde: I don't think we have to listen to these people who come in and complain if they don't have proof it was us.

Phil Jensen: Couldn't you have called me that day?

Mrs. Hirschbach: Ray's (Reed) repair records prove it wasn't us. There are no tire repair records - it never happened.

Phil Jensen: Can I get a retraction? Those are my roads you're talking about.

Mr. Engel: Our feelings have been aired here today. Hopefully this won't happen again.

Stone moved, seconded by Rohde to allow the courthouse custodian to dispose of the following equipment:

- 1 wooden desk
- 1 hot water heater
- 3 wooden doors
- 1 pencil sharpener

Voting Yea: Hirschbach, Engel, Rush, Rohde, Stone Unanimous motion carried

Lester Fischer appeared before the Board. Mr. Fischer said he has been charged for 51 acres of cropland and he has been farming only 41 acres.

Mr. Spearman: Mr. Fischer was in. We showed him at 51 acres. We have made the correction for 1985.

Mr. Fischer: What about me paying on 51 acres when I've only been farming 41 acres?

County Attorney Bruce Smith: There's nothing you can do about that now.

Bruce Smith, County Attorney, appeared before the Board in regard to the agreements on Highway 35 from Dakota City to South Sioux City and the detour north of IBP. The revised agreement has been changed again. The detour cost provision has been eliminated. The agreement has been signed by Dakota City. It has to be signed by the Board and the City of South Sioux. The Board needs to determine what terms they will find acceptable.

Mr. Engel: What if the actual figure is more or less than \$160,000?

Mr. Smith: You can back out or renegotiate.

Mr. Rohde: Why are we hard-surfacing the road west of IBP?

Bruce Smith: The Department of Roads has informed us that it has to be hard-surfaced. It's part of the agreement. From a safety standpoint, the 4-lane is warranted.

Larry Albrecht: I talked to Tom McCarthy Friday. He indicated it would be a secondary detour. I agree with you that the 4-lane needs to be done. But do you believe it's a good investment for 4 or 5 months to pave the detour? I can't see the reasoning of the State to make us hard-surface it.

Mr. Engel: Once Dakota City is hardsurfaced, they have told us they don't want truck traffic over the new road.

Mrs. Hirschbach: Aaron Gosch made a comment about county forces doing work in South Sioux City. The property tax askings for the Road and Bridge Fund are \$428,012.00. South Sioux City pays 44.6%, Dakota City 5.2%, Homer 2.1%, Hubbard .7%, Jackson .9% and Emerson 1.0%.

Larry Albrecht: The project is fine in itself, but the detours at Wahoo and Wakefield were not paved.

Mrs. Hirschbach: Once the resurfacing is done, Dakota City will ban heavy truck traffic. They will have to take the road west of IBP.

Hirschbach moved, seconded by Stone to enter into the agreement with Dakota City, South Sioux City and the State of Nebraska.

#### AGREEMENT

PROJECT NO. RS-35-4(109), STATE CONTROL NO. 30785 COUNTY OF DAKOTA CITY OF DAKOTA CITY CITY OF SOUTH SIOUX CITY STATE OF NEBRASKA, DEPARTMENT OF ROADS HIGHWAYS N-35 AND US-20B IN DAKOTA COUNTY

THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into by and between Dakota County, Nebraska, hereinafter referred to as the "County", the City of Dakota City, Nebraska, hereinafter referred to as "Dakota City"; the City of South Sioux City, Nebraska, hereinafter referred to as "South Sioux City," the above collectively referred to as the "Local Governments;" and the State of Nebraska, Department of Roads, hereinafter referred to as the "State."

### WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the State desires to remove a portion of Highway N-35 and US-20B in Dakota County from the State Highway System, and

WHEREAS, the Local Governemtns are agreeable to the removal of the above said highways from the State Highway System with the stipulation that certain improvements be made to, or be provided for, said Highways by the State, and

WHEREAS, the State is willing to make and provide for certain improvements, under the following terms and conditions.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of these facts, the parties hereto agree as follows:

<u>SECTION 1</u>. The State agrees to prepare all necessary plans and specifications, advertise and conduct a letting, receive bids and construct improvements to Highways N-35 and US-20B during calendar year 1985, all at no cost to the Local Governments. Said improvements will consist of resurfacing Highways N-35 and US-20B beginning at the intersection of Highways N-35 and US-77 west of Dakota City eastward to 14th Street in Dakota City, thence north to 9th Street in South Sigux City, including surfaced shoulders where practical, with the exception of: (1) the 4-lane roadway under and each side of the I-129 Bridge, which will not be resurfaced; (2) and the 2-lane roadway between the IBP plant and the I-129 Bridge, where a thin 24 foot width overlay will be laid.

<u>SECTION 2</u>. The County further agrees to prepare all necessary plans and specifications, purchase necessary right of way, advertise and conduct a letting, receive bids and construct a 4-lane roadway replacing the existing 2-lane roadway between the IBP Plant and the I-129 Bridge. Said construction shall be accomplished in calendar year 1986. The selection of low bidders and the awarding of a contract or contracts shall be concurred in by the State prior to award. Said contract or contracts shall be signed by the County. The County shall submit the plans and specifications for this project to the State for review a minimum of 4 weeks prior to the bid letting. The County shall also submit any engineering contracts or utility agreements to the State for review prior to any engineering or utility work beginning. The County shall further submit all right of way appraisals to the Right of Way Manager of the Department of Roads for review prior to any negotiations for the purchase of said right of way. The State shall approve the amount of the offer. Any settlement in an amount in excess of the written offer shall be at the discretion of the County. In the event of such settlement, the County shall provide the State a written justification for such increase.

<u>SECTION 3</u>. The State agrees to reimburse the County, on an actual cost basis, for the construction of the above said 4-lane roadway, up to a maximum cost to the State of \$1,300,000.00, which amount shall not be exceeded without the prior approval of the State. Said actual cost shall include preliminary engineering, ritht of way, nonbetterment rehabilitation of eligible utilites currently occupying private right of way, construction egineering and construction. The county may submit monthly progress estimates during the progression of this project and the State agrees to pay the County within thirty (30) days after receipt of said progress estimates. Upon completion of the 4-lane roadway and final costs have been determined, the County shall submit a final detailed statement to the State showing the final actual cost of the improvement, less the previous billings to the State. The State agrees to pay the County within thirty (30) days after receipt and audit of the final statement by the State. The estimate of cost of this project, in the amount of \$1,300,000.00 is attached hereto, identified as Exhibit "B" and hereby made a part of this agreement.

The County shall maintain all books, documents, papers, accounting records and other evidence pertaining to costs incurred and shall make such material available at its office at all reasonable times during the contract period and for three (3) years from the date of final payment under this agreement; such records to be available for inspection by the State, or any authorized representatives of the state, and copies thereof shall be furnished by the County if requested.

SECTION 4. When resurfacing is completed, the existing Highway N-35 from the intersection of Highways N-35 and US-77 west of Dakota City eastward to 14th Street in Dakota City, thence running north to 9th Street in South Sioux City, which includes existing Highway US-20B from I-129 north to 9th Street in South Sioux City, shall be removed from the State Highway System and jurisdictional responsibility for these portions of existing Highways N-35 and US-20B transferred to the Local Governments in accordance with the jurisdictional responsibilities as shown on Exhibit "A", attached hereto and hereby made a part of this Agreement. The State will provide written notification to the Local Governments of the completion of the resurfacing.

The term "jurisdictional responsibility" shall, for the purpose of this Agreement, include all operational and maintenance activities.

# JOINT CONTRACT

This joint contract made and entered into this \_\_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_\_, 1985, by and between the CITY OF SOUTH SIOUX CITY, NEBRASKA, THE CITY OF DAKOTA CITY, NEBRASKA, and THE COUNTY OF DAKOTA COUNTY, STATE OF NEBRASKA.

