Chair Hartnett called their re-organizational meeting to order at 1:30 p.m. PRESENT: Commissioners Hartnett, Engel, Meinen, Bobier, Denker, and Ted Piepho, Secretary.

ABSENT: All present

Commissioner Engel moved, seconded by Commissioner Meinen approve the minutes of December 27, 1999 as typed in the official record.

ROLL CALL VOTE: Hartnett- Yea, Engel- Yea, Meinen- Yea, Denker- Yea, Bobier- Yea, UNANIMOUS MOTION CARRIED.

Commissioner Hartnett opened nominations for Chairman.

Commissioner Bobier moved, seconded by Commissioner Denker, to nominate Commissioner Meinen to serve as the 2000 Chair of the County Board of Commissioners and the secretary cast an unanimous ballot for Ms. Meinen to be the board's 2000 chair.

ROLL CALL VOTE: Engel- Yea, Hartnett- Yea, Bobier- Yea, Denker- Yea, Meinen-Abstained, UNANIMOUS MOTION CARRIED.

Commissioner Meinen occupied the seat reserved for the chair.

Chairperson Meinen called for nominations for Vice Chair.

Commissioner Hartnett moved, seconded by Commissioner Bobier, to nominate Commissioner Engel to serve as the Vice Chairman to the Board of Commissioners for 2000 and the secretary cast an unanimous ballot for Commissioner Engel to be Vice Chair.

ROLL CALL VOTE: Engel- Abstained, Meinen- Yea, Bobier- Yea, Denker- Yea, Hartnett- Yea, UNANIMOUS MOTION CARRIED.

Sheriff Jim Wagner appeared before the board to discuss the E911 Agreement with Dixon County. He reported that he did not have a chance to visit with the Dixon County Sheriff, but that he had a scheduled meeting with him Thursday morning.

Mr. Wagner also appeared on the subject matter of a facilitator (Deb Brownyard) being appointed to help iron out the problems between the entities at the LEC. He said that he did not oppose having the person named to be the facilitator. He did request that he be able to meet with the facilitator privately prior to the meeting. Commissioner Meinen indicated that Mr. Lance Hedquist also wanted to meet with her.

Commissioner Hartnett volunteered to be a representative from the county when meeting with the facilitator.

Commissioner Hartnett moved, seconded by Commissioner Engel to authorize and approve naming Deb Brownyard as a facilitator to resolve the differences of the entities at the joint LEC.

Arnie Mellick, Road Foreman, appeared before the board to advise the board that NRD and Pheasants Forever would put in trees and shrubs at the County Maintenance Yard.

Commissioner Denker moved, seconded by Commissioner Bobier to authorize NRD and Pheasants Forever to plant trees and shrubs at the new County Maintenance Yard. ROLL CALL VOTE: Meinen- Yea, Bobier- Yea, Denker- Yea, Hartnett- Yea, Engel-Yea, UNANIMOUS MOTION CARRIED.

Commissioner Hartnett moved, seconded by Commissioner Bobier, to designate the following banks as depositories for Dakota County with the maximum deposit being governed by securities pledged by each institution: First National Bank in Homer and Dakota County State Bank, Nebraska State Bank, and Siouxland National Banks in South Sioux City.

Ed Cox, President of the Nebraska Public Employees Union, appeared before the board to inform them that the Nebraska Public Employees Local 251 was chosen to represent the dispatchers at the LEC. He said that the county could voluntarily recognize the Union, or if they did not, the Union would file with the CIR to set forth an election by the employees. He said that already more than 50% signed the cards.

The board said that they were not opposed to the employees being represented by the union, but they wanted to wait until a new director is named before they are accepted. Mr. Cox did not have a problem with that, but asked that they not drag it out too long.

Commissioner Bobier moved, seconded by Commissioner Engel, to hold Commissioner's meetings at 1:30 p.m. on Mondays as necessary to pay payroll claims and accounts payable claims. Be it further resolved that on claims day (third Monday) the board shall convene at 10:00 a.m. to review claims. And finally be it resolved that the chair designate other meeting dates as necessary to conduct county business one month in advance of the month in which the meetings are changed.

Commissioner Engel moved, seconded by Commissioner Bobier, to appoint the South Sioux City Star as the legal newspaper of the county for the calendar year 2000. ROLL CALL VOTE: Bobier- Yea, Denker- Yea, Hartnett- Yea, Engel- Yea, Meinen-Yea, UNANIMOUS MOTION CARRIED.

Commissioner Bobier moved, seconded by Commissioner Hartnett, to establish the first Wednesday in October as County Government Day.

The subject of the Human Services remaining open when the courthouse closes due to inclimate weather conditions was discussed.

The County Clerk showed concern that they were open any time after the court house closes because anybody visiting Social Services or coming in the east door has full reign of the courthouse and nobody is on the main and second floors. Mr. Piepho thought that might be a security problem.

Ms. Meinen suggested that a gate across the hallway atop the stairs leading to the main floor from the basement would work.

Mr. Piepho agreed. (Special note: As long as the elevator is shutoff and rests at another floor)

Commissioner Hartnett moved, seconded by Commissioner Denker that the county notify Human Services by checking the statement on their survey card that the county prefers that they likewise close when the courthouse is closed for inclimate weather conditions.

Marjorie Meinen, Chair, called their regularly scheduled meeting to order at 10:00 a.m.

PRESENT: Commissioners Fred Denker, William Engel, Jackie Hartnett, Jack Bobier, Marjorie Meinen and Nanci Walsh, Board Assistant.

Commissioner Engel moved, seconded by Commissioner Bobier, to approve the minutes of January 11, 2000 as typed in the official record. ROLL CALL VOTE: Engel- Yea; Hartnett- Yea; Bobier- Yea; Meinen- Yea; Denker- Yea. UNANIMOUS MOTION CARRIED.

The board reviewed the accounts payable claims as submitted to the county clerk.

At 11:00 a.m. Theodore Piepho, County Clerk, relieved Nanci Walsh taking minutes.

The board discussed the insurance committee. The committee will consist of Theodore Piepho, Nanci Walsh, Marjorie Meinen, and Robert Giese.

The board left the board room at 11:20 a.m. to tour the jail.

Upon arriving at the jail, the board found the jail was full and busy taking inmates to and from court. The board postponed the tour of the jail until January 24, 2000. The board recessed for lunch at 11:25 a.m.

The board reconvened from lunch at 1:30 p.m.

Nanci Walsh, Board Assistant took the minutes of the meeting.

Chairwoman Meinen opened the Public Hearing regarding the sale of the old County Road Shop located at $424~\mathrm{W}.~30\mathrm{th}$ Street, South Sioux City.

Commissioner Bobier asked County Road Foreman Arnold Mellick if we needed to keep a grader in South Sioux City for snow emergencies. There was some concern about operators getting to Hubbard to get the equipment. Mr. Mellick was not concerned about this and that the department would follow the same procedure as before. Any operators that make it to the shop then have a first priority to get other operators out.

Mr. Mellick also stated that the rezoning process with the city for this site has been started. The final reading for the change in zoning from C-3 to M-1 is expected to be March 3, 2000. This rezoning is to make the location more attractive to bidders.

Mr. Mellick recommended that the county sell the property.

There was no further testimony and the hearing was closed at 1:41 p.m.

Commissioner Denker moved, seconded by Commissioner Bobier, to sell the old county road shop. ROLL CALL VOTE: Hartnett- Yea; Bobier- Yea; Meinen- Yea; Denker- Yea; Engel- Yea. UNANIMOUS MOTION CARRIED.

Discussion began on the market value of the property. The appraisal that the board had done in October, 1998 listed the estimated market value at \$48,000.00.

Discussion was had regarding the fifteen feet of old railroad right-of-way that does not belong to the county. The county had made a counter offer on this property, but had not heard anything. Ms. Walsh stated that in order to sell that portion, if the county did obtain it, another hearing would be required. Ms. Walsh recommended withdrawing the offer on that portion of the property and letting the new owner of the shop decide if they wanted to buy it.

Commissioner Engel moved, seconded by Commissioner Bobier, to advertise for three weeks the sale and to set the market value at \$50,000.00. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Dakota County, located in the far northeast area of the state, is confronted by growing problems of juvenile delinquency, crime, and drugs along with a host of correlating factors that contribute to these problems. Poverty, unemployment, family disruption and system fragmentation are among the risk factors that coexist.

While juvenile arrests, court petitions filed and detentions are increasing; community options have not kept pace with demand. Community options are available but underutilized such as electronic monitoring. The juvenile justice system continues to seek out-of home placements rather than viable, cost effective and efficient community-based programs, which hold delinquents and status offenders accountable for their behavior. At-risk youth often must face serious issues before the "system" can offer adequate, sustained and beneficial programming for the juvenile and his/her family. A fundamental principle of the proposed service strategy is the need to address multiple factors that place youth at-risk with strategies that interrelate to improve outcomes while redirecting current resources toward prevention and early intervention programming.

Through collaborative efforts with state/district probation, county government (attorney, judges, commissioners), HHS as well as private providers (DCIT, Boys and Girls Home of Nebraska, community mental health), the project expects to improve the local juvenile justice system. This effort, carried out through the Juvenile Services Intake Coordinator position, changes the way youth in need of prevention and intervention services are reached and the way services are allocated and delivered. This program is showing an effective way of identifying

and assessing the needs of youth particularly in rural counties where few resources exist. Furthermore, this program serves youth prior to their becoming involved in delinquent or criminal activities as well as identifying youth atrisk of engaging in high-risk behaviors, such as gang affiliation or involvement. Through a comprehensive and integrated management information system, service coordination helps to eliminate gaps and redundancies in the county's system of care for at-risk youth. The goal of the Dakota County Juvenile Services program is to expedite and/or reduce number of juveniles in secure programming while developing and/or enhancing appropriate community-based alternatives including prevention opportunities. In essence, this begins to integrate efficient prevention and intervention service delivery at the front end of the juvenile justice system, to help address system barriers by providing more meaningful and effective prevention and intervention services to high-risk juveniles while integrating service delivery system with a single point of entry.

NCC grant funds requested total \$41,637 or 75% of the total project costs. Match includes both cash and in-kind totaling \$13,633 or 25% of the costs. The funds requested target countywide service coordination, electronic monitoring, diversion and system improvement.

End of Ms. Somsky's Information.

Ms. Somsky stated that there is a possibility that this position will be in the probation budget in July, 2001. There is some concern about losing the focus of this position if that occurs.

Commissioner Denker asked Sheriff Wagner's opinion. Sheriff Wagner agreed that some local control could be lost and that discussions about the future of this position should be soon.

Jeff Holloway and Sharon Starling of the Crittenton Center appeared before the board and requested a letter of support for the Challenge Grant Application being submitted by the Crittenton Center to the Nebraska Crime Commission. The grant is for an Extended Crisis On-Call Assistance and Response Program for Dakota County. This program will address problems which facilitate negative behaviors in a child, specifically familial dysfunction and a negative home environment, which lead to individual crime and result in involvement with the juvenile justice system. The focus of this application will be juveniles on probation and their families.

Commissioner Hartnett moved, seconded by Commissioner Bobier, to send a letter of support for the grant application of the Crittenton Center for the Extended Crisis On-Call Assistance and Response Program. ROLL CALL VOTE: Denker- Yea; Engel- Yea; Hartnett- Yea; Bobier- Yea; Meinen- Yea. UNANIMOUS MOTION CARRIED.

The board discussed the Interlocal Agreement with Dixon County for E911. The Board asked Sheriff Wagner if he had any concerns. Sheriff Wagner shared that he was concerned about Paragraphs 6 and 11. This concern was that it does not allow for shared purchases if this is desired down the road.

Sheriff Wagner then discussed with the Board his concern about the recent jail populations. He would like to see the new Community Corrections Officer have more power in helping with this situation if possible.

Robert Giese, County Treasurer, presented the board with a request from David Jenkins for a personal property refund. On his schedule for 1996, 1997 and 1998, Mr. Jenkins included a Dodge Intrepid which as a motor vehicle should not have been included. Mr. Giese stated that by statute Mr. Jenkins is not due a refund on 1996 and that it was corrected for 1998, so the only refund due is for 1997 in the amount of \$329.04.

Commissioner Hartnett moved, seconded by Commissioner Engel, to approve a refund on personal property taxes to Mr. David Jenkins in the amount of \$329.04. ROLL CALL VOTE: Engel- Yea; Hartnett- Yea; Bobier- Yea; Meinen- Yea; Denker- Yea. UNANIMOUS MOTION CARRIED.

Robert Giese, County Treasurer, presented the semi-annual report for the board's signature.

Commissioner Denker moved, seconded by Commissioner Engel, to accept the semi-annual report as presented. ROLL CALL VOTE: Hartnett-Yea; Bobier-Yea; Meinen-Yea; Denker-Yea; Engel-Yea. UNANIMOUS MOTION CARRIED.

The board took a short recess at 3:10 p.m.

The board reconvened at 3:22 p.m.

Warren Johnston, Veterans Service Officer, gave the board a brief report that Rose Boyle, a Green Thumb worker in his office had recently had a light stroke and is recovering at her daughter's home.

Commissioner Hartnett moved, seconded by Commissioner Engel, to approve the Interlocal Agreement with Dixon County for E911 with the following language added to paragraphs 6 and 11: "Unless mutually agreed upon by both counties." And to authorize the chair to sign said agreement as follows:

INTERLOCAL COOPERATION AGREEMENT

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the County of Dixon (hereinafter referred to as "DIXON") to participate in a joint effort with the County of Dakota (hereinafter referred to as "DAKOTA") for the operation of Enhanced 911 telephone service; and

WHEREAS, DIXON and DAKOTA wish to enter into such an agreement, pursuant to the terms of the "Interlocal Cooperation Act" authorized under the laws of the State of Nebraska, Sections 13-801 to 13-827 R.R.S., 1943; and

WHEREAS, Sections 86-1001 through 86-1009, Nebraska Revised Statutes, provide for the establishment of a surcharge for the operation of Enhanced 911 telephone service; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Nebraska LB 133, Ninety-Second Legislature, First Session, State of Nebraska, an interlocal cooperation agreement may be executed to provide Enhanced 911 telephone service, and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of DIXON has reviewed this agreement and has passed a resolution approving the same and authorizing the Chairman thereof to execute this agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of DAKOTA has reviewed this agreement and has passed a resolution approving the same and authorizing the Chairman thereof to execute this agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, IN CONSIDERATION OF THE MUTUAL COVENANTS CONTAINED HEREIN, AND EACH OF THE PARTIES INTENDING TO BE BOUND HEREBY, IT IS AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

1. The term of this agreement shall be perpetual, unless terminated as provided hereinafter.

- 2. DIXON shall provide a Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP) for the receipt, processing and dissemination of emergency information concerning matters in the Great Plains Communications, Inc. and NEBCOM, Inc. telephone exchange areas for telephone prefixes 755 and 638 which are geographically located within Dakota County, Nebraska. DIXON shall operate the PSAP on a twenty-four (24) hour per day basis and shall efficiently notify appropriate emergency response agencies of information received.
- 3. DAKOTA shall pass a resolution authorizing Great Plains Communications, Inc. to collect a one dollar (\$1.00) per month surcharge per subscriber for each 755 telephone exchange geographically located within Dakota County and further authorizing NEBCOM, Inc. to collect a one dollar (\$1.00) per month surcharge per subscriber for each 638 telephone exchange geographically located within Dakota County, as authorized by Nebraska law.
- 4. DAKOTA shall authorize Great Plains Communications, Inc. and NEBCOM, Inc. to forward all monies collected from the 911 surcharge to DIXON as payment for the services rendered and the monthly charges billed by Great Plains Communications, Inc. and NEBCOM, Inc for the service.
- 5. DIXON will pay the monthly service charges to Great Plains Communications, Inc. and NEBCOM, Inc. for the 755 and 638 telephone exchanges geographically located within Dakota County.
- 6. DIXON shall not be responsible for the purchase of any communications equipment to be installed or used by any public safety agencies of DAKOTA unless mutually agreed upon by both counties.
- 7. DAKOTA shall provide a Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP) concerning matters in the U.S. West telephone exchange area for telephone prefix 695 for those telephone lines geographically located in Dixon County, Nebraska. DAKOTA shall operate the PSAP on a twenty-four (24) hour per day basis and shall efficiently notify appropriate emergency response agencies of information received.
- 8. DIXON shall pass a resolution authorizing U.S. West to collect a one dollar (\$1.00) per month surcharge per subscriber for each 695 telephone exchange geographically located within Dixon County as authorized by Nebraska law.
- 9. DIXON shall authorize U.S. West to forward all monies collected from the 911 surcharge to DAKOTA as payment for the services rendered and the monthly charges billed by U.S. West for the service.
- 10. DAKOTA will pay the monthly service charges to U.S. West for the 695 telephone exchanges geographically located within Dixon County.
- 11. DAKOTA shall not be responsible for the purchase of any communications equipment to be installed or used by any public safety agencies of DIXON unless mutually agreed upon by both counties.
- $12.\ \, \text{DIXON}$ and DAKOTA shall supply all materials and labor required for the maintenance of signs used for E-911 addressing within their respective jurisdictions.
- 13. DIXON shall be responsible for the payment of any monthly service charges attributable to telephone prefixes 755 and 638 in excess of the amounts collected by the telephone subscriber surcharge should the Great Plains Communications, Inc. and NEBCOM, Inc. monthly charges exceed the surcharge collected.
- 14. DAKOTA shall be responsible for the payment of any monthly service charges attributable to telephone prefix 695 in excess of the amounts collected by the telephone subscriber surcharge should the U.S., West monthly charge exceed the surcharge collected.
- 15. Either party hereto may terminate this agreement effective on the 30th day of June in any year; provided, however, that written notice of such termination must be delivered to the other party not less than one hundred and eighty (180) days prior to the first day of June of that year.

Commissioner Hartnett moved, seconded by Commissioner Engel to approve the proposed Constitution of the Dakota County Cooperative Extension as follows: CONSTITUTION

Art. I: Name

The name of this organization shall be Dakota County Cooperative Extension.

Art. II: Purpose

The purpose of this organization shall be to establish, maintain, and provide direction to the University of Nebraska Cooperative Extension program in Dakota County, Nebraska in order to aid in diffusing among the people of such county, useful and practical information on priority issues identified by the executive board, program participants of the county extension organization, county residents and the University of Nebraska Cooperative Extension, and further, to encourage the application of such information. The program shall be carried on in each county or group of Dakota County under the direction of the executive board (hereinafter referred to as the Extension Board) of the extension organization of the county in such manner as may be mutually agreed upon by the County Board and the Extension Board of such county provided for in Neb. Rev. Stat. S2-1602, R.R.S. 1943, as amended, and the Regents of the University of Nebraska, through their duly appointed Cooperative Extension representatives. The Extension Board is a unit of county government and shall be granted such powers and authority as bestowed upon it by the county.

Art. III Scope

The University of Nebraska Cooperative Extension program, a collaborative effort of federal, state, and county governments, conducts programs in subjects relating to agriculture, home economics, and rural life, in priority issue areas that include Agricultural Profitability and Sustainability; Children, Youth and Families; Food Safety, Health and Wellness; Strengthening Nebraska Communities; and Water Quality and Environment; which have been identified by the Extension Board, program participants of the county extension organization, county residents, and the University of Nebraska Cooperative Extension, which also facilitates extension outreach programs with other appropriate units of the University as deemed necessary.

Art. IV: Participation

The programs shall be widely available to people residing in the county. No one's participation in the cooperative extension programs shall be illegally discriminated against based upon age, race, color, national or ethnic origin, sex, religion, marital status, veteran's status, sexual orientation, or disability. Cooperative Extension shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local discrimination laws. In order to ensure that the residents of the county are offered the opportunity to participate in the planning and operations related to the activities of cooperative extension, the Extension Board meetings shall be conducted in conformity with Neb. Rev. Stat. SS84-1408 through 84-1414, R.R.S. 1943, as amended, and any other applicable Public Meetings Laws.

Section 1. Extension Board

The governing power of the organization shall be vested in an Extension Board, the members of which shall be selected in a manner and to be representative of the county, as delineated in this Constitution, the Bylaws, and a written interlocal agreement between the County Board and the Board of Regents of the University of Nebraska.

Section 2. Officers and Responsibilities

At the first regular meeting each year following the appointment of members, the Extension Board shall choose from its members, a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary and a Treasurer (or Secretary-Treasurer). Officers shall serve until their successors are selected, qualified and installed.

The duties of the officers shall be such as defined in the Bylaws.

Section 3. Duties

The responsibilities of the Extension Board will be to develop extension program objectives, goals and needs. In order to facilitate such development, the Extension Board shall:

A. PROGRAMMING

- a) Evaluate the program's ability to meet objectives and engage in strategic planning in order to facilitate improvements.
- b) Convene appropriate Program Advisory Committees to establish and support extension program direction.
- c) Where appropriate, engage in collaborative efforts with the executive boards of other county extension organizations as an Extension Program Unit (EPU), in order to more efficiently and effectively meet those program needs that cross over more than one extension organization s geographic boundaries.
 - B. PROPERTY AND RESOURCE MANAGEMENT
 - a) Provide facilities adequate to accomplish program objectives.
- b) After carefully considering the input of the University of Nebraska Cooperative Extension, develop and approve an annual program budget realistically designed to accomplish the goals of the program and submit a related request to the County Board to fund the budget, in accordance with state statutory requirements and the requirements of the County Board relating to timely budget requests.
- c) Monitor, approve, and pay claims within the budget following approval of said budget by the County Board, and administer the extension organization's revolving account, which is authorized to accept grants and other similar gifts. Prior to the Extension Board's application for grant funds or other similar kinds of restricted gifts, the Extension Board will fully inform the University of Nebraska Cooperative Extension of the grant and its applications. Prior to submitting any such grant application, the University of Nebraska Cooperative Extension and the Extension Board will mutually agree upon the use and administration of the funds. The Extension Board shall apply revolving account funds solely to the purposes of the cooperative extension program.
- d) As required by Neb. Rev. Stat. SS2-1606 and 2-1607, R.R.S., file with the county clerk of the County on or before January 1 of each year (1) a report of program work during the preceding year; (2) a sworn itemized statement of expenditure during the preceding year, and (3) a budget or estimate of funds necessary for the carrying on of such work during the ensuing year. Such report shall also be provided at the same time to the University of Nebraska Cooperative Extension.
- e) Submit such reports as requested or required by the County Board, the University of Nebraska Cooperative Extension, the Cooperative State

Research, Education and Extension Service, and the United States Department of Agriculture.

- f) Provide quarterly financial and program activity reports to the County Board relative to the accomplishments of the extension program in the area.
 - C. PERSONNEL
- a) Provide support/clerical staff (including both hiring and termination responsibilities), in numbers and qualifications commensurate with the realistic needs of the program, employed by the County pursuant to County human resource policies, benefit policies and all other County terms of employment, after careful consideration of the recommendations and input of the University of Nebraska Cooperative Extension.
- b) Work collaboratively with and provide advice and direction to the Extension Unit Leader (i.e. University of Nebraska employee appointed to oversee daily operations) in the areas of budget, personnel and programming.
- c) Provide the University of Nebraska with recommendations regarding the hiring, termination and performance of its employees (i.e. Extension Educators and Extension Assistants) providing services to the County cooperative extension program. The Extension Board may participate in any interview process associated with the appointment of a new Extension Educator or Extension Assistant in its program, in order to provide a meaningful recommendation to the University of Nebraska.

An Executive Board may be named by the Extension Board from its members to perform duties delegated by the Extension Board.

Art. VI: Meetings

The Extension Board shall meet monthly at a time and place determined by the Extension Board (or as designated in the Bylaws).

A special meeting of the Extension Board may be called by the President or by written notice.

Art. VII: Notice of Meetings

All Extension Board meetings shall be conducted in conformity with Neb. Rev. Stat. SS84-1408 through 84-1414, R.R.S. 1943, as amended, and any other applicable Public Meetings Laws, including the required publication of the meeting time, place and agenda. Except as otherwise provided by law, the minutes of the meetings, kept by the secretary or other designee, shall be a public record open to inspection by the public upon request during normal business hours.

Art. VIII: Quorum

Four shall constitute a quorum for transacting business at all regular and special Extension Board meetings. Members of the Extension Board shall be entitled to one vote per member on any action put to vote. A vote carrying a majority of a quorum shall be deemed the action of the Extension Board.

Art. IX: Location of Extension Office

The office of the County Cooperative Extension shall be located at Dakota City, Nebr.

Art. X: Amendments

This Constitution may be amended at any regular or special meeting of the Extension Board, by a favorable vote of two-thirds of the total Extension Board membership.

BYLAWS

Art. 1: Extension Board

Section 1. Membership

The County Board by resolution will adopt the number of Extension Board members. The Extension Board will be composed of at least three and not more than 12 registered voters in the county, appointed by the County Board from such

geographic areas so as to assure equitable representation of the organization's population.

Section 2. Candidates for Appointment

Interested potential candidates will be identified through an open nomination process, as specified in a written interlocal agreement between the County Board and the Board of Regents of the University of Nebraska. Section 3. Term of Service

All terms of service shall begin on January 1 of each year. All persons serving as officers or members of the Extension Board shall continue to serve until a successor is appointed and accepts the position. The initial Extension Board appointees shall be divided into three classes of as equal a number as possible. The term of the first class shall end on December 31, 2000; the term of the second class shall end on December 31, 2001; and the term of the third class shall end on December 31, 2002. All persons appointed after the initial Extension Board appointments shall serve three-year terms in order that some continuity within the Extension Board is preserved by staggered appointments. No person shall serve more than two consecutive terms. Section 4. Vacancies

In the event a vacancy on the Extension Board exists because of death, resignation, incapacity, relocation outside of the region the member was appointed to represent, or other reason, the County Board shall appoint a replacement to fill the unexpired term. At any time, the County Board of the County which appointed the member may remove a member of the Extension Board, if it determines that the member s participation or lack of participation is not in the best interest of the cooperative extension program. Section 5. Compensation

Extension Board members shall not receive any compensation for the public service they provide. They will be reimbursed for mileage at the rate deemed permissible by the Internal Revenue Service.

Art. II: Duties of Officers

Section 1. President

The president of the organization shall:

- a) provide overall leadership of the Extension Board in relation to programming, finances, and operations of the county extension organization.
- b) act as official liaison for the Extension Board between the county extension organization, the County Board, and the University of Nebraska Board of Regents through its assigned representative(s).
- c) serve as presiding officer for all meetings of the organization.
- d) identify and appoint Program Advisory Committees.
- e) perform such other functions as are assigned by the Extension Board. As required by Neb. Rev. Stat. SS2-1606 and 2-1607, R.R.S. 1943, as amended, the president shall join the secretary in filing with the county clerk of the County on or before January 1 of each year (1) a report of program work during the preceding year; (2) a sworn itemized statement of expenditures during the preceding year, and (3) a budget or estimate of funds necessary for the carrying on of such work during the ensuing year.

Section 2. Vice-President

The vice-president shall assume the duties of the president in the absence of the president and perform such other functions as are assigned by the ${\sf Extension}$ Board.

Section 3. Secretary

The secretary of the organization shall keep on file in the University of Nebraska Cooperative Extension Office in Dakota County, copies of all minutes and any written agreement entered into by the Extension Board, send copies of such agreements to the County Board and District Director, and perform such other functions as are assigned by the Extension Board. As required by Neb. Rev. Stat. SS2-1606 and 2-1607, R.R.S. 1943, as amended, the secretary shall

join the president in filing with the county clerk of the County on or before January 1 of each year (1) a report of program work during the preceding year; (2) a sworn itemized statement of expenditures during the preceding year, and (3) a budget or estimate of funds necessary for the carrying on of such work during the ensuing year. Such report shall also be provided at the same time to the University of Nebraska Cooperative Extension.

Section 4. Treasurer

The treasurer shall receive and disburse all county and local funds on the order of the Extension Board and shall report to the Extension Board at each regular meeting, the financial standing of the organization. A financial report of all funds shall be prepared quarterly for submission to the County Board and annually to the Dean and Director, Cooperative Extension Division, Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources, University of Nebraska. This office may be combined with that of the secretary.

Art. III: Committees

The president, with the approval of the Extension Board, may appoint persons to the following committees:

Program Advisory Committee

Nomination Panel

Budget Committee

Others as needed

- A. Program Advisory Committees shall be an integral part of the cooperative extension program's planning process. Program Advisory Committees shall consist of individuals in the County, EPU, or the adjacent area for the purposes of providing the Extension Board with specific advice, planning and evaluation of cooperative extension program needs, and further to assist in identifying resources necessary to facilitate programming. Persons having specific interests or skills relating to program needs should be included in the Program Advisory Committee whenever possible. Program Advisory Committees shall provide regular progress reports to the Extension Board through a representative or staff member or as otherwise directed by the Extension Board.
- $\mbox{\sc 4-H}$ and Family and Community Education Councils may also serve as Advisory Committees.
- B. The Nomination Panel shall coordinate the nomination of members for appointment to the Extension Board as that process is set forth in the Constitution, these Bylaws, and a written interlocal agreement between the County Board and the Board of Regents of the University of Nebraska.
- C. The Budget Committee shall make budget recommendations, and with the assistance of the Extension Educator, Extension Assistant or other staff assigned, prepare an annual budget for presentation to the County Board, as required herein.

Art. IV: Order of Business

At regular meeting of the Extension Board, the following order of business shall be observed:

- 1. Read and act upon minutes of prior meetings
- 2. Secretary's report
- 3. Treasurer's report
- 4. President's report
- 5. Extension Staff reports
- 6. Program Advisory Committee reports
- 7. Bills and communications
- 8. Unfinished business
- 9. New business, including planning for program priorities
- 10. Adjournment

Art. V: Parliamentary Authority

Robert's Rules of Order shall be the authority in matters not covered by the constitution or bylaws.

Art. VI: Amendments

These Bylaws may be amended at any regular or special meeting of the Extension Board, by a favorable vote of one-half of the total Extension Board membership.

The County of Dakota, Dakota County, Nebraska, a municipal corporation (County), has agreed to employ ______ ("Employee") and has agreed to furnish the cost of training the Employee at the Nebraska Law Enforcement Training Center at Grand Island, Nebraska, which will provide for certification of the Employee for the position of Deputy Sheriff with the Dakota County Sheriff's Office, subject to the terms and conditions of this agreement and.

The Employee acknowledges that the County would be put to considerable expense in training the Employee and that during the period of training the Employee will not be able to render full service to the County until the Employee is adequately trained, and,

The Employee further acknowledges that this agreement is to ensure that the County does not invest time and money training persons for the position of Deputy without receiving any services of a fully trained and certified officer for the period of time set forth herein.

NOW THEREFORE, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. That the County will furnish the cost of training the Employee for the position of Deputy at the Nebraska Law Enforcement Training Center at Grand Island, Nebraska for a period of ____ weeks commencing on ____, ___, 20___ through successful completion of such training Employee agrees to devote full time to the training.
- 2. That the Employee agrees that if his/her employment with the County is terminated on his/her own initiative within a period of three (3) years from the date of completion of training at the Nebraska Law Enforcement Training Center, Employee will on demand reimburse the County for all of the cost of training furnished him/her by the County. Cost of training as used in this statement shall include, but not be limited to study materials, Employee's salary paid during the period of training (including payments made by the County for social security, pension, insurance, etc.), and a prorated share of Employee's salary during periods of-on-the-job training (Field Training Program) following completion of instructional courses, as well as any other cost directly attributable to training of the Employee for position of Deputy.
- 3. Reimbursement will not be payable in the event that the Employee fails to satisfactorily complete or is dismissed during the training period, or in the event he or she is required to terminate his or her employment due to a disabling illness or injury. This exception shall not apply in the event that there is substantial evidence that the Employee has been dismissed as a result of misrepresenting his or her basic qualifications for employment or has caused his or her dismissal failure, illness or injury in an attempt to avoid repayment under the terms of this agreement.
- 4. In the event that the Employee is called to active military duty, has his or her probationary period extended, or is granted a leave of absence during the period covered by this agreement, the period of the agreement shall be extended accordingly.
- 5. This agreement shall become effective after completion of the training at the Nebraska Law Enforcement Training Center and shall remain in full force and effect for a period of three (3) years thereafter.
- 6. If the Employee fails to reimburse the County for the cost of training furnished to Employee by the County, upon demand by the County as provided for in this agreement, the County may bring civil action against the Employee in a court of competent jurisdiction and Employee agrees to pay the costs of that action as well as a reasonable attorney's fee to be determined by the Court and/or the County may deduct all, or any part of the cost of training, from funds which may be due the Employee, for any reason, from the County of Dakota, Dakota County, Nebraska.