WHEREAS, the parties hereto have previously agreed to commence proceedings to improve and pave a portion of the public right of way located in Dakota County, Nebraska; and

WHEREAS, the improvement of said public right of way is necessary to provide a detour for the joint improvement of State Highway No. 35 between Dakota City, Nebraska, and South Sioux City, Nebraska; and

WHEREAS, the improvement of said right of way is for the mutual advantage of the parties and will correspond to geographic, economic and population factors influencing the needs and development of the parties hereto; and

WHEREAS, the entire project, including the improvement of State Highway No. 35 will provide the ability for industrial and commercial development which will have a positive economic impact on the parties hereto; and

WHEREAS, the governing body of each of the aforesaid governmental subdivisions has duly adopted an ordinance or resolution authorizing the execution of this joint contract pursuant to the provisions of the Interlocal Cooperation Act of (Section 23-2201 to 23-2207, RRS).

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority of said Act of the Legislature of the State of Nebraska and pursuant to the authority and direction of the ordinances and resolutions hereinabove referred to, adopted by each of the governmental subdivisions who are parties hereto, and in consideration of the mutual covenants and undertakings herein contained:

IT IS HEREBY COVENANTED AND AGREED by and between the aforesaid governmental subdivisions and each of them, and each of their successors, as follows:

1. This contract is specifically entered into by the governmental subdivisions for the purpose of paving and otherwise improving a portion of the public right of way designated as County Road No. \_\_\_\_\_, and more particularly described as follows:

That portion of the public right of way located on the center line of sections 4 and 5, Township 28 North Range 9 east of the 6th P.M. Dakota County, Nebraska, commencing at a point of its intersection with the railroad right of way near the IBP, inc., facility and continuing west to the Highway No. 77 Bypass.

2. The term of this joint contract shall be forea period of ten (10) years from the date of execution hereof, unless sooner terminated. This joint contract may be terminated prior to the expiration of such term upon repayment by the County of Dakota, State of Nebraska, of all funds provided by the other parties hereto and upon the adoption of a resolution to that effect by the governing bodies of the governmental subdivisions who are parties hereto. Such termination shall not be made effective prior to repayment of all funds provided by the City of Dakota City and the City of South Sioux City.

3. It is not anticipated that there will by any property owned jointly by the parties which must be disposed of at the time of termination; however, in the event that there is property owned jointly by the parties, it shall be sold in the manner prescribed for the sale of property owned by counties in the State of Nebraska and the funds divided between the parties hereto equally.

4. This agreement does not establish a separate legal entity to conduct the joint undertaking; however, a joint board is hereby established which shall be responsible for administering the joint undertaking. The governing body of each governmental subdivision executing this contract shall, on or before March 1, 1985, appoint one representative as its member of the joint board. Written notice of such appointment together with a copy of the written acceptance of the appointee shall be given by the clerk of each appointing governmental subdivision to the County Clerk of Dakota County, Nebraska. The joint board shall meet as required to oversee and administer the project.

5. Funds for construction of the project shall be initially contributed as follows:

City of South Sioux City, NE-----\$100,000 City of Dakota City, NE.----\$20,000 IBP, Inc.----\$40,000

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These funds shall be used by the joint board for the paving and improvement of the segment of public right of way described herein. It is understood and agreed that the public monies contributed by the City of South Sioux City and the City of Dakota City are not tax funds raised by levy upon property within their jurisdiction but are funds accumulated during the year 1984 from the proceeds of the state authorized lotteries conducted by each of said cities.

6. The funds contributed by the City of South Sioux City, Nebraska, and the City of Dakota City, Nebraska, are for initial capital improvements and are to be repaid to each of said cities as follows:

(a). Payment to the City of South Sioux City shall be over a ten (10) year period by the County of Dakota, State of Nebraska.

(b). Payment to the City of Dakota City, Nebraska, shall be over a four (4) year period by the County of Dakota, State of Nebraska.

The funds contributed by the City of South Sioux City shall bear interest at the rate of five (5%) percent per annum. The funds contributed by the City of Dakota City, Nebraska, shall bear interest at the rate of five and one half  $(5\frac{1}{2}\%)$  percent per annum. Said money shall draw interest from the date of their deposit with the joint board for use in the capital construction of said project. The funds shall be repaid to each of said cities on or before the dates according to the following schedule:

It is understood that the foregoing schedule of payments are for reduction of principal only, and that annual interest payments will be made to each of the respective cities upon each principal payment due date, said interest being computed on the principal balance remaining from time to time unpaid.

In the event that the bids received for paving and improving said public right of way and the engineering fees (including design and inspection) and all other costs connected with the project exceed a total of \$160,000 this contract shall be null and void, <u>Provided</u>, however, that the parties hereto may agree to continue with the project at the cost then determined, upon adoption of an ordinance or resolution authorizing expenditure of funds in excess of \$160,000 and upon contribution of the additional funds by said cities and IBP, Inc.

7. The parties hereto, during the time of construction of said improvements will obtain, either jointly or separately, public liability insurnace with a single limit of \$1,000,000 dollars to protect against any and all liability, claims, damages and expenses that may result from the construction of this improvement.

8. The joint board shall have responsibility and authority as it concerns construction of the improvements in this project. Such responsibility and authority shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

(a) The employment of an engineer, or engineering firm with competence and experience in the design and construction of roads for heavy industrial traffic.

(b) Cause to be prepared plans, specifications and cost estimates, contractors' proposals and contract documents for the project.

- (c) Advertise for bids for the construction of said improvements pursuant to the provisions of Section 73-101 R.R.S., et. seq. In addition, the engineers shall make an estimate of the cost of labor and material for said project prior to advertising for bids. The joint board shall advertise for bids which advertisement shall be published at least ten days in the South Sioux City Star prior to the date for receiving bids.
- (d) Contract for the improvements in the event that the bid meets all requirements contained herein.
- (e) Negotiate for temporary or permanent acquisition of additional right of way necessary for the construction of said improvements.
- (f) Provide for the relocation of any utilities necessary for construction of the improvements.
- (g) Provide for the relocation of any presently existing traffic using the facility to be improved.
- (h) In the event that there are additional costs in the authorized work due to extra work or material which may be required then, prior to proceeding therewith, the joint board shall request each of the parties hereto, in writing, to approve such extra work for payment, setting forth detailed justification therefore.
- (i) The joint board shall keep accurate records of its costs, and such records shall be made available at all times for inspection by the parties hereto.

After completion of the improvement, the County of Dakota agrees to assume responsibility for the maintenance, control and operation of the improved roadway and any appurtenant traffic control devices.

9. The members of the joint board shall not be entitled to receive compensation from the board for their services.

10. If any provision of this contract is determined to be invalid, such invalidity shall not affect the other provisions of this contract which can be given effect without the invalid provisions. Each provision of this contract is declared to be severable.

PUBLIC HEARING LIQUOR LICENSE APPLICATION ERNEST HARRIGFELD d/b/a JACKSON MARINA APRIL 8, 1985 Chairman Engel opened the Public Hearing on the Liquor License Application of Ernest Harrigfeld d/b/a Jackson Marina at 1:30 p.m.

Norris Leamer, attorney and Ernest Harrigfeld appeared before the Board.

Mr. Leamer: The Harrigfeld's are applying for a Retail Beer On/Off Sale License. This is not the first time the Harrigfelds have applied here. In the past, there have been only two factual objections. Number one was that it would be difficult for law enforcement to patrol the area and second, the road to the Marina is undesirable. I don't think either of these stands up. The fact that it's 16 miles from the courthouse shouldn't have anything to do with it. The County's jurisdictional boundary extends to Emerson, which is 20 to 25 miles away. We are anticipating trouble here and there is no evidence there has ever been trouble here. The Harrigfeld's have never had to call the law enforcement in all the years they've been there. They have called the rescue squad several times. It's a convenience to the public that they are located there.

- Mr. Leamer asked Mr. Harrigfeld what his income is.
- Mr. Harrigfeld: Twenty-two to thirty thousand.
- Mr. Leamer: What percentage of your customers are asking for beer?
- Mr. Harrigfeld: A big percentage.
- Mr. Leamer: Do they bring their own beer with them now?
- Mr. Harrigfeld: Yes.

- Mr. Leamer: How many people are across the river at Minor's Bend?
- Mr. Harrigfeld: I would guess between 50 and 100 families during the weekend.
- Mr. Leamer: How far are you from Thacker's dock in South Sioux City?
- Mr. Harrigfeld: We're 11 to 12 miles from Thacker's dock.
- Mr. Leamer: Do you intend to run your business year-round?