The board opened the proposal from companies to provide the County with the County's Health Insurance after July 1, 2000. They received proposals from Blue Cross & Blue Shield, Mutual of Omaha, Regional Insurance Managers, Inc., Grandy Pratt Company and Group Marketing Services, Inc.

Commissioner Denker moved, seconded by Commissioner Engel to approve the Agreement with the State Probation Office for the drug testing of those individuals on the Pretrial Release Program as follows.

INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT PROVIDING FOR DRUG TESTING

SERVICES IN

DAKOTA COUNTY, NEBRASKA

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into this 20th day of March, 2000, by and between the County of Dakota ("County"), operating the Dakota County Pretrial Release Program and the State of Nebraska Probation Administration ("Department") (collectively referred to as the "parties") for the provision of drug testing services for pretrial adult offenders in Dakota County, Nebraska.

WHEREAS, the interlocal Cooperation Act, Neb. Rev. Stat. 13-801. et.seq., provides that units of local government of the State of Nebraska and Nebraska state agencies may enter into agreement for the joint and cooperative exercise of powers, privileges, or authority capable of being exercised by either agency; and

WHEREAS, Nebr. Rev. Stat, 13-807 provides that any one or more public agencies may contract with any one or more public agencies to perform any governmental service, activity, or other undertaking which each public agency entering into the contract is authorized by law to perform; and

WHEREAS, the County and the Department are public entities as defined by Neb. Rev. Stat. 13-803: and

WHEREAS, the County is authorized by state law to, and does, administer a pretrial release program for adult offenders; and

WHEREAS, the County is authorized by state law to, and desires to, periodically administer substance abuse testing to pretrial release offenders, as a condition of their release; and

WHEREAS, the Department is authorized by state law to, and is capable of, providing substance abuse testing equipment and services for adults placed on pretrial release; and

WHEREAS, the Department is willing to provide substance abuse testing equipment and services for adults placed on pretrial release within the County and to allow its employee providing such services to further coordinate substance abuse testing services within Dakota County for adult pretrial release offenders deemed necessary by the Dakota County Pretrial Release Program, in consideration of certain amounts to be paid and established pursuant to the terms of this Agreement for such services;

NOW THEREFORE, the parties mutually covenant and agree as follows:

- 1. The Department will provide the services of one (1) drug testing technician to the County, said technician's duties to primarily include, but not be limited to: (a) testing of pretrial offenders urine specimens delivered to the drug technician by a designated representative of the Dakota County Pretrial Release Program; (b) recording and reporting initial pretrial offender drug testing results to a designated representative of the Dakota County Pretrial Release Program; and (c) recording, reporting and retesting initial pretrial drug specimens, if requested by a designated representative of the Dakota County Pretrial Release Program.
- 2. The County, specifically the Dakota County Pretrial Release Program, will:
 (a) collect urine specimens it desires to be tested from adult offenders within its pretrial release program, in accordance with established Department protocol and deliver the same to the Department's drug technician; (b) maintain records of pretrial offenders tested in addition to the number of drug tests requested and performed on each pretrial offender; (c) submit documentation regarding pretrial offenders tested and the number of tests performed monthly to the County Clerk together with a claim for payment to the Department; and (d) provide a copy of said documentation and claim as noted in 2 (c) to the Department's drug technician.
- 3. For substance abuse equipment, testing, maintenance and necessary supplies, the County will pay the Department five dollars (\$5.00) for each drug test or retest requested by a designated representative of the Dakota County Pretrial Release Program. Payment is due from the County to the Department on a monthly basis, beginning on April 1st, for a period of one (1) year.
- 4. It is the expressed intent of the parties that this Agreement shall not create an employer/employee relationship between the County and the drug testing technician. In the performance of this Agreement, the drug testing technician will act in his/her capacity as an employee of the Department and shall be directed and supervised by the Department. The Department shall not receive any compensation of any sort for services rendered except as specifically set forth in this Agreement. The Department understands that it is responsible for providing its employee, agent, or any other person acting on behalf of the Department with any and all training, benefits, unemployment insurance, and workers' compensation insurance required by local, state or federal law.
- 5. This Agreement may be modified by mutual agreement of the parties hereto and may be renegotiated annually by the parties.
- 6. This Agreement may be terminated at any time by either party upon thirty (30) days written notice mailed or delivered to the other party.

7. This Agreement shall become effective immediately upon execution by the parties and shall remain in full force and effect until such time as it is amended or terminated pursuant to the provisions herein.

This agreement ("Agreement") is made between BI INCORPORATED ("BI"), a Colorado corporation with its principal place of business at 6400 Lookout Road, Boulder, CO 80301 and DAKOTA COUNTY ("Agency") with its principal place of business at 1601 Broadway, Dakota City, NE 68731. This Agreement outlines the responsibilities of each party relative to the operation of an Electronic Monitoring Program.

This Agreement by the stated parties is effective as of March 13.2000.

WHEREAS, Agency has determined that a present need exists for the products and services set forth in this Agreement, and

WHEREAS, Agency is authorized to enter into this Agreement by the laws and regulations to which Agency is subject; and

WHEREAS, Agency and BI agree that the terms and conditions of this Agreement apply to the products and services to be provided hereunder; and

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants herein contained, the parties agree as follows:

1 DEFINITIONS

- 1.1. Client: A person sentenced and subject to Agency's electronic home detention monitoring program.
- 1.2. Equipment: BI manufactured products including, but not limited to, Field Monitoring Devices, Transmitters, Drive-BI Monitors, Alcohol Monitoring Devices, as well as third party products provided by BI.
- 1.3. Unit: BI manufactured Field Monitoring Device ("FMD") together with a BI radio frequency transmitter ("Transmitter").
 - 1.4. Supplies: Straps, latches, and batteries for the BI Transmitter.
- 1.5. Alert Condition: An occurrence requiring BI to provide information to Agency, as further set forth in the attached Exhibit A.

- 1.6. Authorized Personnel: Those persons selected by Agency who are authorized to enroll Clients and select or adjust notification options.
- 1.7. Notification Options: Predefined parameters selected by Agency which instruct BI on how to respond to and notify Agency of an Alert Condition.

2. SERVICES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF BI

2.1. Training

BI will supply initial on-site training for Agency staff at no charge prior to the commencement of the monitoring program. The training shall be divided into classroom-type and practical hands-on instruction. Agency may choose to expand this training into additional and/or periodic training. Actual out of pocket expenses for all additional and/or periodic training, including one BI staff person's travel, room, board, and miscellaneous expenses will be borne by Agency.

2.2. Monitoring Services

BI will provide the following monitoring services to Agency for Agency's operation of an electronic home detention monitoring program. The monitoring services provided hereunder are specifically designed to determine by electronic means the presence of a person at a specified location (typically that person's place of residence).

- 2.2.1. BI will perform the functions of data entry and data storage for all properly enrolled Clients. The data entry function consists of the input of all required demographic, curfew, and system configuration information on each case into the central host computer system.
- 2.2.2. BI will maintain twenty-four (24) hour, seven (7) days per week monitoring of Clients who are properly enrolled hereunder by Agency.
- 2.2.3. BI will provide notification of Alert Conditions to authorized and identified Agency staff. Alert notification will be in accordance with Section 2.2.6 herein or as agreed upon in writing by Agency and BI.
- 2.2.4. Alert Condition and Equipment status information for each Client will be documented and maintained by BI. Upon a Client's completion of the monitoring term, BI will archive a termination record of all monitoring data compiled during the monitoring term. This record will be maintained by BI for a period of no less than five (5) years from the date of each Client's termination.
- 2.2.5. BI will assume the financial responsibility of all long distance telephone charges associated with Unit and central host computer communications.

2.2.6. Notification Options

BI's Notification Options are set forth below. Prior to the commencement of the services provided hereunder, Agency will select a default Notification Option for the enrollment of Clients (the "Agency Level Notification Option"). This selection will be made on a BI Agency Level Notification Form. The Agency Level Notification Option may be changed by Agency's Authorized Personnel at any time with the submission of a new Agency Level Notification Form. Unless otherwise specified by Agency at enrollment, Clients will be assigned the

selected Agency Level Notification Option. During the enrollment of any Client, or during the monitoring term of such Client, Agency's Authorized Personnel may select a Notification Option other than the previously selected Agency Level Notification Option. Such selection will be set forth on either the Client Enrollment or Client Change Form. Selections set forth on either the Client Enrollment or Client Change Form will take precedence over the Agency Level Notification Option. Equipment status alerts will be reported via the Agency Level Notification Option. Agency will be notified according to the Agency Level Notification Form.

2.2.6.1. Option 1

On a 24 hour, 7 day per week basis, all curfew and Equipment status alerts in excess of thirty (30) minutes will be reported to Agency staff immediately upon the completion of a thirty (30) minute period from the occurrence of the Alert Condition or as soon as possible thereafter. All tampers and missed call messages will be reported to Agency staff within fifteen (15) minutes of the monitoring center's receipt of those messages or as soon as possible thereafter. All other messages will be reported to Agency the next day via facsimile transmission of the daily summary report.

2.2.6.2. Option 2

All tampers and missed call messages will be reported to Agency staff within fifteen (15) minutes of the monitoring center's receipt of those messages or as soon as possible thereafter. All other messages will be reported to Agency the next day via facsimile transmission of the daily summary report. Notification Option 2 applies seven (7) days per week, including weekends and holidays.

2.2.6.3. Option 3

All Alert Conditions wilt be reported to Agency the next day via facsimile transmission of the daily summary report. Deviations from the Standard Notification Options be made by submitting a revised Agency Level Notification Form signed by Authorized Personnel. Agreed upon deviations may subject the Agency to an increase in the Monitoring Service Charge.

2.3. Customer Support

BI will provide Agency with its best efforts to answer specific customer support requests as related to the Equipment, monitoring services, and overall operation of the program.

2.4. Maintenance

BI shall maintain the Equipment at its expense. Maintenance will be performed at BI's facility. Notwithstanding such obligation, unless otherwise specified in Exhibit B, Agency shall be responsible for lost or missing Equipment and/or the cost of required repairs necessitated by (i) Agency's negligence or (ii) the damage or destruction of the Equipment by parties other than BI.

3. EQUIPMENT

3.1. Supplied by BI

In the event Agency utilizes BI supplied Units and other Equipment, then BI shall supply a sufficient quantity of Units to meet Agency's need subject to forty-eight (48) hour notice prior to shipment. Agency agrees that it shall assist BI in forecasting its Unit needs. All Units or other Equipment supplied

by BI shall be subject to all charges set forth in Section 6 herein, as applicable.

Agencies utilizing BI supplied Equipment shall be entitled to receive, at no additional charge, a reasonable quantity of Supplies and a reasonable quantity of installation kits (Unit activator, lead cutter, allen driver) to maintain Agency's active monitoring program.

3.2. Supplied by Agency

Agency may, subject to prior approval by BI, supply its own Units or equipment to be utilized hereunder. Any such Unit or item of equipment must be compatible with BI's host computer monitoring system. Units and/or equipment supplied by Agency will not be subject to the rental charges set forth in Section 6.1 and/or 6.2 herein. All other charges as set forth in Section 6 are considered applicable and are payable by Agency in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth in Section 6. In no event is Agency entitled to Unit supplies (batteries, latches, and straps) if it is supplying Units and/or Equipment hereunder.

3.3. Freight

Unless otherwise set forth on Exhibit B, any shipment made by one party to the other hereunder shall be made F.O.B. Destination.

4. MONITORING SYSTEM

4.1. Description

The monitoring system utilized hereunder is an active monitoring system consisting of a Transmitter, an FMD, and BI's central host computer system. Units are issued to the Clients by the Agency. The central host computer system is located in BI's offices. The Units communicate with the host computer system through the Client's standard telephone service.

4.2. System Maintenance

Agency acknowledges that BI must perform periodic maintenance on the host computer system. During the performance of this maintenance, the system may be required to be temporarily 'off- line'. Agency will be notified in advance of any such situation.

5. AGENCY'S OBLIGATIONS

Agency agrees as follows:

- 5.1. to retain complete authority for Client selection and management;
- 5.2. to be responsible for all liaison work with the involved courts and/or agencies;
 - 5.3. to provide BI with an Agency Level Notification Form;
 - 5.4. to identify Authorized Personnel;
- 5.5. to provide to BI required Client case and curfew information via the Client Enrollment Form and/or Client Change Form;

- 5.6. to identify and make available Agency staff and/or Equipment (fax, pager) for the purpose of notification by BI to Agency of alerts and Equipment status problems;
- 5.7. to perform or oversee orientation and installation of Equipment in compliance with BI policy. BI policy establishes a specifically correct method of Equipment installation. Orientation, in accordance with BI policy, establishes Equipment use guidelines. In the event that BI assumes liability for lost, stolen, or damaged Units, Agency will ensure that Equipment responsibility forms are signed by the Clients;
- 5.8. to establish an Alert Condition response policy and to respond to Alert Condition notifications in accordance with that policy.

6. COST OF SERVICES

6.1. Unit Rental Charge

For every Unit provided to Agency by BI, Agency shall pay to BI rent for each day in any given month that a Unit is in Agency's possession (the "Unit Rental Charge"). The Unit Rental Charge is as set forth on Exhibit B which is attached hereto and incorporated herein.

6.2. Additional Rental Charge

For any additional items of Equipment provided by BI, Agency shall pay to BI monthly rent for that item of Equipment in Agency's possession (the "Additional Rental Charge"). The Additional Rental Charge is as set forth on Exhibit B which is attached hereto and incorporated herein.

6.3. Monitoring Service Charge

For the purposes of this Agreement, an Active Unit is defined as a Unit which is assigned to a Client and is being monitored by BI (an "Active Unit"). An Active Unit Day is defined as any day, or any portion thereof, in which there is an Active Unit (an "Active Unit Day"). Every Active Unit is subject to a daily charge, the "Monitoring Service Charge", as set forth in Exhibit B hereto. For every Active Day, Agency shall pay to BI an amount based upon the Monitoring Service Charge.

6.4. Net 30

BI will invoice Agency on a monthly basis for all charges incurred during the month. Payment shall be made by Agency to BI within thirty (30) days of receipt of BI's invoice. Interest on any amount which is past due shall accrue at the rate of 1-1/2% per month, or if such rate exceeds the maximum rate allowed by law, then at such maximum rate, and shall be payable on demand.

6.5. Taxes

In the event any item hereunder is found to be subject to taxation in any form, except taxes based upon net income, Agency will pay as the same respectively come due, all taxes and governmental charges of any kind whatsoever together with any interest or penalties that may at any time be lawfully assessed or levied against or with respect to such item of equipment or services. In the event Agency is tax exempt, Agency agrees to supply BI with a tax exemption certificate.

The term of this Agreement is for one (1) year (unless terminated as provided herein) from the effective date of this Agreement. This Agreement, its terms and conditions, and authorized amendments are renewed automatically for succeeding periods of one (1) year each on the anniversary of its original effective date unless otherwise terminated as provided for herein. This Agreement may be terminated for convenience by either party upon sixty (60) days prior written notification to the other party. Cessation of services and responsibilities defined in this Agreement may not take place less than sixty (60) days from the receipt of notification except in the event of neglect of responsibility by either party. No termination may take place without this notification procedure. All notifications with respect to this Agreement shall be in writing and signed by a duly authorized representative of the party. Notification documents shall be sent by certified mail or delivered by messenger. Upon proper notification neither party shall be obligated to the other in any way outside those responsibilities defined in this Agreement. Notwithstanding, upon completion of BI services, Agency shall immediately return all property due to BI. In the event BI's Units, unused supplies and other such property are not returned within seven (7) days, Agency shall pay to BI, five dollars (\$5.00) per Unit per day until BI has all such Units and other property in its possession. BI is entitled to full payment for services rendered and accepted by Agency whether during the term of this Agreement or thereafter.