Mr. Harrigfeld: No. When the season slacks off, we close because most of our business is from river traffic.

Mr. Leamer: Did the liquor inspector look over your area?

Mr. Harrigfeld: Yes.

Mr. Leamer: Did he see any improvement to be made?

Mr. Harrigfeld: No.

Mr. Leamer: Will you be able to continue your business if you do not have a beer license?

Mr. Harrigfeld: We're on the border line of making or breaking.

Mr. Leamer: Where is your residence?

Mr. Harrigfeld: South Sioux City.

Mr. Leamer: Is the road to the Marina used for school buses?

Mr. Harrigfeld: No.

Mr. Leamer: Is it a mail route?

Mr. Harrigfeld: Yes.

Mr. Leamer: Who maintains the route?

Mr. Harrigfeld: Dakota County.

Mr. Arndt, former owner of Sportsmans, appeared before the Board.

Mr. Leamer: How many years were you in operation?

Mr. Arndt: Seven and one-half years.

Mr. Leamer: When did you sell out?

Mr. Arndt: Two years ago the first of May. I had an on-sale only license.

Mr. Leamer: How far is Sportsman's from the courthouse in Hartington?

Mr. Arndt: Twenty miles.

Mr. Leamer: Were there any law enforcement problems?

Mr. Arndt: No.

Mr. Leamer: Did you ever have to call the law enforcement?

Mr. Arndt: No.

Mr. Leamer: What percentage of your business come by boat?

Mr. Arndt: About 60%.

Mr. Leamer: Did the boaters cause any problems?

Mr. Arndt: No.

Mr. Leamer: How far downstream is the next place where beer is available?

Mr. Arndt: 50 miles at South Sioux.

Mr. Leamer: Do you feel it was necessary to have beer to run your operation?

Mr. Arndt: Yes.

Mr. Leamer: Were you ever denied a license?

Mr. Arndt: Yes, the first time I applied. I applied again and it went right through.

Chairman Engel asked if anyone present was in opposition to the license.

Loy Todd appeared before the Board.

Mr. Todd: I'm a lawyer and I reside in Lincoln. I'm a property owner  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile from the Jackson Marina. I represent a group that has become better known because of the number of times we've been here. We have no quarrel with the Harrig-felds. They've been good neighbors. It's simply a very poor location for an establishment to sell beer. It's a very remote area. It's very difficult for law enforcement to patrol the area. The road is not geared up for traffic. I have a petition here with over 70 signatures of property owners and residents in this area. I don't believe it's in the best interest of this County to have beer available for people in South Dakota. It's a nice place for people to go. There are already plenty of containers in the road ditches. We would ask you to consider the interests of the property owners in the area.

Dorothy Fiscus: We have owned property in the area since 1966. We have enjoyed eating at Herrigfelds. The biggest reason we're against the liquor license is because everyone seems to bring what they want to drink. We're not looking forward to having more beer out on the river and road. We have nothing against the family. They are very nice people.

Louis Knudsen: A few years ago, some drunks come down the road from Herrigfelds and run through our fence. We have nothing against the Herrigfelds but what about the next owner who comes in.

Mr. Leamer: If there are problems, we have laws to enforce them. The guy from Sportsman's just told you that you don't have all those problems. As far as liter, I pick up a few beer cans in my front yard, but I don't blame the Southward, the Paddock or the Dry Dock. This is a normal country road. It's quite a bit an all-weather road. We're anticipating things that won't happen. Mr. Harrigfeld would be under the supervision of the liquor commission and

this county. If he sells the place, he can't sell the license. The new owner would have to apply for a license. I would ask the board to be respectfull to both sides.

Judy Simoni: We have a cabin on the South Dakota side. We'd hate to see this place close. A lot of people depend on them for gas. We enjoy going there to eat.

Chairman Engel closed the hearing at 2:05 p.m.

Claudette Brower: Wouldn't Ernie and Paula have more control with a license? If Ernie thought someone had too much to drink, he wouldn't sell them any more.

County Attorney Bruce Smith: It's in his discretion. You have the right to throw the person out if you feel he's had too much to drink and wants to continue to drink.

Mr. Engel: We're not the final say anyway. The State Liquor Control Commission makes the final decision.

Mr. Smith: The State wants a recommendation from the Board.

Pat Sullivan: I live along the road going to Herrigfelds. It's kind of like a highway out there on Friday, Saturday and Sunday. If people didn't have to tote their own beer along, you wouldn't have the liter problem.

Paula Herrigfeld: I want to make it clear that other than Friday night, 90% of our business is off the river. We couldn't make it without the boaters.

Rush moved, seconded by Rohde to make a favorable recommendation to the Nebraska Liquor Control Commission for the issuance of Retail Beer On and Retail Beer Off Sale Licenses for Ernest Herrigfeld d/b/a Jackson Marina. Voting Yea: Rush, Rohde Voting Nay: Stone, Hirschbach, Engel Motion denied

Mr. Leamer: We have no objection to the \$44,000 figure, but surely not \$170,915. It's a gross error.

Mrs. Hirschbach: I'm under the impression the County Board has no authority to change values.

Mr. Leamer: You do. The law says you can.

Mr. Smith: I'm of the opinion the Board has no authority to do anything with this today.

County Attorney Bruce Smith and Dick Brown, Probation Officer, appeared before the Board in regard to the law library.

Mr. Smith: Kurt Rager and I went and cleaned out the library to see what space requirements we need. We came to the conslusion that there is not enough room to put the current active series in the present library. I think you owe it to the County to provide a decent space for county offices, to show some consideration for a law library. I'm convinced that if it's improved, the law library would be used.

Mr. Brown: I would ask that you take into consideration the number of people we see. To enjoy the facility where we work, means quite a bit to us.

Mrs. Hirschbach: In fairness, the gravel we buy should be the gravel we specified.

Mr. Larson: Curt, do you think we're meeting the specs?

Mr. Greenfield: I can't answer that right now.

Mr. Larson: When we bid, we attached our specs to the bid. It was discussed that we bid an alternate. We produced the product because you wanted it. I feel we have done what you wanted and we have spent a lot of money to do it.

Mr. Stone: I never thought at any time that we were getting anything other than what was in our advertised specs.

Russ Johnson: We started production because you wanted the material. It indicates we've been courser by about 7% and it's an improved material. It's not pea gravel as you specified. The stuff you wanted just rolls around on the road and off into the ditch.

Mr. Engel: I'm going to turn this over to the Deputy County Attorney. I feel we don't want any more of this stuff.

Mr. Luebe: My thoughts are if the Board doesn't want anymore of this gravel, you should set a certain time limit for meeting the specs or declare the contract void, or you could negotiate on a price. It's not what you asked for. It doesn't meet those specs.

Mrs. Hirschbach: I would prefer that we do not buy any more gravel for one week and have the County Attorney meet with the Road Committee and come back with a recommendation.

Mr. Larson: It means a lot of money for us to shut down. As I said, the specs were attached to your bid. This is a very costly matter for us.

Hirschbach moved, seconded by Rush that the county does not buy any more gravel for one week. Voting Yea: Rohde, Stone, Hirschbach, Engel, Rush Unanimous motion carried

Mr. Larson requested that the specs be attached to their bid.

Harold Higman Jr. of Higman Sand & Gravel appeared before the Board.

Mr. Johnson made reference to Iowa Class C Gravel. We hired Midwest Testing Co. to take samples. They took two samples from trucks at the dump site last week. Neither one passed the Iowa Class C specs. I would like to make note of the Quality Control paragraph in the specs. It says "The materials shall be tested by the county at their discretion to assure adherance to these specifications. Any deviations in the gradation above or below the specified range of sieve sizes shall constitute full rejection of the runs involved." I guess Weaver intended to exceed the specs and it says "any deviations in the gradation above or below, shall call for full rejection and I would like to make the Board aware of that. We were not given the chance to bid an alternate.

Mr. Stone: You were not given the chance to bid an alternate?