8. LIMITATION OF LIABILITY

Agency will be responsible for the proper use, management and supervision of the Equipment. Agency agrees that BI will not be liable for any damages caused by Agency's failure to fulfill these responsibilities.

8.1. Disclaimer of Warranty

EXCEPT AS SPECIFICALLY PROVIDED HEREIN, BI EXCLUDES THE WARRANTIES OF MERCHANTABILITY AND FITNESS OF THE SERVICE OR EQUIPMENT FOR A PARTICULAR PURPOSE. BI EXPRESSLY DISCLAIMS ANY WARRANTY THAT THE SERVICE OR EQUIPMENT IS IMPERVIOUS TO TAMPERING. THE FOREGOING WARRANTIES ARE IN LIEU OF ALL OTHER WARRANTIES, EXPRESSED OR IMPLIED.

8.2. Damages

IN NO EVENT WILL BI BE LIABLE FOR ANY INDIRECT, SPECIAL, INCIDENTAL OR CONSEQUENTIAL DAMAGES, EVEN IF BI HAS KNOWLEDGE OF THE POSSIBILITY OF THE POTENTIAL LOSS OR DAMAGE, IN CONNECTION WITH OR ARISING OUT OF THE PROVIDING, PERFORMANCE, OR USE OF THE SERVICE OR EQUIPMENT PROVIDED UNDER THIS AGREEMENT.

8.3. Acts

IN NO EVENT DOES BI ASSUME ANY RESPONSIBILITY OR LIABILITY FOR ACTS THAT MAY BE COMMITTED BY PERSONS AND/OR CLIENTS THAT ARE SUBJECT TO AGENCY'S ELECTRONIC MONITORING PROGRAM.

9. INDEMNIFICATION COVENANTS

9.1. General

BI will indemnify Agency from and against all liability resulting from the negligence or willful misconduct of BI, its employees and agents in the providing of the services set forth herein. Agency will indemnify BI from and against all liability resulting from the negligence or willful misconduct of Agency, its employees and agents in the operation and use of the services as set forth herein.

9.2. Acts

Because BI does not approve those persons and/or Clients subject to Agency's electronic monitoring program. Agency agrees to indemnify BI from and against all liability resulting from the acts committed by those persons subject to its electronic monitoring program.

- 9.3. The term "liability" includes but is not limited to legal fees and expenses, penalties and interest.
 - 9.4. This indemnification provision shall remain in effect even if:
 - 9.4.1. Agency has made full payment under this Agreement; or
 - 9.4.2. This Agreement is terminated.

10. INSURANCE

Each party hereto shall maintain comprehensive general liability insurance, including acts, errors or omissions and contractual liability insurance, in an amount not less than \$1,000,000. Upon request, the parties hereto shall furnish to the other a certificate of insurance or other evidence that the required insurance is in effect.

11. FORCE MAJEURE

BI shall not be liable for any delay in the performance of any obligation due to Agency under this Agreement due to any cause beyond BI's reasonable control, including, without limitation, acts of God, labor disputes, fire, natural phenomena, governmental restrictions.

12. GENERAL

Each party is obligated to protect the proprietary rights and trade secrets which must be revealed during the course of business. Such obligation shall be for the term of the Agreement and five (5) years thereafter. Protection shall be interpreted as against the use of such information in a way deemed detrimental to the other party. Publicly available information shall not be considered proprietary.

This Agreement is limited in its scope to its defined purpose. It in no way implies that either party has specific knowledge or bears responsibility for the business practices of the other party. All business practices and contract compliance outside the defined conditions of this Agreement and authorized amendments are the sole responsibility of each party. Any provision of this Agreement which is found to be prohibited by law shall be ineffective to the extent of such prohibition without invalidating the remainder of this Agreement. Preprinted terms and conditions of any purchase order or other instrument issued by Agency in connection with this Agreement which are in addition to or inconsistent with the terms and conditions of this Agreement will not be binding on BI and will not apply to this Agreement.

13. GOVERNING LAW

This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Colorado.

In the event that a dispute arises with respect to any of the provisions herein contained or any other matter affecting the relationship between BI and Agency it shall be resolved by arbitration in Denver, Colorado in accordance with the rules and procedures of the American Arbitration Association, and judgment upon the award rendered may be entered into any court having jurisdiction. All

attorneys' fees and associated expenses shall be awarded to the prevailing party.

14. ENTIRE AGREEMENT

The representations made in this Agreement constitute the entire agreement. No prior or contemporaneous negotiations, understandings, or agreements shall be valid unless in writing and signed by authorized representatives of each party.

15. COUNTERPARTS

This Agreement may be executed in any number of and by the different parties hereto on separate counterparts, each of which when so executed shall be deemed to be an original, and such counterparts shall together constitute but one and the same instrument.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the parties have executed this Agreement by their duly authorized representatives, effective as of the date first set forth above.

ALERT/MESSAGE DESCRIPTIONS

CURFEW ALERTS

Did Not Return: The Client did not return after the scheduled period started. This message is sent if the Transmitter In Range message is not received within fifteen minutes after the Client is scheduled to be in the residence.

Did Not Leave: The Client did not leave the range of the FMD during a scheduled leave period. This message is only sent if the Transmitter Out of Range is not received within fifteen minutes of the leave time. This message is only sent if a must leave schedule is in place.

Transmitter In Range: Occurs when the FMD receives a message from a matching transmitter when the Client comes into range of the FMD.

Transmitter Out of Range: Occurs when the FMD has not received a signal from the transmitter for six minutes. TAMPER ALERTS

Transmitter Open Strap: The Client has removed or attempted to remove the transmitter, or the transmitter was disassembled to replace the battery. If the Client tampered with the transmitter in range of the FMD, the tamper message will be called in immediately. If the transmitter is being operated in manual reset mode, and is tampered out of range of the FMD, the actual time of tamper is recorded and sent immediately when the Client comes in range. If the transmitter is being operated in manual reset mode, an officer must use the BI Activator to reset the transmitter.

Transmitter Close Strap: The transmitter is restored from its previous tamper status. If the transmitter is being operated in automatic mode and automatically resets while out of range of the FMD, the time of restoration will be recorded

and sent immediately upon coming in range. Note: The transmitter must be properly affixed to the Client in order to receive this message. It is recommended that a physical inspection of the transmitter is conducted after receipt of this message.

Tamper Unit Case: The FMD case has been opened or the internal circuitry of the FMD has been disrupted.

Restore Unit Case: The FMD's previous tamper status has been restored. ${\tt EQUIPMENT}$ STATUS ALERTS

Missed Call Late: The callback from the FMD has not been received within 45 minutes of the scheduled callback time.

Power Fail AC: Power to the FMD was interrupted. This message is sent eight seconds after the AC power is interrupted either by a power outage or by the power adapter being unplugged. When the power is interrupted, the FMD immediately switches to battery backup. The host computer then waits fifteen minutes to see if a restore message is called in from the FMD. It a restore message is not received within fifteen minutes, then the Power Fail message is sent and an alert is generated.

Power Restore AC: The power to the FMD has been restored.

Power Fail Telephone: The FMD detected that the telephone line plugged into the FMD has been disconnected for more than thirty seconds. This message could also be the result of insufficient voltage.

Power Restore Telephone: The telephone line to the FMD has been restored. Unit Battery Low. The internal FMD battery has approximately ten minutes of reserve power remaining. If this message is unable to be sent the unit shuts down in ten minutes and all messages held in memory are lost.

Manual Restart: Indicates that the power switch has been keyed on. This message also is sent upon power restoration after complete depletion of the FMD's back up battery.

Transmitter Not Found: The FMD has not received a signal from the transmitter within six minutes following the installation.

Transmitter Mode Automatic: The transmitter tamper reset mode is set for automatic. If the transmitter is restored following a tamper, the transmitter will automatically reset seventeen minutes after proper installation.

Transmitter Mode Manual: The transmitter tamper reset mode is set for manual. In the manual mode, a tampered transmitter can only be reset by the BI Activator.

Transmitter Error Battery Low: The transmitter battery is low and must be replaced within five days.

Transmitter Restore Battery: The transmitter battery is now installed. This message is received when the FMD is first installed in the Client's residence (if the battery is transmitting).

Location Verify Expire: The host computer was unsuccessful in its attempt to call the FMD for a location verification.

Location Verify No Data: The host computer is unable to complete a location verification because the Client's residence telephone number was not entered into the database.

Log Overflow Fault: The FMD holds up to 64 messages in memory. The Log Overflow Fault message indicates that the memory is full and is stored in the event that a long duration problem has occurred such as a telephone line disconnection. Once the Log Overflow Fault message (64th messages) is recorded, all messages received thereafter are saved in order of priority. Example: Transmitter Open Strap.

COMMUNICATION MESSAGES

Carrier Not Detected: The FMD did not receive a carrier tone from the host computer's modem and the messages were not transmitted.

Host No Answer: The FMD attempted to call the host computer, but received no answer.

Line Tied Up Level 1: The FMD attempted to call the host computer, but the line was in use. This message is recorded on the first series of attempts to call the host computer once connection has been made.

Line Tied Up Level 2: Same as Line Tied Up Level 1 except this message is recorded on the second series of attempts to call the host computer once connection has been made.

Line Tied Up Level 3: Same as Line Tied Up Level 1 except this message is recorded on the third series of attempts to call the host computer once connection has been made.

Link Lost Error: The FMD's communication with the host computer was interrupted and the information did not transfer. This message is usually caused by interference on the telephone line.

No Ring Detected: The FMD attempts to call the host, but does not detect a carrier tone.

- 1. Duration: This agreement shall continue for a period of one (1) year expiring June 1, 2001.
- 2. Separate Legal or Administrative Entity; Delegation. The administration of this agreement is delegated to the Dakota County Board of Commissioners or their appropriate designee or such individual or entity as they may properly designate.
- 3. Purpose. The purpose of this agreement is to provide for a 911 emergency telephone communications system for the territory consisting of the telephone exchange boundaries of South Sioux City, Dakota City, Homer, Emerson, Jackson, and Hubbard, all of which are located within the jurisdictional boundaries of the parties hereto.
- 4. Manner of Financing and Maintaining a Budget. Each party shall continue to impose a one dollar (\$1.00) per line per month surcharge upon all telephone lines within each party's jurisdiction, pursuant to Neb. Rev. Statue. 86-1003 and 86-1006. The Dakota County Board of Commissioners or their appropriate designee shall administer said 911 emergency telephone communications Systems;

shall establish and maintain a budget therefore; shall establish and maintain rules and regulation for the operation thereof; and shall acquire, hold, and dispose of real and personal property used in this undertaking solely in its name.

- 5. Termination. This agreement shall remain in effect and be in force until June 1, 2001. Termination prior to that time shall require the mutual consent of all parties.
- 6. Administrator. The Dakota County Board of Commissioners or their appropriate designee is hereby appointed administrator for this cooperative undertaking.
- 7. A Manner of Disposing of Property. It is understood and agreed that all property will be acquired in the name of the Dakota County Board of Commissioners or their appropriate designee. Property shall be disposed of in accordance with the laws and rules applicable to said Department. Proceeds of any such disposal shall be and remain the property of said Department.

They asked the board to consider the project and at some point the board will have to adopt a resolution supporting the project similiar to: Resolution to Support Pigeon/Jones Creek Special Watershed Project

The Dakota County Board of Commissioners supports the Pigeon/Jones Creek Special Watershed Project being developed by the Papio-Missouri River NRD and the Natural Resources Conservation Service. This multipurpose project will provide financial incentives to landowners to protect the uplands from soil erosion and sedimentation and reduce flood damages and deposition of sediment in the bottomlands of the watershed.

Public benefits will include reduced maintenance costs in the drainage system, improved water quality, wildlife habitat and the potential for development of a public recreation area.

Arnie Mellick and the board briefly discussed upgrading the minimum maintenance road south of the golf course being constructed on the South East corner of the 4 way stop lights west of Dakota City.

WHEREAS, TelePartners and Cable One, Inc. ("Cable One") are parties to an Asset Purchase Agreement dated as of March 30, 2000 (the "Purchase Agreement"), that provides for the transfer (the "Transfer") of the System and the Franchise from

TelePartners to Cable One at the closing of the transaction contemplated by the Purchase Agreement (the "Closing"); and

WHEREAS, TelePartners and Cable One have requested consent by the Franchise Authority to the Transfer; and

WHEREAS, the Transfer is deemed to be in the best interest of the residents of Dakota County, Nebraska.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The Franchise Authority hereby consents to and approves, subject to applicable law, the assignment by TelePartners of its right, title and interest in the Franchise to Cable One, and the assumption by Cable One of the obligations of TelePartners under the Franchise which arise from events or circumstances occurring from and after Closing.

SECTION 2. The Franchise Authority confirms that: (a) the Franchise is currently in full force and effect and expires on December 20, 2008; (b) TelePartners is in compliance with the provisions of the Franchise; and (c) there exists no known fact or circumstance which constitutes, or with the passage of time or the giving of notice or both would constitute, a default or breach under the Franchise, or would allow the Franchise Authority to cancel or terminate the rights under the Franchise except upon the expiration of the full term thereof.

SECTION 3. The Transfer shall not become effective until the Closing.

further south in distance than the east-west distance from the gate, thence in a easterly direction with the property line extending north again on the east side of the horse track itself to a point, thence extending in an easterly direction to the east property line of the parcel.

Ms. Meinen informed Mr. Jensen and Mr. Cahill that they should get the board's approval prior to committing to any kind of a purchase agreement, because it is at the board's discretion whether the board levies the funds or not.

The subject of purchasing and building new fair grounds was briefly discussed. There was also concern about a lagoon on the property that the Ag. Society had made the offer on. The lagoon accommodates sewer and drainage. The real concern for the lagoon was that there were no solids in the lagoon. All that you ever see, even when ATOKAD was running was a wet spot in the center of the lagoon. All present were stymied as to where everything was going.

The Ag. Society indicated that they proposed \$50,000.00 down and the balance of the \$150,000.00 would be paid to Taylor Martin over the next 20 years. The Ag. Society said that Taylor & Martin would finance them at a lower than normal interest rate.

He was concerned about the length of time that prisoners were spending in the facility before they are sentenced.

Judge Redmond, Judge Rogers, County Attorney Robert Finney and Nicole Johnson were in the audience and discussion was had concerning the Jail issue. Judge Rogers expressed concern that there are presently 2000 warrants for people that did not show up for court. This reflects that they have no respect for the law. He asked if he should just dismiss them.

Chairperson Meinen left at 4:15~p.m. and Vice Chair Engel took the chair reserved for the chairperson.

Mr. Bobier reported that he had talked with Paul High, Weed Supt., and he felt that he was doing a good job.

Bill Engel reported that he has had complaints on the road, which Dick Stinger lives on.

The board considered the letter from the Probation Administrator and the Interlocal Agreement to provide training in de-escalating juvenile aggression in schools.

INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT TO PROVIDE TRAINING IN DE-ESCALATING JUVENILE AGGRESSION IN SCHOOL

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into this 22nd day of May, 2000, by and between the County of Dakota ("County") and the State of Nebraska Probation Administration ("Department") (collectively referred to as "the parties") for the provision of training for two probation officers located in Dakota County, specifically, Mike Carlson and Todd Beacom. The training described herein will assist Probation Officers Carlson and Beacom in the performance of their duties in and around Dakota County schools and in addressing the needs of juveniles on probation who attend those schools. This training will also assist Probation Officers Carlson and Beacom as they work with Dakota County school teachers, counselors, administrators and service providers who must also address the issues presented by at-risk juveniles in school.

WHEREAS, the Interlocal Cooperation Act, Neb. Rev. Stat. \$13-801, et. sea., provides that units of local government of the State of Nebraska and Nebraska state agencies may enter into agreement for the joint and cooperative exercises of powers, privileges, or authority capable of being exercised by either agency; and

WHEREAS, Neb. Rev. Stat. §13-807 provides that any one or more public agencies may contract with any one or more public agencies to perform any governmental service, activity, or other undertaking which each public agency entering into the contract is authorized by law to perform; and

WHEREAS, the County and the Department are public entities as defined by Neb. Rev. Stat. \$13-803; and

WHEREAS, the County has a legitimate public interest in the safety and security of students, teachers and others in and around the schools located in the county; and

WHEREAS, the Department has a legitimate desire and need to train its employees in the skills of de-escalation of juvenile aggression; and

WHEREAS, the County is willing to provide additional training for the two probation officers operating within the County, specifically, Mike Carlson and Todd Beacom, in consideration of a certain amount to be paid and established pursuant to the terms of this Agreement for such services;

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties mutually covenant and agree as follows:

1. The Department shall provide two (2) probation officers, specifically, Mike Carlson and Todd Beacom, training as trainers in a course titled "De-escalating Juvenile Aggression in School," said course currently being developed and taught

in Dakota County under a grant received by the County from the Nebraska Crime Commission.

- 2. The Department shall pay the County one thousand six hundred forty dollars and no cents (\$1,640.00) no later than June 30, 2000, to cover the cost of training Mike Carlson and Todd Beacom.
- 3. The County shall, through the operations of its Nebraska Crime Commission grant for development of the training course titled "De-escalating Juvenile Aggression in School," and the County's contract with The National Justice Group to provide such training, allow Mike Carlson and Todd Beacom to be trained as trainers of said course and allow them to serve in the capacity of co-trainer in three training classes to be held no later than December 31 2000.
- 4. It is the expressed intent of the parties that this Agreement shall not create an employer/employee relationship between the County, probation officers, or the Department. In the performance of this Agreement, Mike Carlson and Todd Beacom will act in their capacity as employees of the Department and shall be directed and supervised by the Department.
- 5. This agreement may be modified by the mutual agreement of the parties 6. This agreement shall become effective immediately upon execution by the parties and shall remain in full force and effect until such time as it is amended or terminated pursuant to the provisions herein

THIS AGREEMENT made and entered into this 16th day of May 2000, by and between the County of Dakota Nebraska (herein referred to as "County"), and Northeast Nebraska Telephone Company (hereinafter referred to as "Company").

WHEREAS, the Company is granted the right to operate and maintain communication facilities set forth in writing along, upon, across and under the public roads of this State pursuant to Nebraska Revised Statute Section 86-301, 1943 (Reissue 1987).

NOW, THEREFORE.

- 1. The Company shall bury the fiber-optic cable not less than 42" or not less than 36" for all copper cables below the surface of the public road and public right-of-way as set forth in the construction drawings attached hereto.
- 2. THE COMPANY SHALL BURY INDICATOR TAPE of warning color at a depth of 12" to 24" deep above the location of the fiber-optic cable at the time of construction across the surface of the public road and public right-of-way.
- 3. The Company shall establish and maintain said fiber-optic and copper cable along said public road and public right-of-way as set forth in the construction drawings attached hereto.
- 4. The Company shall furnish County with construction drawings which show the approximate location of the installation to be constructed by it tinder fills agreement which drawings shall be incorporated and made a pail hereof by reference.
- 5. The Company shall fill and pack any excavation work incident to the construction of said installation in such manner as to prevent washing and to maintain the same at all times in such manner as to avoid holes or excavations that may interfere with the use of said roadbed and the County's maintenance thereof.
- 6. The Company assumes full responsibility for the completion and continuous maintenance of said project in a workmanlike manner and to save the County harmless from any and all claims for damages or injuries caused by or resulting from such installation and usage and the continuous maintenance thereof.
- 7. The Company, as Owner of the property installed under this agreement, shall bold the County harmless from any damage to such installation by county construction or maintenance operations; PROVIDED the County complies with all notice provisions of Nebraska Revised Statutes and this agreement to the Company.
- 8. The County will give the Company sufficient notice of any proposed construction or maintenance work that is likely to affect the use of the property installed under this agreement so that the Company can arrange to protect the service and avoid damage.
- 9. If the installation of said property involves excavation, the Company shall mechanically compact the fill and restore the surface to its original condition.
- 10. The Company, during the period of construction, shall not unduly hinder the flow of traffic on said county road right-of-way.

This agreement made and entered into between the Board of Supervisors of Thurston county and the Sheriff of Thurston county, hereinafter collectively referred to as Thurston County and the Board of Supervisors of Dakota County and the Sheriff of Dakota County, hereinafter collectively referred to as Dakota County. The parties to this agreement in consideration of the mutual covenants and stipulations set out herein agree as follows:

Section One

Thurston County hereby agrees to allow Dakota county to house prisoners excluding juvenile prisoners and detainees, for said county in the jail facility located at Pender, Nebraska, upon the request of the Sheriff of Dakota County. Thurston County agrees to accept said prisoners, excluding juvenile prisoners and detainees, except for just cause of refusal, such as overcrowded conditions, need for medical treatment, contagious diseases, high security risks, non-payment of sums owing, or other conditions which make the acceptance unreasonable for Thurston County.

Section Two

Dakota County hereby agrees to pay Thurston County the sum of \$45.00 per day plus the fee for a jailer or matron should Thurston County have no prisoners at that time which would require a jailer or matron. In addition to the above fee, Dakota County hereby agrees to pay and assume all medical costs, which accrue as a result of Thurston County housing said prisoners for Dakota County. The per day rate shall be billed to Dakota County by the Sheriff of Thurston County. Any other expenses which shall accrue shall be billed to Dakota County by the Board of Supervisors of Thurston County. Said bills shall be paid by Dakota County within ninety (90) days of receipt of said bill.

Section Three

This agreement shall be in full force and effect for one year commencing January 1, 2000 and shall expire on December 31, 2001, which shall automatically renew for successive one-year periods. Either party may terminate this agreement by giving the other at least thirty (30) days advance written notice. Said notice shall be delivered to the County Clerk of the other county.

Section Four

Dakota County agrees to provide transportation to the Pender facility for admission. Section Five All parties agree that all juvenile offenders are specifically excluded from the terms of this agreement for detention services. The County of Thurston shall have no obligation to house juvenile prisoners or detainees for the County of Dakota nor will the County of Dakota request the County of Thurston to house juveniles. Section Six This agreement shall be binding upon the successors in the office of any party to this agreement. IN

Chairperson Marjorie Meinen called their regularly scheduled meeting to order at 1:30 p.m. with the Pledge of Allegiance.

PRESENT: Commissioners Fred Denker, William Engel, Marjorie Meinen, Jack Bobier, Jackie Hartnett and Ted Piepho, Secretary.

Russ Gifford, Gifford and Associates, appeared before the board promoting his consultant business. He claimed to have knowledge of the county's present computer equipment and felt he could provide the county with an overall plan so that future purchases could be made to achieve a common goal of providing public access to the county's records via the internet.

Dick Leitschuck appeared before the board and solicited funds on behalf of the Nebraska Loess Hills RC & D.

Commissioner Hartnett moved, seconded by Commissioner Bobier to authorize a \$200.00 expenditure to the Nebraska Loess Hills RC & D.

ROLL CALL VOTE: Hartnett- Yea, Engel- Yea, Meinen- Yea, Denker- Yea, Bobier- Yea, UNANIMOUS MOTION CARRIED.

Chair Meinen opened the Public Hearing on Whispering Meadows Subdivision at 2:00 p.m.

Chair Meinen asked if there were any comments in opposition to the granting of Whispering Meadows Subdivision. There were none.

She asked Arnie Mellick to familiarize them with the request.

Mr. Mellick explained the project and said that the Planning & Zoning Board recommended approving the project at their last meeting.

He added that he had a question on the Annexation and Dedication Section on the Final Plat. He called attention to the fact that the final plat has wording that the roads be dedicated to the county.

There was discussion regarding whether the county would be in favor of accepting the roads.

It was expressed by a couple of the board members that they were not in favor of signing the final plat with that wording unless they were sure that the wording did not bind the county into accepting the roads.

Clyde Flowers, from Gilmore and Associates, said that this was a communication problem between Mr. John Kahler and Gilmore. Normally the roads are always dedicated and they did not receive an information that this project would be different.

Mr. Kahler said that in order to change the drawing of the final plat, it would have to be sent to Chicago. He expressed they don't have that kind of time, as they would like to get started on this project as soon as possible.

It was brought to the board's attention that Section 19 on page 5 of the Covenants, which follows, identifies this road to be a private road. Mr. Kahler said that would supersede the language on the final plat. Kahler also said that if something was misrepresented, he would be willing to straighten it out later.

RESTRICTIVE COVENANTS

The undersigned, being the sole owner(s) of the property described herein, herein after referred to as Declarants, hereby impose the following uniform restrictive covenants and building restrictions on the property described herein which shall run with the land and be binding upon subsequent grantees.

Description of Property: * Lots One (1) through Forty-four (44), Whispering Meadows, an Addition to Dakota county, Nebraska.

Uniform Restrictive Covenants and building restrictions:

- 1. No lot shall be used except for residential building. No building shall be erected, altered, placed, or permitted to remain on any one lot other than one detached single-family dwelling not to exceed two stories in height and an attached two or three car garage. Only above-ground dwellings shall be permitted. This covenant is intended to prohibit the building of earth shelter houses and dwellings, houses surrounded by berms and underground houses. No building or structure, or any part thereof, shall be erected or placed thereon nearer than 30 feet to any street line nor nearer than 10 feet to the side lines of any building plot upon which a single residence is to be erected.
- 2. No mobile home shall be constructed on, or placed on any lot. -A mobile home is defined as any structure that is designed to movable or has a steel frame bottom.
- 3. All garages must be large enough to contain two-passenger cars. No smaller garages are permitted. All garages and outbuildings must be of new construction. No used garages or outbuildings may be placed upon said real estate.
- 4. No trailer, basement, tent, garage, barn or other outbuildings erected on the said real estate shall at any time be used as a residence, temporarily or permanently, nor shall any structure of a temporary character be used as a residence.
- 5. Storage sheds and similar structures shall not be permitted unless they are architecturally consistent with the residence on the same lot, not more than one story in height and smaller than 300 square feet

- 6. Dwellings constructed on any lot shall have minimum ground floor areas (excluding attached garages, breezeways, porches, and patios), as follows:
 - a) One-story dwellings: 1,100 square feet;
- b) Split-level dwellings: 750 square feet first level; 500 square feet second level.
 - c) One and one-half story dwellings. 900 square feet on main floor.
 - d) Two story dwellings: 900 square feet on main floor.
- 7. No residential lot shall be re-subdivided into building lots other than those shown on the recorded plat heretofore referred to, nor shall any building be erected on any residential building lot other than shown on said plat.
- 8. The owner of each lot shall keep such lot or lots free from weeds and debris whether such lot is improved or unimproved. Each lot may have a lawn area. No trees may be removed that are more than 3 inches in diameter without approval by the Declarants of these covenants or the whispering Meadows Association, except such trees that are diseased or dead and must be removed to protect the viability of surrounding vegitation. It is the intent of this restriction that no trees older than tour (4) years old be removed, except where lawn areas are permitted.
- 9. No noxious or offensive trade of activity shall be carried on upon any lot, nor shall anything be done thereon which may be or become an annoyance and nuisance to the neighborhood.
- 10. No sign of any kind shall be displayed to the public view on the premises except signs of not more than three (3) square feet advertising property for sale or rent, or signs used by a builder to advertise the property during the advertising and sales period.
- 11. No fence, wall, hedge, planting, except shade trees or single plants or bushes, or obstruction of any kind, shall be or be allowed to become more than five (5) feet in height anywhere on the premises, nor shall any of them be permitted to extend nearer than thirty (30) feet from any street line.
- 12. No animals, livestock or poultry of any kind shall be raised, bred or kept on any lot. However, a total of three dogs, cats and other household pets may be kept on the lots, so long as they are not kept, bred or maintained for commercial purposes, and so long as they comply with all federal, state and local laws restricting their number, confinement or noise, and so long as they do not become a nuisance. Noise from any such animals must not deter from the quiet enjoyment of the neighbors' property.
- 13. No more than one boat, trailer, or motor home, shall be parked outside on any lot at any one time without approval by the Declarants of this Declaration or the Whispering Meadows Association. No boat, trailer or motor home shall be permanently stored upon any lot unless stored in a garage. No unlicensed or inoperative vehicles shall be allowed on the properties at any time and no vehicle of any kind shall be allowed to stand unattended for a period of more than 24 hours. All boats must be stored in garages from October to March of each year.
- $14.\ \mbox{No commercial transactions of any kind shall be permissible upon the real estate at any time.}$

- 15. Construction of a residence should be completed within nine (9) months of the beginning of said construction.
- 16. Each owner, at such owner's sole cost and expense, shall maintain and repair the residence constructed on the lots herein, keeping the same in a condition comparable to the condition of the residence at the time of its initial completion, normal wear and tear only excepted.
- 17. Each lot shall maintain its own well and septic system. Each lot shall be responsible for maintaining and repairing their septic system at their sole cost and expense.
- 18. No structure, facility, or plantings shall be constructed or placed on the property, nor shall any existing structure or facility be altered in any manner that alters the drainage pattern of the property. The foregoing notwithstanding, where there exists on any lot or lots a natural condition or accumulation of storm or surface water remaining over an extended period of time, the Owner(s) may, with written approval by Whispering Meadows Association, take such steps as shall be necessary to remedy such condition, provided that no alterations or diversions of such natural flow proposed by the Owner(s) will cause damage to other lots or property, either inside or outside the confines of the property covered by these covenants.
- 19. Owners of the lots in this subdivision will be required to join the "Whispering Meadows Association". Said Association shall be a nonprofit association for maintenance purposes. Upon the sale of 25% of the lots in this subdivision, a private road shall be constructed and maintained by the Association for the use of the property owners. The private road shall consist of a graded gravel road, which will provide access to each lot in the subdivision. Each property owner shall be responsible for their share of the maintenance costs determined by dividing the assessed value of their real estate plus all improvements thereon against the assessed value of all such properties in the subdivision
- 20. If all or any portion of a residence is damaged or destroyed by fire or other casualty, it shall be the duty of the owner or owners, with all due diligence, to rebuild, repair or reconstruct such residence in a manner that will substantially restore it to its appearance and condition immediately prior to the casualty. The construction shall be undertaken within one (1) month after the damage occurs, and shall be completed within six (6) months after the damage occurs, unless prevented by causes beyond the control of the owner or owners.
- 21. Radio and television antennae may be constructed on the lots, but their height shall be limited to no more than 15 feet above the highest point on the house. The span on top of the antenna cannot cover more than 32 square feet. No satellite dishes in excess of 20 inches in diameter will be permitted in this subdivision.
- 22. All mailboxes shall conform to postal requirements as provided by the United States Postal Service in terms of height, distance from the street and size of the box.
- 23. Easements as shown on the recorded plat are provided for the installation and maintenance of utilities and for drainage purposes. Within these easements, no structure, planting or other materials shall be placed or permitted to remain which may damage or interfere with the installation and maintenance of utilities. No landscaping, grading or construction shall change

the direction or flow of drainage channels in the easements, no landscaping, grading or construction shall be undertaken or completed if it will in any way obstruct or retard the flow of water through the drainage channels in the easements. The easement area of each lot and all improvements in it shall be maintained continuously by the owner of the lot, except for those improvements for which a public authority or utility company is responsible. No permanent plantings or structures shall be constructed or maintained in the utility easements.

- 24. These covenants shall inure to the benefit of and be binding upon all owners of any lot herein described, their heirs, assigns and successors in interest. If any party so bound shall violate or attempt to violate any of the covenants or restrictions herein, any person or persons owning any other lot herein described may prosecute any proceedings at law or in equity against: such person or persons violating or attempting to violate any such covenant or restriction, either to prevent him or them from doing so by injunction or to recover damages or other dues for such violation. For the purpose of the paragraph, a person owning any portion of a lot shall be deemed to be the owner of the lot.
- 25. These covenants are to run with the land and shall be binding on all parties and all persons claiming under them for a period of twenty-one (21) years from the date these covenants are recorded and for any renewal period permitted by Nebraska Revised Statutes as may be amended.
- 26. Invalidation of any one of these covenants by judgment or court order shall in no way affect any of the other provisions, which shall remain in full force and effect.
- 27. Declarants may, at their sole discretion, from time to time, elect to bring within the scheme of these covenants all or any portion of property legally described on Exhibit A attached hereto and incorporated herein. The additions authorized by this section shall be made by recording in the Office of the Register of deeds of Dakota County, Nebraska, a supplementary declaration with respect to the additional property which shall extend the scheme of this Declaration to the property to be annexed. Such supplementary declarations may contain such complementary additions and modifications of the covenants and restrictions contained herein as are not inconsistent with the scheme of these Covenants. At such time as the Declarant has caused the Recording of such supplementary declarations, then in such event: a) the provisions of these Covenants applicable to any common area located on such annexed property, and the rights of Declarant with respect thereto, and all other rights, easements, covenants, restrictions, burdens uses and privileges appurtenant to the common area shall include and apply to the common area as extended by such annexation; b) every person or entity who shall become an owner of any lot located in the annexed property shall be and become a member of the Whispering Meadows Association on the same terms and conditions and subject to the same qualifications and limitations, as those members who are then owners of lots located on the property; c) Declarant shall have and enjoy in such annexed property all easements and exercise all rights, privileges and immunities reserved to them in these covenants in the same manner and with the same force and effect as though the term property as used in these covenants included such annexed property; and d) in all other respects, all of the provisions of these Covenants shall include and apply to such annexed property in the same manner and with the same force and effect as though such annexed property had been originally subject to the provisions of these Covenants.