Title opinions from the county attorney for Dakota County on the validity of each grantor's ownership, and an identification of encumbrances thereon are acceptable. It's important that you get going on this project. We have heard rumors that the money is running out. We are ready to go on it with the exception of the real estate documents. We're looking at 6 weeks at the soonest to be able to get a contractor on the job. We have three projects under Section 14, which is fully Federal Funds. The local government agency is responsible for paying for the acquisition of the real estate documents. On the Wigle Creek project, we have done a study to see if it's justifiable. The initial appraisal report is in Washington waiting for approval so we can prepare plans and specs. We have looked at Elk Creek near Willis. John is working on the initial appraisal report. Section 55 is a Streambank Erosion Technical Assistance Program. All of it is paid for by the local agency. We will give the landowner knowledge on how to solve the problem. The private landowner has to have a government agency act as the agent for them.



Mrs. Hirschbach: We are in receipt of a letter from Loy Todd that he wishes to have entered into the record along with a copy of the petitions signed by a number of area residents. Is there a motion to enter the letter and petition into the record.

Rohde moved, seconded by Stone to enter into the record the letter from Loy Todd and the petition. Voting Yea: Rohde, Stone, Hirschbach, Rush Absent: Engel Motion carried

Mrs. Hirschbach read the following letter from Loy Todd.

June 18, 1985

County Commissioners Dakota County Court House Dakota City, NE.

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### Commissioners:

As you may recall, I am a property owner in Dakota County and representing a group of property owners and taxpayers of Dakota County who are opposed to the liquor license application at the Jackson Marina. Many of my client's names appear on the attached petitions in opposition of the license. We have appeared before this body on several occasions in the past to oppose various liquor applications, the most recent being several weeks ago.

When the Nebraska laws regarding the procedure for license applications were adopted, a key factor in the application process was citizen input. Unfortunately, the applicants in this matter have found a way to attempt to circumvent that citizen input by the endless stream of applications for this particular license, either through themselves or their tenants.

The latest maneuver is one which is particularly disgusting in that only days before the hearing before the Liquor Commission, the application was withdrawn with a new application immediately being filed. It is obvious that the plan is to continue to wear down and exhaust the resources of the protestants. It is not a new tactic and one which the Liquor Commission has obviously seen before.

We believe that the hearing, as conducted by the Commissioners, was fair and the decision was fair and we are prepared to go to Lincoln and again resist this inappropriate and unnecessary intrusion. We are now faced with a dilemma. If we again organize and use our resources and energies to resist on a local level and then again prepare for a hearing before the Nebraska Liquor Commission, it is obvious that the applicant can again withdraw and then refile the same. Therefore, we have decided that the only reasonable approach will be for us to simply wait and force the applicant to appear before the Nebraska Liquor Commission with or without your recommendation. You can rest assured that we will be there and will again protest the issuance of this license.

We are well aware of the fact that the applicant's property will be much more valuable for sale if it had a liquor license. We are also aware that our property will be much less desirable and valuable if the license is granted. This board in the past has agreed with the Nebraska Liquor Commission and with the Nebraska Supreme Court that the applicant's location is undesirable and a dangerous place to have any such license. There has been no change of circumstances that should allow any different result, and this application should be denied.

We, as a group, are not opposed to liquor and not opposed to the current practice at the Jackson Marina. We are opposed to an expansion of that facility which would encourage more traffic, more liquor consumption, and more people coming to this remote location for the purpose of consumption of alcohol as opposed to dining. We are confident that past and present law enforcement officials recognize the danger and obvious risks of having an on-sale facility at a location so remote from the nearest law enforcement agency.

We expect that, as in the past, many South Dakota and Iowa residents will appear in support of the application. We would point out to the Commissioners that these residents have to either drive by their state's liquor establishments or Nebraska liquor establishments in order to arrive at the Jackson Marina. If the residents of South Dakota or Iowa need a liquor facility, we suggest that they approach their respective state. We note that there are restricted hours and restricted access roads to the residential properties on the South Dakota side of the river. These no doubt are to protect them from the various types of traffic and nuisances that will be created if this license is granted. Make no mistake about it. There is no shortage of liquor, either by road to the Jackson Marina or upon the Missouri River during the summer. We, as residents and taxpayers, do not want a facility encouraging drinking traffic up to and including 1:00 in the morning in this private and remote area.

You will note doubt hear testimony that the facility is clean and well run and a nice place for people to be. With that, we do not disagree. The problem is that the facility will change and then no longer be anything even remotely resembling what exists there today. The applicant has apparently convinced many people that they will be forced to close in the event they are not granted this license. The testimony in the prior hearing would indicate that there is more than sufficient money being earned from gasoline sales and meals to keep the facility open to the public. A liquor license application should be based upon factors other than whether a person is making as much money as they want selling gas and food. Recent repairs to the dock seem to fly in the face of any intent to close. We believe the prior testimony was that income from food sales was in excess of \$30,000.00. When you add that to the obvious gasoline sales, that is substantial income for a seasonal business. It should be based upon the need of the residents of Dakota County, and clearly there is no such need.

Comparisons have been attempted to another restaurant on the river. We believe these comparisons are inappropriate recognizing that the Jackson Marina will draw from Sioux City, as well as many other locations such as Winnebago, Homer, Dakota City, and South Sioux City.

An argument we have heard many times in the past is that with the license there would be more ability to control the drinking on the premises. That argument is complete and absolute nonsense. If these persons do not have the ability to control their patrons now, the ability to control their patrons will only diminish with the increased availability of alcohol and traffic at the site.

It is easy for a nonresident and a person who has no investment whatsoever to support this application; and the motives of the applicant are clearly financial gain at the expense of those of who have made large investments in both permanent and temporary residences.

Dakota County does not have the funds to invest more money into the maintenance of the roads leading to Jackson Marina. The road is dangerous with deep ditches and many blind corners. Many times in the past you have heard testimony of the kinds of accidents that occur; and to invite more traffic, and traffic of persons who have been drinking, is clearly inappropriate. The river is dangerous in that location as in indicated by the applicant's own signs indicating that persons should dock at their own risk.

This body should not experiment with our families and our property and should not recommend approval to see how it goes. The litter, noise, traffic, and danger created by an expansion of this facility is unfair to the residents and taxpayers and should not be allowed by this board. We respectfully request that those of you considering this application will bear in mind our many appearances before this board in the past and what we believe are legitimate reasons for not appearing at this hearing. Norris Leamer: This is a hearing just like we had before, except here we have adequate facilities for everybody to speak. A few people last time felt they didn't have an opportunity to speak. We put out some petitions. I would ask Mr. Harrigfeld to bring these petitions forward. It seems to be an issue here that only Nebraska residents have some rights. The law says the public; it doesn't say Nebraska people. We have some petitions signed by Nebraska residents and petitions signed by non-residents. There are a number of signatures on these.

Mr. Harrigfeld: There are roughly 480 signatures of Nebraska residents, and roughly 350 signatures of out of state residents.

Mr. Leamer: I believe the objectors, have said in the past, they have no objection to the facility and no objection to the people. This is the only business place along the river between Sioux City and Wynot. There was a concern expressed in that letter that the Harrigfeld's were going to get a license and then sell out. I assure you that's not what their intentions are. This young couple has a wonderful restaurant up there. They just don't have enough business to keep going. It's only seasonal. They're only open from Memorial Day to Labor Day or a few days past that. These people are in the food business. They're not in the liquor business. They are a big service to the people in the area.

Paula Harrigfeld: I always felt that it was Ernie who was applying for the license, but I do have a few things I'd like to say. I brought copies of our income tax for you to look at. If people think we are trying to be greedy, they can look at these and see that we're not. We have a good business. We do a lot of dollar volume in the months we're open. But the bills keep coming in all year long. We both work lots other than in the restaurant. It's almost 100% strictly family that works there. I feel the road is a common, ordinary gravel road. The farmers all use it for their farming. I really wish you would ask some questions.

Mrs. Hirschbach: I have some questions I'd like to make a part of the record. You made reference that there is no intent to sell.

BLUE BORDER

Paula Harrigfeld: Several years ago, it was for sale. Since that time, Ernie and I have moved back to the county. We have settled down, the children are here.

Mrs. Hirschbach: It is not currently listed nor do you have any intent to list it, is that correct?

Norris Leamer: That is correct.

Paula Harrigfeld: Weekends we are there around the clock.

Mrs. Hirschbach: I understand you currentially close at a fairly early hour.

Paula Harrigfeld: We close at 9:30 on week nights, 11:00 on Fridays and Saturdays.