- 28. Declarants shall have the right to enter into agreements with the Owners or any Lot or Lots (without the consent of owners of other Lots, or adjoining or adjacent property) to deviate from any and all of the covenants set forth in this Declaration, provided that there are practical difficulties or particular hardships evidenced by the requesting Owner, in Declarants sole discretion, and any such deviation (which shall, if Declarant shall request, be evidenced by an agreement in writing) shall not constitute a waiver of the particular covenant involved or any other covenant as to the remaining property. The foregoing notwithstanding, no such deviations from any of the covenants and restrictions contained herein shall violate Nebraska law.
- 29 During the period of construction and/or marketing of the Property, the Declarant and its agent shall have the right of ingress and egress, and the right to install any improvements, over, across, and through all easement areas within the property. Further, Declarants shall have the right to store such equipment and materials as Declarants deem necessary for the purpose of construction and marketing during said period.
- 30. So long as the Declarants herein, control title to one (1) or more lots, these Restrictive Covenants may be amended by an instrument in writing setting forth the amendment(s) and executed by the Declarants. Thereafter, provisions or this Declaration may be amended by an instrument in writing setting forth the amendments executed by the Owners of the Lots at that time representing not less than seventy-five percent (75%) of the Lots covered by these covenants However, notwithstanding the foregoing, there shall be no amendments to the Restrictive Covenants that are not in compliance with Nebraska law.

Midstates Electric placed a bid envelope at 8:45 a.m., Monday, June 19, 2000 for the amount of \$62,000.00, which had a bid bond in it. At 10:40 a.m. Midstates Electric placed another envelope at the clerks office for \$68,000.00. Ten minutes after mine and \$500.00 higher, which had no bond in it, now having two bids at the clerks office.

Say if my bid would have been \$61,000.00, which one of Midstates bids would they say they wanted to stand good? The lower one with the bond in it or the higher \$6,000.00 more one without the bond in it.

That's why you should only be allowed one envelope with one bid and one bond. Like the public notice reads: All bids must be accompanied by a bid bond of 10 percent. The envelope with bid and bond in it should be Midstates legal bid which is \$62,000.00. I think Midstates second bid without a bond should be thrown out for these reasons and my bid for \$67,500.00 should stand good.

The County Clerk explained that he is comfortable with the bid process. He said if there is an impropriety of have two envelopes in the bid process, that is something the County Attorney will have to rule on. He added that his deputy had offered the return the envelope containing the first bid, but that Mid States said that it had the bid bond in it.

The County Attorney said that it sounded okay with him, but that he should visit with the County Clerk to be briefed on the whole situation because he did not like surprises.

Dan Hartnett appeared before the board concerning the county wanting to open a ditch along County Road Number 37.

It was very well understood by all parties that the road would remain a private road until which time the county would accept at a later time if so desired and that the county had no obligation of ever accepting the road.

Arnie briefed the board on IBP's request to put a water monitoring station near the air quality monitor that they recently placed in the County right-of-way for monitoring the air.

Leon Jessen, Jim Cahill and Lynn Jensen appeared before the board to solicit the board's support to levy an additional \$90,000 to purchase part of Taylor Martin's property that they recently purchased from Atokad.

Mr. Cahill explained that there are approximately 130 families involved with 4H. He also informed the board about some of the particulars concerning the proposed purchase. He noted that if the Ag Society would purchase tract C1, the Ag. Society would have to give Taylor Martin a 99 year easement on the road that extends east and west through the property.

The Horsemen are planning to fence in the property that they have discussed buying from Taylor Martin if they purchase it.

Leon Jessen said that the Ag Society would like to purchase A,B and C2 from Taylor Martin for \$220,000. Payment would be from \$17,000 to \$23,000 depending the length of the note and interest.

Skip Meisner, SIMPCO, appeared before the board and touched on the subject of Storm Water that the Federal Government is forcing on counties and cities. He did not know a lot about the requirements, but suggested that they meet once a month with the board concerning same.

Jan Brown, County Health Nurse, appeared before the board and expressed the need for the Nurses in the Health Department to be insured in addition to the county's insurance. She learned that they were not covered under the county's insurance for the Home Health Care that they provide.

The board was concerned that the county should be named also and Ms. Brown was asked to research whether that could be done.

Skip Meisner, Jane Gilbert and Diane Lutt appeared before the board concerning the CDBG Grant for the proposed day care center. They said another Government Agency or a non-profit organization could own the building and the county could transfer the grant.

Robert Giese, County Treasurer, appeared before the board with the Sheriff's Distress Warrant Report of unpaid Distress Warrants. He provided the board with the following:

Chairperson Marjorie Meinen called their regularly scheduled meeting to order at 10:00 a.m. with the Pledge of Allegiance.

PRESENT: Commissioners Fred Denker, William Engel, Marjorie Meinen, Jack Bobier, Jackie Hartnett.

Commissioner Meinen asked about the Road Department's cell phone, she wanted to know how many they had, since the bill was \$48.74. She was told that they have 1, but are using it more for calls to Sioux City, because it is cheaper than calling long distance. She thought the county's plan was \$21.99/month, Commissioner Denker said that cost varied by plan. She wanted to know if anyone knew if we combined all phones onto one plan if it would be cheaper, Mr. Denker said he'd look into it.

Commissioner Meinen asked if we check tire prices, since there was a claim for \$2000.00 for tires. Commissioner Bobier said that they are specialized tires, and will cost more, he also said he thinks that Arnie does a good job at checking prices.

Commissioner Hartnett asked what the claim for Maximus was for. Nanci Walsh explained that they figure out what we are to get back from the state (reversible funds) for child support, etc. Currently they take half of what we get. Th board thought that was high. Nanci will check on the contract.

Commissioner Hartnett asked about the fire alarm inspector and whether or not he checked the hand held units (as brought up in a safety meeting). Nanci said that she was not sure.

Discussion was had about the cleaning of the Courthouse. Many do not feel an appropriate job is being done. Jail is only being cleaned every other Sunday, instead of every Sunday. Bathrooms and water fountains aren't cleaned very well. Someone has mentioned having them vacuum under the desks, not just the walkways. It was suggested that the head cleaning lady meet with Rick once a week and walk through the building at least until cleaning improves.

Commissioner Denker asked why we are being charged sales tax from Tool Depot. Nanci explained that some Iowa businesses do not honor our tax exemption. Mr. Denker thinks if they can't comply with tax exemption we should not do business with them any more.

Nanci mentioned that there was a TORT Claim filed- wrongful arrest- She will put it on next week's agenda for tabling pending further investigation.

Commissioner Bobier brought up the dredge on Crystal Lake. It is taking on water and listing. There is approximately 300 gallons of diesel fuel on the dredge, There is concern that if it sinks, and the fuel spills, there will much clean up and money involved. Warren Johnston was called in to discuss removing the dredge from the lake, or other possible options. They are going to call Arnie to drain the fuel and use as they can. This will at least remove the danger of spillage.

Commissioner Meinen said that she talked with the director of the Boys and Girls Home since they are taking over the Family Center. They talked about whether or not they are planning to continue the philosophy of the center, etc. Mrs. Meinen said she informed him that whatever he charges for rent on the one part of the building has to be approved through the board. He said he hoped to have everything in place by January 1. Commissioner Hartnett suggested that they go ahead and raise the rent next door as planned, and not wait to see what happens with the Boys and Girls Home, everyone agreed.

OVERVIEW NIRMA LOSS CONTROL PROGRAM

1. NIRMA provides safety and health training for all levels of employees in order to assist county government in reducing pain and suffering to the employee and their family, reducing expenditures in worker compensation premiums, reducing loss production and equipment down-time and assisting in achieving the goal of Ne. Rev. St. 48-446 (LB757) Workplace Safety Consultation Program.

The NIRMA Loss Control training available include, but is not limited to, Back Injury Prevention, Chain Saw Safety and Carpal Tunnel Syndrome Prevention, Construction Safety, Defensive Driving, DOT Drug and Alcohol Testing, Fire Protection, Guards, Machines and Others, HazCom, Job Safety Analysis, Right-To-Know, Office Safety, Personal Protective Equipment and its Usage, Violence in the Workplace, including Sexual Harassment and many other training programs.

Training is dictated by trends established through individual county incidents, pool incidents and individual county requests. Training, if scheduled, is arranged through the County Safety Committee, individual officials or the board.

Annually, if requested, NIRMA provides specialized courses to law enforcement as may be required by other standards.

- 2. Conducts an annual workplace facilities inspection using nationally recognized safety and health standards (OSHA, MSHA, EPA, NFPA, NEC), with a written report to the Board and Safety Committee of the findings and suggested methods of abatement.
- 3. Conducts road signing audits, including sight-distance studies, annually and as requested.
- 4. Conducts facility security audits, providing a written report to the County Board.
- 5. Conducts accident investigations involving county employees and others if the potential for a claim against the county appears likely or if requested.

- 6. Provides suggested sample personnel and safety and health policies, job safety analysis and other written procedures as requested or when a need appears evident.
- 7. Available for industrial hygiene (air quality, noise) and other such studies.
- 8. Meets with the County Safety Committee and provides assistance as needed.
- 9. Meets at least twice each year with the County Board to update the members on loss control issues.

All of NIRMA loss control services are without direct charge to the county. To arrange for any loss control needs contact Jason Clancy, Loss Control Manager, at 800-642-6671

Chairperson Marjorie Meinen called their regularly scheduled meeting to order at 10:03 a.m. with the Pledge of Allegiance.

PRESENT: Commissioners Fred Denker, William Engel, Marjorie Meinen, and Ted Piepho, secretary.

ABSENT: Commissioners Jack Bobier, Jackie Hartnett, (Both present for the afternoon session).

Engel moved, seconded by Bobier to approve the August 7, 2000 minutes as typed. ROLL CALL VOTE: Engel- YEA, Denker- YEA, Meinen- YEA, Bobier- ABSENT, Hartnett-ABSENT, UNANIMOUS MOTION CARRIED.

The board reviewed the claims submitted by County Clerk, Ted Piepho, for payment.

Ms. Meinen asked if Scott Dugan, Public Defender, had completed setting up the computers that were purchased and whether he had any recent interviews for the Deputy position.

Skip Meisner appeared before the board and discussed the subgrantee change, extension of the CDBG Grant to transfer the grant to the Boys and Girls Home.

Bob Sheehan, Jane Gilbert, Lonnie Points and Skip Meisner were in attendance for the opening of the bids for Schedule I, II and III for the Child Day center. County Clerk, Ted Piepho, opened the bids for for the Child Day Care Center for the Access Road, Sanitary Sewer, and Water Service Improvements, at 11:00 a.m. Bids were received from JJ WestHoff located in Lincoln, Nebraska and Penro Construction Company in Pender, Nebraska.

JJ WestHoff's bid was as follows for each schedule.

Schedule I Paving & Storm Sewer = \$28,873.00 Schedule II Water Main = \$41,075.50 Schedule III Sanitary Sewer = \$56,973.00

TOTAL = \$126,921.50

Penro Construction Company's bid was as follows for each schedule.

Schedule I Paving & Storm Sewer = \$19,311.14

Both companies had furnished a 5% Bid Bond & had filed their bid with the County Clerk prior to the bid deadline.

The chair recessed their meeting at 11:42 a.m.

The board reconvened their afternoon session at 1:30 p.m. with all members of the board present and Ted Piepho, Secretary.

Sheila Breyer Curiel appeared before the board requesting that the county furnish help to provide access to 20 acres, which she stated was land locked. Her father owed the adjoining 302 acres and had deeded these 20 acres to her. In 1984 the 302 acres was sold to Oscar Bill Stone and there was never a problem because Mr. Stone rented the 20 acres from her and farmed them. Recently Mr. Stone sold the land and the new purchaser will not agree to provide her with an easement because she took bids on cash rent and the new purchaser was not the high bidder.

Arnold Mellick, Road Foreman, was present and informed her and the board that yes, the county could help her, but that she would be responsible for all costs, but first she had to show the county that the parties had refused to sell her ground for easement.

Gene Martin and Greg Meyer appeared before the board and explained that he had been approved for a grant to enhance his runway at Martins air field. He said the problem is that if he accepts the grants and completes the work at the air field he could not afford the taxes if the value of the property was increased. He was requesting Board of Commissioners to agree that the valuations would not increase much.

Mr. Gene Martin from Martins Airport introduced himself and Greg Meyer from Buell, Winter, Mousel & Associates and continued as follows: "Greg is the Runway Expansion Project Engineer. I hope you are familiar with the project.

About 6 years ago Senator Hartnett from Omaha submitted a bill to the State of Nebraska which would allow certain private (public use) airports to share in using gas tax funds for runway and airport improvements. Other states have also been doing the same thing.

Two years ago I was approached by the Nebraska Department of Aeronautics about applying for a grant for our airport. This airport is one of the very few that the State is looking at to help with improvements. A study was done with lots of surveying, etc. Greg has done all the architectural mapping that the Nebraska Department of Aeronautics asked for.

Last October we met with the Aeronautics Board of Directors and Martin Field was approved for a grant of \$277,000 to improve the runway to State specifications. Martin Field would be responsible for 10% or \$27,000. Construction was tentatively scheduled for September or October of this year.

The original restrictions were that I would have to guarantee the runway remain open to the public for 10 years. This was later changed to 20 years. The Nebraska Department of Aeronautics had agreed to take over the runway if for some reason I was unable to fulfill my part of the agreement in the time period.

In June the Department advised me that they wanted more security and they will attach the entire airport property, which is 135.4 acres. I in turn advised that I could not and would not do this. The project has been put on hold and will possibly be rejected.

I was advised by the Nebraska Department of Aeronautics that there will be a board meeting for further negotiations on August 23rd. If we don't reach an agreement at this time the project will most likely be dropped.

The runway in question would be a great addition for this county. Anyone with business sense will know how necessary a good runway is. A runway is like a highway or Dakota Avenue or a public restroom. It is just a necessary thing that the public needs very much. I very much want to have this project move forward, but I need your help. I have recently learned that some of the airport land is valued at \$3500 per acre and another part at \$2500 per acre. I have failed to protest these assessments because I didn't pay close attention to them. I have learned a hard lesson.

If we continue with the runway project I fear what the assessment will be. I will not enter into a situation that I know for certain I cannot afford to do tax wise.

Before Greg and I go to Lincoln on Wednesday, I need to know if you as County Commissioners will work with me in negotiating taxes that will be right and affordable."

There was discussion concerning whether the value could be adjusted. County Clerk spoke and said that it has to be valued at fair market value and called Dick Erickson, State's Appraiser for Dakota County, who came to the meeting. Dick said that normally when someone enhances the property that the value does not necessarily go up the cost of the project. He said that it varies, but the rule of the thumb that value will go up approximately 20% of the cost of the project. He also said that he could not find any sales of private airports and that whatever value that he put on the board could adjust.

The board discussed possibly that some of that could be valued as ag land. The board told Mr. Martin that they would do what they could for him.

Jim Wagner, County Sheriff, appeared before the board for the opening of bids on the sheriff's cars.

Team Ford was the only bidder and their bid was \$21,134 for each of two 2001 vehicles.

There was discussion what the state bid was for patrol cars.

The board and Sheriff Wagner discussed the Sheriff's budget and the Jail budget. Commissioner Hartnett moved, seconded by Commissioner Bobier to convene into closed executive session to discuss personnel/wages.

COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS AUGUST 28, 2000 PROCEEDINGS COUNTY BOARD MEETING ROOM DAKOTA COUNTY COURTHOUSE

Chairperson Marjorie Meinen reconvened the meeting from August 21, 2000, at 10:00 a.m.

PRESENT: Commissioners Jack Bobier, Jackie Hartnett, William Engel, Fred Denker, Marjorie Meinen, Nanci Walsh, Assistant to the Board and Joan Spencer, Deputy County Clerk acting as secretary. Among those in attendance from the Dakota County Ag Society and Dakota and Thurston County Fair Boards were Lynn Jensen, Leon Jessen, Jim Cahill, Dan Hartnett, Darrel Olsen, Ronald Ericksen, Dennis Zvacek, Art and Pharyce Eslick, Judy Renkel, Mary Anna Jensen, Mary Paeper, Leo Kramper and Dave Mellick. Also in attendance was Bart Gotsch and employees of the County Extension office.

Commissioner Meinen opened the meeting to discussion on the tax levy allocation request received from the Dakota County Agricultural Society for budget year 2000-01. The tax request for the General Fund was \$59,611.51, Capital Improvement - \$70,000.00, for a total of \$129,611.51.

Jim Cahill thanked the Board for their time and said the increase was needed and asked if there were any questions on the Budget, Financial Statement and letter that was handed out.

Commissioner Denker asked if they had a profit and loss statement for the 2000 Fair? Jim Cahill said no, the books were not closed yet.

Leon Jessen said the purchase of land from Taylor-Martin is not a done deal as no purchase agreement has been signed and hearings can be held. It all depends on whether or not they get their levy request.

Commissioner Hartnett read excerpts from the letter received from Jim Cahill, Leon Jessen and Lynn Jensen highlighting that the levy request is to purchase land, a public hearing will need to be held to amend the budget and that all members of the Fair Board are elected.

Lynn Jensen pointed out that the law has been clarified and you can now buy ground with tax money.

Commissioner Meinen stated that the Board of Commissioners has to pass a Resolution today and that a Public Hearing on the Budget is required. She noted that the total tax asking increase for the county was \$75,684 and allocating \$52,000 or 69% to the Fair Board she felt was too much for one entity.

Dan Hartnett stated that renting was not an option from Taylor-Martin and the Ag Society purchase was a marketable investment. This additional budget request is to enable the county to acquire land to hold a fair.

Commissioner Bobier asked what the rent paid was. Jim Cahill replied the rent was \$7000 per year, \$3500 from both Dakota and Thurston Counties.

The purchase from Taylor-Martin for \$150,000 would be at 11% interest, but a Lease-Purchase through the county was discussed at 5% interest for an annual payment of \$19,425 per year. Thurston County would still pay \$3500 per year and it was noted that all their money, around \$14,000, goes to Dakota County along with a lot of personnel support.

Leon Jessen stated that the total purchase price is \$220,000 from Taylor-Martin and it has to be bought before any grants can be applied for and a 10 or 15 year lease-purchase should be looked at.

Commissioner Meinen asked if there were any other comments.

Mary Anna Jensen thought revenue was lost due to everyone not knowing where the fair was going to be. She thought a lot of people would come back if we had permanent fair grounds.

Leo Kramper stated he thought the purchase was a good investment and the location would bring in a good crowd from South Sioux City and Sioux City.

Lynn Jensen brought out that Taylor-Martin bought the land for \$15,000 an acre and selling it at a reduced price of \$9,000 an acre to the Fair Board.

Commissioner Meinen verified that the Fair Board had \$100,000 in their capitol improvement fund and that they would use the \$70,000 request for the down payment and still have \$30,000 for working capitol.

Bart Gotch stated he thought an investment longer than 10 years would make the cash flow easier on the county budget.

Commissioner Denker thought they might be able to generate some revenue by renting some of the barns.

Commissioner Engel thought the fair was good for the kids and the Board of Commissioners should help them out.

Commissioner Denker said he has heard some opposition in the county about the location, from people not wanting their taxes to go up and complaining the attendance at the fair has really been down.

Darrel Olson thought attendance would come back with money going into the buildings for improvements and landscaping done on the grounds once the ground is bought.

Commissioner Meinen stated she could not support the increase because it represents such a big percent of the overall county increase. She thought it could be fixed up slower and grants and donations used.

Commissioner Hartnett said we should be addressing the levy and suggested reducing the request by \$30,000 for capital construction for a total of \$100,000.

Leon Jessen stated that \$40,000 would preserve the fair-- \$20,000 for a NACO lease purchase payment and \$20,000 for improvements.

Commissioner Hartnett moved, seconded by Commissioner Denker, to go with the proposal of \$59,611.51 for the general fund and \$40,000 for capital construction totaling \$99,611.51 and a levy of .0133 and look into a NACO lease/purchase backed by the county. Jim Cahill, Lynn Jensen and Leon Jessen from the Dakota County Agricultural Society, Inc. appeared before the board and presented information relative to their operating budget. They felt that they had the support at their public hearing to support the purchase of Atokad and they projected that they would need \$137,500.00. The Ag. Society asked the board to borrow \$190,000 instead of the \$150,000 originally talked about. They said the payment would stay about \$20,000 but they would have to pay 15 years instead of 10 years.

No action was taken, but a couple of commissioners expressed that they would not be in favor of borrowing more than \$150,000 for 10 years.

George Hirschbach appeared before the board concerning Tax Sale Certificates. He informed the board of the work that had been in reducing the number of certificates in the petition.

Mr. Hirschbach strongly urged that these be kept up on an annual basis and that mobile homes be hanled by the distress warrant process.

Bob Finney, County Attorney, was in attendance during Mr. Hirschbach's presentation, and the Mr. Finney addressed the Whispering Meadowview Subdivision. He said that he had received a letter from Mr. Novelli and it fits the needs of what the county needs to protect the county from accepting the road that runs through the subdivision. He said that both had signed off saying that there is no dedication of the road and asking that it be removed from the plat plan. The letter should be attached as an addendum to the plat.

Mr. Finney, County Attorney, also reminded the board that Barnett's Mobile Home Appeal Hearing before the Tax Equalization and Review Commission is Friday (2nd). The value is limited for one year and they did not protest this year. He mentioned that the board could confess judgment. Its' a matter of dollars or principal. It comes down to a couple hundred dollars in taxes to go to Wayne and spend the day at the hearing. Its' your call. There are plenty of things that we could all be doing otherwise. Thats' my thought is to confess judgment on this one. Who is to say the taxpayer will even show up and we are going to have to go down there and sit around and Mr. Finney said there were plenty of other things he could doing and the same with his deputies.

Commissioner Hartnett mentioned that if someone went to Wayne, it might save two hundred dollars. Mr. Finney said that someone could go down and have a Confess of Judgment in hand and if the taxpayer shows up that the confess could be entered and if the tax payer did not show up, the county would probably be successful by the tax payer not showing.

The board reviewed the valuation protest of Dakota Pointe Limited Partnership Protest.

Mr. Erickson explained that he had made a mistake during the normal Board of Equalization and this is the parcel that he mistakenly recommended adjustment to \$4,252,750, to equalize with the other parcel neglected to see that there was only one complex on this parcel whereas there were two complexes on the other parcel. After catching the error, he approached the board and they reduced it back to the original \$2,126,375. Mr. Erickson said this is a protest on that amount

- VII. There may by errors in this report. I have been planning on making a full report to you after I had completed my research. However, with the article in the newspaper (Sioux City Journal September 2, 2000) my hand has been forced to come to you sooner than expected. I wanted to verify the Disabilities Act information with documentation for you. With a few exceptions, all 11 cemeteries will have to be surveyed. I also wanted to research the fact that it was my understanding that the people who own the land around these "abandoned cemeteries" were getting a tax break. In exchange for that tax break they were to maintain the cemetery (i.e. mowing, reporting vandals, etc). This was supposedly a practice that was done in the 40's and 50's. I do not know if this is happening today.
- VIII. I am currently updating my work on the Dakota County Inscriptions that was done nearly 20 years ago. Instead of being just 1 volume it looks as though 5 volumes wilt be needed to publish the entire body of work. Vol. 1 is ready for the publisher. Vol.2, which is the Catholic Cemeteries of the County is nearly ready for the publisher. Vol.3 will be Dakota City's City Cemetery. Vol.4 will

be Omaha Valley, Green Valley, and Taylor Cemeteries. Vol.5 will be the update volume as the years go by.

DAKOTA COUNTY COURTHOUSE

Chair Meinen called their regular scheduled meeting to order at 1:42 p.m. Present were: Commissioner Bobier, Commissioner Hartnett, Commissioner Engel, Commissioner Meinen and Commissioner Denker.

Louis Storm, a farmer outside Homer, appeared before the board and was concerned about the 15 ton weight maximum on the three bridges outside Homer. Two of the bridges are on Omaha Avenue between Fiddler Creek Road and Wigle Creek Road and the other on 265th Street extending from Omaha Avenue to Highway 77. Mr. Storm said that his grain trucks weigh more than 40 ton and asked what could be done about it. Mr. Mellick, Road Foreman, told the board and Mr. Storm that these were sound bridges and that they should be rated more than what they are. Mr. Mellick said that they take the County's semi over them and that weighs approximately the same as Mr. Storm's Grain trucks.

Liability was discussed if the bridge would collapse and it was thought that it would be the person driving over the bridge if the tonnage was not observed.

The board discussed the rent paid to the county by the Health and Human Services Department for the use of the area in the courthouse, which was previously used by the County Health Department. The rent collected now is \$6.70 a square foot and the state Health and Human Services made an offer of \$8.20 per square foot. STATE OF NEBRASKA LEASE

This lease, executed in duplicate, by and between Dakota County Board, hereinafter called the Lessor, and the Department of Administrative Services, State Building Division, an agency of the State of Nebraska, hereinafter called the Lessee, acting on behalf of the Tenant Agency, Department of Social Services. WITNESSETH

1. PREMISES, the Lessor hereby leases to the Lessee, the below described premises (herein "Demised Premises"). The Lessor warrants and represents that it is the owner of those certain premises, with appurtenances, described as follows:

- 2. TERM, the term of this lease shall commence on June 1, 1994. This lease shall in no case become effective until all required signatures have been obtained. If any of the terms or conditions of this lease are to be changed throughout the duration, prior approval of the Lessee must be obtained.
- 3. RENTAL, yearly rental is based on \$8.20 per square foot for 569 usable square feet office space. Lessee shall pay Lessor equal monthly installments of \$466.58 payable in advance on the first day of each month commencing with the commencement of the term of this lease. Rent payable hereunder for any period of time less than one month shall be determined by prorating the monthly rental herein specified based on the actual number of days in the month. Rental shall be paid to the Lessor at the address specified in paragraph 5 or to such other address as the Lessor may designate by a notice in writing.
- 4. TERMINATION, if no appropriated funds are available to the Lessee for the purpose of paying rentals on the premises, this lease shall terminate at the election in writing of either party hereto. If any Governor's budget message is such that it does not include funds to pay rentals hereunder, notice of such fact shall be given promptly to Lessor, and if at any time it appears that

appropriations will be depleted in the future, or not available for rentals hereunder, notice of such fact and the estimated date of depletion shall be given promptly to Lessor. If only a portion of the funds necessary to pay the rentals hereunder are appropriated, the lease may be kept in force with a prorata share of the space and corresponding rental decreased. Any such reduction shall be agreed upon by both parties.

Lessor and Lessee shall have the right of cancellation of this lease upon giving a 90-day notice of such cancellation in writing.

- 5. NOTICES, all notices herein provided to be given, or which may be given, by either party to the other, shall be deemed to have been fully given when made in writing and deposited in the United States mail, certified and postage prepaid, and addressed as follows: To the Lessor at: County Clerk's Office Courthouse Square 1601 Broadway P.O. - 6. ASSIGNMENT AND SUBLETTING, the Lessee shall not assign this lease without the written consent of the Lessor, but shall in any event have the right to sublet the leased premises to another governmental subdivision. Any occupant, assignee, or sublessee must agree to abide by all of the terms and provisions of this lease.
- 7. INSPECTION, Lessee agrees to permit the Lessor and/or its authorized representative to enter the Demised Premises at all reasonable times during usual business hours for the purpose of inspecting the same, or for the making of any necessary repairs for which the Lessor is responsible or feels necessary for the safety and preservation of the Demised Premises.
- 8. FIXTURES AND PERSONAL PROPERTY, any trade fixtures, equipment or personal property installed in or attached to the Demised Premises by or at the expense of Lessee, shall be and remain the property of the Lessee and Lessor agrees that Lessee shall have the right to remove any and all of its trade fixtures. Equipment and other personal property which it may have stored or installed by or at the expense of Lessor shall be and remain the property of the Lessor. Lessee agrees that it will, at its expense, repair any damage occasioned to the Demised Premises by reason of the removal of its trade fixtures, equipment and other personal property.
- 9. ALTERATIONS, Lessee acknowledges that the Demised Premises are leased in "as is" condition. Lessee will not permit any alterations of or additions to any part of the Demised Premises, except by written consent of Lessor, which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld, and all alterations and additions to the Demised Premises shall remain for the benefit of Lessor unless otherwise provided in said consent. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Lessee may, without consent of Lessor, make additions to or alterations, repair or redecorating the Demised Premises of a non-structural nature, provided that upon completion of such alterations and additions the fair market value of the Demised Premises and rental value thereof will not be less than the fair market value and rental value of the Demised Premises immediately prior to such alterations and additions. Lessee hereby indemnifies Lessor against liens, costs, damages and expenses with respect to any such additions or alterations.
- 10. RETURN OF PREMISES, at the conclusion of this lease or any extension thereof, Lessee shall return the property to the Lessor in the same condition as it was received at commencement of this lease, normal wear and tear excepted. If at the conclusion of this lease or any extension thereof, the Lessor is of the opinion that Lessee is not leaving the premises in the same condition as it was received, normal wear and tear excepted, then such costs of restoration will be determined by a panel of three (3) persons consisting of Lessee, Lessor and one (1) person selected by mutual consent of both parties.

 11. DESTRUCTION OF PREMISES, should said premises be made unfit for occupancy due to fire or other unavoidable casualty, said tenancy shall immediately terminate and Lessee shall

pay rent only to the time at such termination. The portion of any advance lease payment which is attributed to the period of time after the lease has been terminated in the above manner shall be refunded by Lessor to Lessee. If the damage is not of a permanent nature, Lessor shall be responsible for repairing the same in a timely manner at Lessor's own expense and the rental payments shall be suspended until said premises have been put in proper condition for occupancy.

- 12. REPAIR AND MAINTENANCE, during the lease term, the Lessor shall maintain the general landscaping, sidewalks and parking areas; the roof, exterior walls, exterior doors, exterior windows and the corridors of the building; and the building equipment in good repair and tenantable condition. Lessor's obligations include, but are not limited to, the maintenance and repair of the plumbing, heating, electrical, air-conditioning and ventilating equipment and fixtures to the end that all such facilities are kept in good operative condition except in case of damage arising from a willful or negligent act of the Lessee's agent, invitee, or employee. Lessor's obligations shall also include, but are not limited to furnishing and replacing electrical light bulbs, fluorescent tubes, ballasts and starters, and air-conditioning and ventilating equipment filters.
- 13. SERVICES AND UTILITIES, the Lessor shall furnish to the Lessee, during the lease term, at Lessor's sole cost, the following services, utilities and supplies:

Utilities (specify): To be provided by Lessor.

Janitor Service and Supplies: To be provided by Lessor. (A schedule of janitorial services may be attached and made a part of this lease.)

Parking (# of stalls): Adequate parking available.

Other:

The Lessee agrees to pay for telephone and/or computer services supplied to the Demised Premises. If applicable, the Lessor or responsible party of the building structure shall provide communication cabling facilities to each desk and/or work station within the office area. Each desk and/or work station shall have a telephone and computer Jack provided. Each telephone and computer jack shall be terminated on separate cables, which shall be terminated to separate connecting blocks at a common central location. Each telephone cable shall be a four-pair, 24 gauge, category 3, unshielded twisted pair cable. Each computer cable shall be a four-pair, 24 gauge, category 5, unshielded twisted pair cable. Installation methods and procedures shall meet the standards set by the Division of Communications.