Mrs. Hirschbach: Would it be correct, then, to say for the record, that you do not intend to extend your hours?

Norris Leamer: Correct.

Mrs. Hirschbach: Would you extend your days, would you stay open into the winter?

Paula Harrigfeld: No. We pretty much just go with the season. This year was an exception. We opened the last week in April. The first year we had it we stayed open into November and we sat there all night with no business. We have a lot of people come in who want bread or milk. There is a need for groceries out there. We're talking about 68 cabins in the area.

Mrs. Hirschbach: I understand you do cater to families.

Paula Harrigfeld: I don't think there's hardly ever a time when there isn't someone with children in there. It would be very rare.

Mrs. Hirschbach: So it would be to your benefit to control anyone who would drive away your trade.

Paula Harrigfeld: Our children work there and I wouldn't allow that. I'd also like to mention that there were several other people who wanted to be here to speak today, but because of the two funerals, were unable to do so.

Jim Sivill: Paula asked me to take a survey of who was in favor of this.

Mr. Leamer asked Mr. Sivill how long he has been in the area.

Mr. Sivill: Twenty years.

Dennis Moore: I've been on the river for 15 years. I'm in the process of building a new cabin. There's quite a few people who get gas there. I've used that facility for quite a few years. I feel if they don't get the beer license, it's going to put a burden on them. I feel my property is worth more with their restaurant there. They are quite a service to the people.

Clayton Nelson: I know these kids. We have a cabin across the river. When you have to carry the beer in the car, you'll leave the cans on the road. I think it's a must for them to have the license with all the new housing going up. These kids know what they're doing. They're good operators.

Jim ? : I live in South Sioux City. The roads out there are as good as any in the county. I've been patronizing the place for many years. I've taken my family out there and I've never seen any law enforcement out there.

Mark Collins: I live in Sioux City but I do a lot of boating out on the river. I can personally speak for the Jaycees. The Jackson Marina was a pick up spot for the Raft Ragatta.

Dick Sivill: I'm a Nebraska resident. There were many things brought out in the letter that are not true. The county road has a good base. I object to the fact that Mr. Todd qualifies himself as a resident. He's only up there two or three times a year. I don't think the Harrigfelds should be denied a license. I know they are a public service to the community. They run a good operation.

Judy Simoni: I attended the last hearing. I left that hearing shaking my head. The opposition was talking about beer cans on the road and other things that were not true. If it will increase their revenue, I think we should give them the opportunity.

Ernie Harrigfeld: I understand you have the opportunity every year to review our license. Now we've told you what we intend to do as far as hours of operation and staying a family restuarant. If we don't hold to that, you just don't issue us a license next year.

Mrs. Hirschbach: I don't think that's exactly the way it works. As you pointed out, the Nebraska Liquor Commission grants the license and I think if they grant it, they are the only ones who have the authority to take it away. I don't think the Board would have that authority. I would like to note that the County Attorney has signed a petition in opposition to granting the license. I asked the County Sheriff about appearing here today and he said he would prefer to remain in a neutral position. He did however, say that he's never had any problems with the location with the exception of one under age party. If the Board were to approve the application and the Nebraska Liquor Commission were to approve it, I think it would be in the best interest of the Harrigfelds to continue to operate in the same manner in which it's been operated up to this time. Rohde moved, seconded by Rush to make a favorable recommendation to the Nebraska Liquor Control Commission for the issuance of a Retail Beer On & Off Sale License for Ernest Harrigfeld DBA Jackson Marina.

Chairman Engel called their regular scheduled meeting to order at 1:00 p.m.

Present were: Pat Engel, Charles Rush, Daniel Rohde, Oscar "Bill" Stone and Gretchen Hirschbach.

Commissioner Stone moved, seconded by Rohde to approve the minutes of June 24, 1985 as written. Voting Aye: Rush, Rohde, Stone, Hirschbach with Engel Abstaining.

The county board met with Bruce Smith; County Attorney, Jim Wagner; County Sheriff, Mr. Glen Sedivy; Deputy County Sheriff, Mr. Robert Day; Sheriff's Deputy, Mr. Tom McCarthy, Mr. Ron Dooley and Bob Sinard from the Nebraska Department of Roads. Also in attendance of the meeting was Lt. Hanson, Sgt. Uehling and trooper Robert Neel, the trio being employed by the Nebraska Highway Safety Patrol.

Mr. Bruce Smith spoke first concerning the Highway 35 and Highway 75-77 Junction West of Dakota City. Mr. Smith offered some statistics concerning the accidents at said intersection. They included:

Nine serious personal injuries, three fatalities and this does not include fender benders where no one was hurt. Mr. Smith went on that the comments from the local people are very negative concerning these lights because of its inconsistency. It is not adequately timed. In the most recent accident the lights may have malfunction. We have conflicting reports from the four witnesses that witnessed the accident. Mr. Smith called attention to a picture showing exposed wires in one of the poles. In Mr. Smith's opinion speed has to be reduced, he personally favored a 4 way stop with rumble bars. "If nothing is done, there will be another fatality at this intersection within another year. There's no doubt in my mind," Smith Said. "Something must be done to reduce the potential for personal injury accidents by reducing speed, if possible.

Mr. Tom McCarthy introduced Mr. Ron Dooley, state traffic signal engineer. Mr. Dooley said a four-way stop may prove dangerous as well since drivers familiar with the intersection would not anticipate stoping. Mr. Dooley noted there is a difference between exposed wires and stripped wires. In this paticular situation it does appear an access plate is missing but that should not cause the lights to malfunction. He said that the most sophisticated lights available are in place at this intersection and that it has self diagnostics and that if the green light appears both directions that it is designed to automically set itself in a flashing mode and in this paticular incident this did not happen. Mr. Tom Mc Carthy indicated these lights were also equipped with the 12 inch which is the largest available. The state offered other criteria such as to what traffic count constitutes what type of intersection.

Mr. Jim Wagner, County Sheriff advised something be done as it is very difficult to explain to local residents why their loved ones are victims of this intersection. Precautions should be taken to correct this situation as you can not put a value on a human life. What ever it takes to save lives should be done.

After further discussion of possibilites at said intersection, Mr. Mc Carthy suggested that something be tried with a trial period of two to six months. The State Department of Roads recommended a mandatory stop to all East and West traffic and a flashing yellow to North and South. They would include stop ahead and stop signs from both directions East and West and if this was successful, rumble strips could be added. The state indicated the lowest speed limit would be 45. It was agree to try this pending the state traffic engineer's approval with July 16, 1985 being the date for the change if approved. The Board recessed at 1:55 p.m. and reconvened at 2:00 p.m.

### RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, Dakota County has been advised that the U.S. Supreme Court's recent decision in Garcia v. San Antonio Metropolitan Transit Authority mandates the application of the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) to local governmental entities in all aspects regardless of function or service provided. The application of this decision directing compliance with the requirements of the FLSA will have disastrous effects of the budgets of local governments in light of the many cutbacks experienced by local political subidivsions at both the State and Federal levels. In many instances, local governments are the only provider of the services which will now fall under the guidelines of the FLSA and yet these services are not comparable to any services wholly provided in the private sector (i.e. law enforcement, fire protection, emergency medical services, public works services such as highway and drainage projects and sanitary landfill maintenance, etc.). And further, inasmuch as local governments have provided these services on an as needed basis, which in many cases exists on a twenty-four hours-a-day emergency timeframe contradicting the original purposes of the FLSA which was to act as a fair labor measure covering private enterprises engaged in competitive manufacturing or production of goods for sale to the public. Requiring local governments to comply with this Act will serve as a deterrent to the efficient and economical operations of the local public sector which is made up by the people and operates solely to serve the people, and

WHEREAS, the application of this Act specifically in Dakota County will cause further expenditures which funding will be accomplished through revenues based mainly on taxes collected from the citizens of Dakota County with no additional services provided as a result of this increased cost and quite possibly a curtailment of services which could be provided.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that Dakota County Board strongly urges that our Nebraska Congressional Delegates work to enact S. 1570 and similar legislation in the House which would reverse the <u>Garcia</u> decision and make the FLSA inapplicable to local governmental entities which provide these needed services on behalf of, and for the public at large. If this relief is not provided, it is very likely that all county and municipal governments shall be forced to raise taxes in order to continue to provide these needed services without any increase in services provided, and

BE IF FURTHER RESOLVED that, if this request cannot be acted upon favorably, such legislation may be enacted to exempt from FLSA coverage those employees who perform necessary and required services which occur on a non-routine basis which are unique to local governmental entities such as police protection, emergency medical and rescue services, water and sewer services, public works and fire protection, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that each member of the Nebraska Congressional Delegation be presented with a copy of this resolution and urged to work to correct this manifest injustice placed on the taxpayers who fund local government services statewide and nationally.

Several people appeared before the Board for the Public Hearing on the vacation of three roads in Dakota County. Chairman Engel informed the people that the hearing could not be held today because registered letters were not sent to adjacent landowners notifying them of the public hearing.

Charles Beckenhauer of West Point appeared before the Board and presented a petition with 110 signatures to keep open the county road located on the north line of Section 12, Township 27 North, Range 7 East of the 6 P.M. Mr. Beckenhauer presented another petition with approximately 110 signatures of those in favor of making the road a minimum maintenance road.

Larry Albrecht: I would agree with minimum maintenance to an extent. I can sympathize with Charlie. He needs an access. I could go along with minimum maintenance from the east end of the road to Charlie's property.

Dennis Albrecht: I want some tubes put in if the road is going to be minimum maintenance.

Mrs. Hirschbach: The county is required to provide an access from only one direction.

Philip Jensen: All it would take for minimum maintenance is a blade across it once or twice a year. We haven't been able to drive through there for 8 years because there is a fence across the road.

Mrs. Hirschbach: We have two proposals. The first is to make the entire road minimum maintenance. The second is to make  $\frac{1}{4}$  mile of the road minimum maintenance and to close the rest. I think it would make more sense to keep  $\frac{1}{4}$  mile of the road in decent shape.

Mr. Engel: We will republish for the public hearing, send out registered letters and continue at that time.

Larry Albrecht: I would just ask that the Board look at this road before the next public hearing.

Chairman Engel asked Colonel Krage to speak first. Colonel Krage: I am acting as agent for Jack Lemmon. Jack has had problems with people breaking into his property from the back. We attempted to purchase only the shoreline from the State, but the State wants to sell all of it. We are here today to request you to release the lease. Mr.

Lemmon would like to fence in the property to reduce the problem of vandalism. He is not planning to expand the salvage yard. In the long run, he wants to request a zoning change to use the property for restoring trucks.

John Mahler appeared before the board. Mr. Mahler: Crystal Lake Improvement Association, Inc. was formed August 8, 1978. Our purpose is to pursue any and all avenues available to accomplish restoration of Crystal Lake as a public recreation area and wildlife habitat. We have worked with Siouxland Interstate Metropolitan Planning Council, Nebraska Game and Parks Commission, Natural Resources District, Sierra Club, National Wildlife Federation and Ducks Unlimited regarding support and financial resources for restoration of Crystal Lake for wildlife preservation and recreation purposes. The Nebraska School land under discussion is vital to the success of the proposed restoration. Officials from SIMPCO, Nebraska Game and Parks Commission and the NRD all confirm that public access and public use lands must be present in order to receive any matching Federal or State funds for a project of this nature. To this end, easements have been obtained by Crystal Lake Improvement Association from nearly every landowner having property boundaries on Crystal Lake, in order that public access be provided around the lake. However, the Nebraska Education lands located on the northwest end of the lake represent the sole remaining public use land available to meet matching fund requirements. A long term irrevocable decision allowing this land to fall into private ownership eliminates the possibility of a natural resource where future generations of Nebraskans can enjoy the bounties of nature and all the rich joys of the great outdoors. The lake is currently full of fish, blue herron, pelican, ducks, geese, deer and racoon.

Let's say the lake restoration project never developes. I feel confident it will but let's suppose for a moment it doesn't. What other options remain for the land under discussion? According to the State Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan as produced by the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission and incorporated in the Dakota County General Development Plan of August 1978, Dakota County should attempt to improve their recreational facilities. According to the report based on past and projected population growth, Dakota City should make provisions for additional parkland in the future. Homer has adequate tennis park and ballfield facilities but the town is deficient in picnic space. As for Hubbard, the report shows no public picnic facilities exist in the town and states highest priority in Hubbard should be given to the purchase and development of additional parklands. South Sioux City and the immediate area based on population, shows 204 acres of parkland were needed. To meet this demand, 59.5 additional acres should be provided. The report further states that only 3 parks, other than city facilities, provide recreational facilities.

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Two of these, Omadi Bend and Beaver Dam are now closed. Basswood Ridge is considered a wildlife area and provides no picnic or camping facilities. County residents are dependent upon community parks or regional facilities in other counties. In the summary of this report is the following recommendation: "Dredging oxbow lakes within the county should be investigated since these areas have high recreational and wildlife potential." In an area where insufficient park space for both city and county residents is evident, every effort should be made to retain available public use land. From the Nebraska Game and Parks report the following goals and strategies were incorporated into the Dakota County General Development Plan prepared by SIMPCO and the Dakota County Joint Planning Commission. The goals and strategies are as follows: Section 2.5 PARKS AND OPEN SPACE GOALS: 1. Satisfaction of the park and open space needs of Dakota County residents. 2. Preservation of historic landmarks and effective use of natural landscapes. 3. Achievement of a harmonious relationship between the natural landscape and usage of the land. STRATEGIES: A. Comprehensive plans, zoning ordinances, and subdivision regulations should be developed to promote the orderly development of parks and open space. B. Fullest possible use should be made of the area's water resources (Missouri River and Crystal Lake), while preserving their natural beauty. C. Important conservation, historic, and scenic areas should be protected from deterioration or destruction resulting from public or private actions. D. The overall costs of public parks and open space facilities should be minimized, by avoiding unnecessary duplication. E. Cooperation among private and public groups involved in the conservation, preservation and development of parks and open space, should be maintained.

Now let's suppose for a moment that even though the facts show more parks are needed, that plans for a park on the Nebraska School land do not develope, what option remains? Leave it as it is without improvement or changes for continued public use and access to the lake as it exists today. In the past two summers, residents from within the county have used the lake on a regular basis. There has been fishing, boating, water skiing, canoeing and other activities, including a seaplane using the lake for landing. In the winter months, the lake is used for ice fishing, ice skating, snowmobiling, dog sledding, cross country skiing, and four wheel drive pylon races. Airplanes on skis even land and take off on the lake during winter months.

The Nebraska School land access is the only remaining public access for taking advantage of the many recreational activities the lake provides. Without this access and public use area, continued enjoyment of Crystal Lake by the general public will not be experienced.

The sun will set for all of us one day, but the deeds we do live on. There may well be no better gift than a legacy of land dedicated to the enhancement of wildlife and public recreation. Such a legacy of land will last as long as the streams flow, the grasses grow and winds blow. A decision by the Dakota County Board of Commissioners to cancel the current lease for the purpose of allowing the State to sell the land for commerical use will ensure that Crystal Lake and the current Nebraska School land will never represent such a legacy of land. A decision by the Board to retain the lease will provide continued public access to Crystal Lake for daily use by county residents, while keeping open the possibility of park development and lake restoration. By comparing the current use and potential use of the existing natural resource to the proposed use if sold, I feel the decision should be and easy one and the outcome obvious.

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Steve Gragg of Dakota City read a letter from the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission. Mr. Gragg also stated that he saw six boats on the lake a week ago Sunday. During the past summer, service clubs have used the lake and surrounding area. Mr. Gragg urged the Board to keep the lease.

Paul Culbertson, Dakota City, urged the Board to keep the lease for two reasons: 1. It's a potential public use area. 2. If you relinquish the lease, it would almost be impossible to get it back again.

Vanessa McGinty, South Sioux City, presented a petition filed in Dakota County District Court by Husker Used Trucks and Parts, Inc., a Nebraska Corporation and Gilbert M. Vande Mheen, an individual against Quad-States, Inc., a Nebraska Corporation asking for payments of \$2,583.33 for the months of July, August, September, October and November of 1984.

Mike Tramp, Dakota City, stated that this past summer, a petition was circulated and approximately 1,000 signatures of people interested in seeing the lake restored, were obtained. He said that to relinquish the park, would be a stab in the back for them to get the lake restored.

Dale Voss, Dakota City, stated that he has lived at his current residence since 1928. Mr. Voss said this is the only access they have to the lake. He added that Mr. Mahler expressed their feeling well.

Chairman Engel asked Colonel Krage if he had anything further to say.

Colonel Krage: "No comment."

Norma Fletcher, South Sioux City, stated that she has lived in South Sioux the majority of her life and that she took her grandchildren out to Crystal Lake quite recently. She said the public

needs this access.

Rob Jenks, representing Goodwill Industries, stated that they have spent countless hours working with the Game and Parks Commission and other agencies to restore the lake. He said it would be a real mistake to relinquish the lease.

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Chairman Engel closed the hearing at 3:26 p.m.

# DOG AND CAT ORDINANCES FOR DAKOTA COUNTY

70-101 DOGS AND CATS; OWNER DEFINED. Any person who shall harbor or permit any dog or cat to be in or about his or her house, store, or enclosure, or to remain to be fed, shall be deemed the owner and possessor of such dog or cat and shall be deemed to be liable for all penalties herein prescribed. (Ref. 54-606, 71-4401,

R.R.S., Nebr. 1943, as amended).

70-102 DOGS AND CATS; LICENSE. Any person who shall own, keep or harbor a dog or cat over the age of six (6) months within Dakota County shall within thirty (30) days after acquisition of the said dog or cat acquire a license for each such dog or cat annually by or before the first (1st) day of January of each year. The said tax shall be delinquent from and after January thirtieth (30th); Provided, the possessor of any dog or cat brought into or harbored within the county limits subsequent to January first (1st) of any year, shall be liable for the payment of the dog or cat tax levied herein. Licenses shall be issued by the County Sheriff upon the payment of a license fee of two dollars (\$2.00) for each male dog or cat and spayed female dog or cat and three dollars (\$3.00) for each unspayed female dog or cat. Said license shall not be transferable and no refund will be allowed in case of death, sale or other disposition of the licensed dog or cat. The owner shall state at the time the application is made and upon printed forms provided for such purpose, his name and address and the name, breed, color and sex of each dog or cat owned and kept by him. A certificate that the dog or cat has had a rabies shot, effective for the ensuing year of the license, shall be presented when the license is applied for and no license or tag shall be issued until the certificate is shown.

This section and Section 70-103 shall not apply to any dog or cat who is licensed according to any city or village ordinance, which city or village is located within Dakota County, Nebraska. (Ref. 17-526, 54-603, 71-4412, R.R.S., Nebr. 1943, as amended).

70-103 DOGS AND CATS; LICENSE TAGS. Upon the payment of the license fee, the County Sheriff shall issue to the owner of a dog or cat a license certificate and a metallic tag for each dog or cat licensed. The metallic tags shall be properly attached to the collar or harness of all dogs and cats so licensed and shall entitle the owner to keep or harbor the said dog or cat until the thirty-first (31st) day of December following such licensing. In the event that a license tag is lost and upon satisfactory evidence that the original plate or tag was issued in accordance with the provisions herein, the County Sheriff shall issue a duplicate or new tag for the balance of the year for which the license tax has been paid and shall charge and collect a fee of one dollar (\$1.00) for each duplicate or new tag so issued. All license fees and collections shall be immediately credited to the Animal License Fund held by the County Sheriff. It shall be the duty of the County Sheriff to issue tags of a suitable design that are different in appearance each year.

70-104 DOGS AND CATS; WRONGFUL LICENSING. It shall be unlawful for the owner, keeper, or harborer of any dog or cat to permit or allow such dog or cat to wear any license, metallic tag or other county identification than that issued by the County Sheriff for dogs and cats, nor shall the owner, keeper, or harborer wrongfully and knowingly license an unspayed female dog with a license prescribed for a male or spayed female dog.

70-105 DOGS AND CATS; RUNNING AT LARGE. It shall be the duty of the County Sheriff to cause any dog or cat found to be running at large within the County to be taken up and impounded. "Running at Large" shall mean any dog or cat found off the premises of the owner, and not under control of the owner or a responsible person, either by leash, cord, chain, wire, rope, cage or other suitable means of physical restraint.

70-106 DOGS AND CATS; CAPTURE IMPOSSIBLE. The County Sheriff shall have the authority to kill any dog or cat showing vicious tendencies or characteristics of rabies which make capture impossible due to the danger involved, or any dog or cat where reasonable attempts at capture have been unsuccessful.

70-107 DOGS AND CATS; RUNNING AT LARGE, COLLARLESS. It shall be the duty of every owner or owners of any dog or cat to securely place upon the neck of such dog or cat a good and sufficient collar with a metallic plate thereon, on which shall be plainly inscribed the name of such owner. It shall be lawful for any enforcement officer to kill any dog or cat found running at large on whose neck there is no collar as aforesaid. (Ref. 54-605, R.R.S., Nebr. 1943, as amended). 70-108 DOGS AND CATS; REMOVAL OF TAGS. It shall be unlawful for any person to remove or cause to be removed, the collar, harness or metallic tag from any dog or cat without the consent of the owner, keeper or possessor thereof. (Ref. 17-526, R.R.S., Nebr. 1943, as amended).

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70-109 DOGS AND CATS; IMPOUNDING. It shall be the duty of the County Sheriff or his deputies to capture, secure, and remove in a humane manner to an animal shelter any dog or cat violating any of the provisions of this Article. The dogs and cats so impounded shall be treated in a humane manner and shall be provided with a sufficient supply of food and fresh water each day. Each collared impounded dog or cat shall be kept and maintained at the pound for a period of not less than four (4) working days after public notice has been given unless reclaimed earlier by the owner. Each impounded dog or cat which is captured without a collar shall be kept and maintained at the pound for a period of not less than two (2) working days after public notice has been given unless reclaimed earlier by the owner. Notice of impoundment of all animals, including any significant marks or identifications, shall be posted at the office of the County Sheriff within twenty-four (24) hours after impoundment as public notification of such impoundment. Any dog or cat may be reclaimed by its owner during the period of impoundment by payment of a general impoundment fee and daily board fee as set by resolution of the Dakota County Board of Commissioners and on file in the office

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of the County Clerk. The owner shall then be required to comply with the collaring requirement and a rabies vaccination of the dog or cat within seventy-two (72) hours after release, unless the owner can establish that such dog or cat is presently so vaccinated. If the dog or cat is not claimed at the end of the required waiting period after public notice has been given, the County Sheriff may dispose of the dog or cat in a safe and humane manner; provided that if, in the judgment of the County Sheriff, a suitable home can be found for any such dog or cat within the County, the said dog or cat shall be turned over to that person and the new owner shall then be required to pay all fees and meet all collaring and vaccinating requirements provided in this Article. The County shall acquire legal title to any uncollared dog or cat impounded in the animal shelter for a period longer than the required waiting period after giving notice. All dogs shall be destroyed and buried in the summary and humane manner unless a suitable home can be found for such dog or cat. (Ref. 17-548, 71-4408, R.R.S., Nebr. 1943, as amended). 70-110 DOGS AND CATS; VACCINATION REQUIRED. It shall be unlawful for the owner of any dog or cat to keep, maintain, harbor or possess a dog or cat or to allow a dog or cat to run at large, unless it shall have been vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian with approved anti-rabies vaccine, at least once every twenty-four (24) months.

70-111 DOGS AND CATS AND OTHER ANIMALS; RABIES SUSPECTED. Any dog or cat or other animal suspected of being afflicted with rabies, or any dog or cat vaccinated in accordance with the provisions of Section 70- which has bitten any person and caused an abrasion of the skin, shall be seized by the County Sheriff and impounded under the supervision of a licensed veterinarian or a public health authority for a period of not less than ten (10) days. If upon examination by a veterinarian, the dog or cat or other animal has no clinical signs of rabies at the end of such impoundment, it may be released to the owner or, in the case of a stray, it shall be disposed of.

Any dog or cat vaccinated in accordance with the provisions of 70-110, which has bitten any person, shall be confined by the owner or other responsible person as required by the rabies control authority for a period of at least ten (10) days, at which time the dog or cat shall be examined by a licensed veterinarian. If no signs of rabies are observed by the veterinarian, the dog or cat may be released from confinement. (Ref. 71-4406, R.R.S., Nebr. 1943, as amended.) BLUE BORDER

Any dog or cat or other animal found by a licensed veterinarian to be afflicted with rabies shall be safely and humanely destroyed. Such destruction, however, shall occur only after a determination that all state law provisions concerning rabid animals have been satisfied.

In the case of dogs or cats or other animals known to have been bitten by a rabid animal, the following rules shall apply:

1. In the case of a dog or cat or other animal which has not been vaccinated in accordance with Section 70-110 and which has been bitten by a known rabid animal, such bitten or exposed dog or cat shall be immediately destroyed unless the owner is willing to place such dog or cat or other animal in strict isolation in a kennel under veterinary supervision for a period of not less than six (6) months.

2. If the bitten or exposed dog or cat or other animal is vaccinated in accordance with the provisions of Section 70-110, such dog or cat or other animal shall be subject to the following procedure: a) such dog or cat or other animal shall be immediately revaccinated and confined for a period of not less than thirty (30) days following vaccination, or b) if such dog or cat or other animal is not immediately revaccinated, such dog or cat or other animal shall be confined in strict isolation in a kennel for a period of not less than six (6) months under the supervision of a veterinarian, or c) such dog or cat or other animal shall be destroyed if the owner does not comply with either subdivision a) or b) of this subsection.

All costs arising under this section shall be the responsibility of the dog or cat or other

animal's owner.

Any owner whose dog or cat or other animal has been found in violation of Sections 70-101 through 70-111 shall be subject to a fine of not less than fifteen dollars (\$15.00) nor more than fifty dollars (\$50.00). Where an owner of a dog or cat or other animal has been found in violation more than three (3) times within a twelve (12) month period, the maximum fine shall not exceed one hundred fifty dollars (\$150.00).



- 2. The County has not maintained this road for several years.
- 3. There is one Property Owner that needs access to his property for future use.
- 4. The costs to maintain this road in a passable condition would greatly exceed the benefits derived from it.

I would recommend to the Dakota County Board of Commissioners that this road be vacated to a point ½ of a mile West of the NE corner of Section 12-27-7, and that ½ mile be a minimum maintenance road only.

Mrs. Hirschbach said they had discussed changing the county attorney's position from part-time to full-time, but felt that it would not be a good move because it would be difficult to pay a salary to attract a full-time attorney. She said the committee recommends it be kept part-time.

# The Board discussed the county official's salaries.

Mrs. Hirschbach: Pat (Engel) and I met with the county officials. The salary that seemed to be mentioned the most was twenty to twenty-one thousand. We indicated that would be too high. The compromise was to set the salary at \$19,000 for 1987. That would be about an 8½% increase over the 1982 base salary. I have some salary surveys which indicate that \$19,000 would put us a little low compared to other counties our size. Although our population may be close, our valuation is lower. The County Sheriff gets 15% more than the other elected officials. The Sheriff's salary would be \$21,850 in 1987. The County Commissioners salary was \$7,000 in 1982. It will be \$7,420 in 1986. We recommend \$7,500 for 1987. That would be about a 7% increase over the base in 1982. The Register of Deeds salary was \$7,500 in 1982. Ten thousand per year was suggested at the meeting. We had another suggestion to roll it back to \$7,500. We'd be looking at between \$8,000 and \$8,100 if you go with the same increase as the other officials. We have had some objection to building in an increase and some objection to any increase at all.

Mrs. Hirschbach presented some information on salaries that she obtained from the City of Dakota City and the City of South Sioux City. Mrs. Hirschbach said the County Attorney indicated he felt the increase for the Sheriff should be more than 15% above the other officials because he is on call 24 hours a day.

Mr. Engel: Effective January 1, 1987, the official's salary will be \$18,550. As a committee, we would recommend \$19,000.

38027-REDFIELD & COMPANY, INC., OMAHA Dick Beermann appeared before the Board. Mr. Beermann: I am speaking for myself and one other person. Under the conditions, you've got a hell of a problem. For the past few years, we've seem labor take cuts and now another packing house is closing. A couple of years down the road, the farmers are going to be in real trouble. I know it's hard to get people to run for these positions, but I'm not for raises. You have to consider the fringe benefits these people get. Mrs. Hirschbach: The county does not have excessive fringe benefits. We will be forced to implement a pension plan in 1987. Bill Stone: Like Dick says, somewhere this has got to end. Mr. Beermann: There are guys making more on their pensions, than they did when they worked. I see widows trying to live on \$120.00 per month. I'm on the farmer's side and I don't see a bright picture for us. Mrs. Hirschbach: It's tough. We're not in a good financial position. County Sheriff Jim Wagner appeared before the Board and presented a copy of the contract with Animal Services for each board member to review. Hirschbach moved, seconded by Rohde to convene in executive session to discuss labor relations. Chairman Leo "Pat" Engel called their regular meeting to order at 1:00 p.m. Present: Bill Stone, Gretchen Hirschbach, Leo "Pat" Engel, Charles Rush, Daniel Rohde and Bev Gradert, stenographer.

Chairman Engel informed the Board that Maurice Redmond has withdrawn his application for the position of County Attorney.

Hirschbach moved, seconded by Stone to appoint Kurt Hohenstein as County Attorney, effective January 27, 1986. Voting Yea: Hirschbach, Engel, Rush, Rohde, Stone Unanimous motion carried

Maurice Redmond informed the Board that he withdrew his application because he felt the workload in the county attorney's office would take a great deal of time and he felt it wouldn't be fair to his family.

Hirschbach moved, seconded by Rush that Kurt Hohenstein's responses to questions from the Board be made a part of the record, and that Mr. Hohenstein's response to a question from Mrs. Hirschbach also be made a part of the record. Mrs. Hirschbach's question: If you found yourself without a deputy, would you consider hiring your law partner? Mr. Hohenstein said under no circumstances would he hire his own law partner as deputy county attorney.

1. It is imperative that immediate action be taken to collect delinquent taxes owed to the county. What would be your approach to accomplish this result and when would you implement such action?

Answer: The responsibility of the collection of delinquent taxes owed to the county is the responsibility of the County Attorney. My first priority in the collection of taxes would be to determine the actual status of the delinquent taxes and cases currently pending and immediately institute a procedure to promptly file and proceed on those cases which need legal action. I would anticipate doing that within 30 days and attempting to have all delinquent taxes collected and processed by December 31, 1986. That, of course, depends upon the scheduling of the Court and currently our District Court is extremely overloaded in terms of its docket, but so far as the Court Docket allows, those cases would be timely processed.

In the past, private attorneys were employed and tax collection cases were "farmed out" to those private attorneys. That system was adequate in the past and allowed a more timely collection of those taxes. I have no objection to the County Board collecting taxes in that manner, but if it would decide not to follow that route, the ultimate responsibility lies with the County Attorney and I would implement immediate action to insure that that responsibility was fulfilled.

2. As you know this Board is responsible for budgeting the money needed to operate the County Attorney's office.

A. How many persons do you anticipate would be needed to operate your office and would

you please designate the job classification of each person?

Answer: It is my feeling at the present time that depending upon the position that the County Board took with reference to the collection of child support, the present staff, that being a County Attorney as part-time position and the full-time Deputy County Attorney is sufficient to operate the office. I would look closely at the possible hiring of an additional secretary if delinquent tax collection was made the primary and ultimate responsibility of the County Attorney. If that process was "farmed out" to private attorneys, then at the present time I would not hire any additional persons or staffing in the office.

B. Mr. Luebe is presently employed as a full-time Attorney in the County Attorney's office. Would you retain him?

Answer: I have had extensive dealings with Doug Luebe in criminal matters and find him to be highly competent. I would certainly retain him should he desire to remain in the present position as Deputy County Attorney. I believe that he is doing a fine job and see no reason whatso ever to change Deputy County Attorneys at the present time.

3. At the present time the County Attorney's office is not involved in the collection of child support. Would you follow this policy or involve your office in the collection of child support?

Answer: At the present time the County Attorney's office is not involved in the collection of child support although that has been done in the past. To do so, I believe, would necessitate an additional staff member either on a full-time or part-time basis. The Nebraska Legislature is currently considering a special master program which would allow the appointment of special