- 14. HOLDING OVER, in the event the Lessee remains in possession of the premises after the expiration of the Lease term, or any extension thereof, this lease shall be automatically extended on a month-to-month basis, subject to thirty (30) days termination by either party, and otherwise on the terms and conditions herein specified, so far as applicable, excepting only that rental payable during any holdover period shall be an amount mutually agreed by Lessee and Lessor.
- 15. GENERAL PROVISIONS: EMINENT DOMAIN, if the whole of the building or the premises or a substantial part of the premises shall be taken or condemned by any competent authority for any public use or purpose, the terms of this lease shall end upon and not before the date when possession of the part so taken shall be required for such use or purchase, and without apportionment of the award, and current rent shall be apportioned to the date of termination.
- 16. COMPLIANCE WITH LAW, Lessor shall, at its expense, comply with all applicable statutes, charters, laws, ordinances, building and maintenance codes,

rules, regulations, requirements and orders of duly constituted public authorities now or hereafter in any manner affecting the Demised Premises, or the use thereof, or the sidewalks, alleys, streets, and ways adjacent thereto, whether or not any such statutes, charters, laws, ordinances, rules, regulations, requirements, or orders which may be hereinafter enacted involved a change of policy on the part of the governmental body enacting the same. Tenant shall comply with all building and use or occupancy restrictions, conditions and covenants of record; Tenant shall comply with the requirements of all policies of public liability, fire and other insurance at any time in force with respect to the Demised Premises. This space shall meet all current code requirements, including but not limited to, fire/life safety codes and the Americans with Disabilities Act Accessibility Guidelines.

- 17. DEFAULT, in the event Lessee fails to pay any rental due hereinunder or fails to keep and perform any or the other terms or conditions hereof, time being of the essence, then ten (10) days after written notice of default from Lessor, the Lessor may, if such default has not been corrected, resort to any and all legal remedies or combination of remedies which Lessor may desire to assert, including but not limited to one or more of the following: (1) Declare the lease at an end and terminated; (2) sue for the rent due and to become due under the lease or for any damages sustained by Lessor and (3) continue the lease in effect and relet the premises on such terms and conditions as Lessor may deem advisable with Lessee remaining liable for the monthly rent plus the reasonable cost of obtaining possession of the premises and of any repairs and alterations necessary to prepare the premises for reletting, less the rentals received from such reletting, if any. No action by Lessor shall be construed as an election to terminate the lease unless written notice of such intention be given to Lessee. In case Lessor, after written notice from the Lessee indicating the Lessor has failed to comply with any requirements of this lease in regard to a specified condition, shall fail, refuse or neglect to comply therewith, within thirty (30) days or in the event of an emergency constituting a hazard to the health or safety at the Lessee's employees, property, or invitees, the Lessee may perform such maintenance or make such repair at its own cost and, in addition to any other remedy the Lessee may have, may deduct the amount thereof from the rent that may then be or thereafter become due hereunder.
- 18. CERTIFICATE OF INSURANCE/NOTICE or SELF-INSURANCE, the State of Nebraska, under the provisions of Reissue Revised Statutes, 1943, Section 81-8,239-01, self-insures all such exposures and is financially capable of retaining these losses should they occur. If there is a liability loss under the provisions of any agreement signed by an agency of the State of Nebraska, a claim may be filed with the State Claims Board and, if approved, will be paid from the State Tort Claims Fund. The State retains all rights and immunities under the State Tort Claims Act, R.R.S. 1943, Section 81-8,209 et al and any other provisions of law. Workers' compensation is statutorily required in Nebraska and the State is fully self-insured. Occupational diseases are fully covered by law.
- 19. INDEMNIFICATION, the State of Nebraska (Lessee) shall not be responsible for any liabilities resulting from negligent acts or omissions of the Lessor and; that the Lessor will hold the State (Lessee) harmless from any damages or injuries caused by the Lessor, its agents or employees.

INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT PROVIDING FOR PROBATION OFFICER, SERVICE COORDINATOR AND ELECTRONIC MONITORING SERVICES IN DAKOTA COUNTY, NEBRASKA

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into this 2nd day of October, 2000, by and between the County of Dakota ("County") and the State of Nebraska Probation Administration ("Department") (collectively referred to as the "parties") for the provision of probation officer, service coordinator and electronic monitoring services for pre and post adjudicated juveniles in Dakota County, Nebraska.

WHEREAS, the Interlocal Cooperation Act, Neb. Rev. Stat. \$13-801, et. seq., provides that units of local government of the State of Nebraska and Nebraska state agencies may enter into agreement for the joint and cooperative exercise of powers, privileges, or authority capable of being exercised by either agency; and

WHEREAS, Neb. Rev. Stat. §13-807 provides that any one or more public agencies may contract with any one or more public agencies to perform any governmental service, activity, or other undertaking which each public agency entering into the contract is authorized by law to perform; and

WHEREAS, the County and the Department are public entities as defined by Neb. Rev. Stat. \$13-803; and

WHEREAS, the County is authorized by state law to, and does, detain juveniles who are in need of temporary detention, both pre and post adjudication; and

WHEREAS, the County is authorized by state law to, and desires to, place with court approval certain juveniles on home arrest or detention with electronic monitoring; and

WHEREAS, the Department is authorized by state law to, and is capable of, providing electronic monitoring equipment and services for juveniles who are placed on home arrest or detention; and

WHEREAS, the Department is willing to provide juvenile probation intake services within the County and to allow its employee providing such services to

further coordinate juvenile services within Dakota County for any youth deemed appropriate for such services, in consideration of certain amounts to be paid and established pursuant to the terms of this Agreement for such services;

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties mutually covenant and agree as follows:

1. The Department will provide one (1) juvenile intake probation officer to the County, said officer's duties to primarily include, but not be limited to: (a) the intake processing of youth found within the County and brought to the probation office's attention pursuant to state law; (b) the coordination of services deemed appropriate to address the needs of such juveniles; and (c) the coordination of electronic monitoring services deemed appropriate.

- 2. The Department will provide electronic monitoring equipment to monitor up to thirteen juveniles.
- 3. For the supervision services outlined above, the County will pay the Department a sum total of \$21,548.24 in quarterly installments of \$5,387.06 beginning on October 1st, 2000, for a period of nine (9) months.
- 4. The Department will furnish one (1) cellular phone; one (1) pager; and one (1) set of handcuffs to the County. The costs of the cellular phone, pager and handcuffs will be a one time cost to the County, however, monthly cellular phone and pager service charges as well as mileage costs, at the rate of thirty-one (.031) cents per mile, will be calculated monthly by the Department, to be paid by the County. Payment is due from the County to the Department on a quarterly basis, beginning on October 1st, 2000, for a period of nine (9) months, as billed by the Department.
- 5. For host computer monitoring, equipment, training, maintenance and necessary supplies, the County will pay the Department for the actual daily cost of usage and maintenance of electronic monitoring services, set at two dollars and seventy five cents (\$2.75) per day per unit, payment due from the County to the Department on a quarterly basis, beginning on October 1st, 2000, for a period of nine (9) months, as billed by the Department.
- 6. The County agrees to reimburse the Department for the actual cost of replacement of any field monitoring device (FMD) or TRANSMITTER that is lost or stolen by a juvenile. In the event a FMD or TRANSMITTER is lost or stolen, the Department shall attempt to recover the equipment. If the equipment is not successfully recovered within sixty (60) days, the Department will bill the County for the cost of replacement of each FMD or TRANSMITTER lost or stolen. Under the provisions of this paragraph, the County will be responsible for each FMD lost or stolen in the amount of \$1,270.00 and for each Transmitter lost or stolen in the amount of \$525.00.
- 7. It is the expressed intent of the parties that this Agreement shall not create an employer/employee relationship between the County and the probation officer. In the performance of this Agreement, the probation officer will act in his/her capacity as an employee of the Department and shall be directed and supervised by the Department. In the performance of service coordination and electronic monitoring duties, the probation officer shall be directed and supervised jointly by the Department and the County or its designee. The Department shall not receive any compensation of any sort for services rendered except as specifically set forth in this Agreement. The Department understands that it is responsible for providing its employee, agent, or any other person acting on behalf of the Department with any and all training, benefits,

unemployment insurance, and workers' compensation insurance required by local, state or federal law.

- 8. This Agreement may be modified by mutual agreement of the parties hereto and may be renegotiated annually by the parties.
- 9. This Agreement may be terminated at any time by either party upon thirty (30) days written notice mailed or delivered to the other party.
- 10. This Agreement shall become effective immediately upon execution by the parties and shall remain in full force and effect until such time as it is amended or terminated pursuant to the provisions herein.

total payment of \$20,000 with the Ag Society putting \$5,000 a year into a sinking fund. The tenth payment would be a balloon payment paying off the full lease. The \$5,000 put in the sinking fund per year along with the interest earned and the last \$20,000 payment would pay off the balance.

The Ag Society agreed that a second mortgage would not be taken and the wording be included in the agreement drafted by the attorneys and assurances would be in place that the sinking fund would be secure from expenditures other than what it was intended.

The Ag Society will proceed with the purchase of the subject property as shown on the attached Exhibit "A' and financing for that purchase will be provided in substantial part through Dakota County and to Ag Society entering into a lease-purchase agreement with NACO Leasing Corporation. Agreements and resolutions regarding that lease-purchase agreement will be separately entered into between the Ag Society and Dakota County. 2.

RESTRICTIONS. In consideration of Dakota County entering into the leasepurchase agreement, the Ag Society agrees to the following two conditions/restriction on its purchase of the real estate:

That the Ag Society will not pledge any portion of the property described Α. on Exhibit "A" for any additional debts to be incurred by the Ag Society in the future. Further, the Ag Society will in no way pledge or otherwise encumber the subject property for any such other debts. This restriction shall last so long as Dakota County remains obligated under the lease-purchase agreement with NACO Leasing Corporation. When the county's obligation to NACO Leasing Corporation has been satisfied, then this restriction shall automatically lapse. If the Ag Society is unable to make the annual payment to the sinking fund, it shall notify the Board of Commissioners of Dakota County, in writing, within thirty (30) days of the Ag Society's failure to make such payment.

Article 9, Section 2 also provides that employees who take five (5) or more days of vacation per vacation year may carry over five (5) days of earned, unused vacation from one vacation year to the next. Employees who do not take five (5) or more days of vacation per vacation year may not carry over any earned, unused vacation from one vacation year to the next.
- 2. Employee Allen Burns, Jr. was entitled to take five (5) or more days of vacation during the vacation year which ended on October 7, 2000. Employee Burns

took only three (3) days of vacation during the vacation year which ended on October 7, 2000. Therefore, Employee Burns was not eligible to carry over any earned, unused vacation from one vacation year to the next.

- 3. Employee David Burrell was entitled to take five (5) or more days of vacation during the vacation year which ended on August 20, 2000. Employee Burrell took no days of vacation during the vacation year which ended on October 7, 2000. Therefore, Employee Burrell was not eligible to carry over any earned, unused vacation from one vacation year to the next.
- 4. Subject to the conditions set out below, the Board agrees to waive the requirement found in Article 9, Section 2 that employees who are entitled to do so must take at least five (5) days of vacation each vacation year in order to be eligible to carry over any earned, unused vacation from one vacation year to the next. As a result of this waiver, Employee Allen Burns, Jr. will be permitted to carry over five (5) days of earned, unused vacation from the vacation year which ended on October 7, 2000, to the vacation year which ends on October 7, 2001, and Employee David Burrell will be permitted to carry over five (5) days of earned, unused vacation from the vacation year which ended on August 20, 2000, to the vacation year which ends on August 20, 2001. All other provisions of Article 9 will apply to the use of and payment for vacation for Employees Allen Burns Jr. and David Burrell.
- 5. This Agreement is being entered into on a one-time basis only and applies only to Allen Burns, Jr. and David Burrell.
- 6. This Agreement does not establish any precedent with regard to the interpretation or application of Article 9.

After the protest they adjusted my valuation for 2000 by \$49,356.00. This amounts to approximately \$750.00 tax over charge for 1997, 1998, 1999. I would appreciate some attention into this so I could receive a refund check as soon as possible. Thank You.

In response to your question as to how much difference in assessed value was made in the valuation of Murray White's home, Parcel # 220142459, by the reduction in total sqft please consider the following:

According to records on file the home was incorrectly listed as 3372 sqft for the years 1997, 1998 and 1999. The value was then calculated at \$63.54 per sqft or rounded of to \$214,250.00.

During informal protests in March of 2000 it was determined the sqft of the home should be 2574 sqft. This results in an error in the listing of 798 sqft. The difference would be the amount of \$50,704.92 or rounded to \$50,705.00. in valuation for those years.

The other thing you may want to consider is the fact that as floor area increases cost per sqft decreases. In examining the Marshall and Swift Residential Cost Handbook there is a difference of approximately 4.0 % between 3400 sqft and 2600 sqft. So that, had the square footage been properly calculated the Assessed Value would have been \$66.46 per square foot or approximately \$171,068. Rounded to \$171,070. Doing the math will show a difference of \$43,182. In the assessed value. You would need to apply the appropriate tax rate for those years in question to come up with the difference in taxes.

As to your question of how many years you may refund. I believe 77-1734.01 covers this and I would suggest you visit with the County Attorney as to interpretation.

He suggested that since the Public Defender just hired a deputy at \$35,000.00 annually, he thought it would be appropriate to raise Deb Fergens salary to \$37,500 as proposed in his 2000/01 budget.

AGREEMENT WITH THE

COUNTY OF DAKOTA COUNTY, NEBRASKA

This Agreement effective the 27th day of November, 2000 is entered into by and between the SIOUXLAND HUMANE SOCIETY, INC. (hereinafter "SHS"), and the COUNTY OF DAKOTA, state of Nebraska (hereinafter "County").

WHEREAS, SHS is a nonprofit corporation which maintains facilities for humane shelter, care and disposal of dogs, cats and other animals; and

WHEREAS, the County has certain responsibilities to enforce its Resolutions and state laws pertaining to stray or unleashed animals; and

WHEREAS, the County wishes to use the services and facilities of SHS, from time to time, to assist the County in the enforcement of said ordinances and state laws and in the humane treatment of animals.

IT IS THEREFORE AGREED as follows:

- 1. Impoundment. Upon delivery of any animal to SHS by any authorized representative of the County, SHS shall provide humane shelter services, including feeding and medical care and, if necessary, isolation, for a period of at least three (3) days. If the animal has not been retrieved by its rightful owner by the end of such period, the animal shall be disposed of as determined by SHS, in its sole discretion.
- 2. Authorized Representative. For purposes of this Agreement, an authorized representative of the County shall mean any sheriff of sheriffs deputy, any police officer, any animal control officer or any person authorized by telephone by County personnel.
- 3. Fees for Services. SHS shall be paid the following fees for its services; a. For each animal brought to the shelter, an incoming fee of \$10.00;
 - b. For housing each animal, \$7.00 per day, for a maximum period of 4 days.
- (In accordance with SHS policy, each animal will be held for a minimum of three
- (3) days for a minimum housing fee of \$18.00.
- 4. Responsibility for Fees.
- a. In the event the rightful owner or the animal retrieves the animal from SHS, all fees shall be collected from the owner prior to release of the animal.

In addition, SHS reserves the right to charge additional fees to such owner. SHS shall make a report to the County of all animals retrieved by their owners.

- b. In the event the rightful owner does not retrieve the animal within 4 days, the County shall be responsible for such fees upon submission of an itemized statement from SHS. Fees are due within ten (10) days of billing.
- 5. Animals Captured or Impounded by County- The County agrees to turn over to SHS for adoption or disposal any animals impounded by the County which are not claimed by the rightful owner within the time period provided by County Resolution.
- 6. Right to Euthanize. Notwithstanding any minimum holding period provided herein, SHS reserves the right to euthanize at any time any animal which SHS determines, in its sole discretion, is suffering needlessly and will not benefit from medical treatment.
- 7. Hold Harmless. The County agrees to hold SHS and its employees, volunteers and directors harmless from any right, demand, claim or cause of action arising from any wrongful receipt, impounding or disposition of any animal which is sheltered, retrieved, euthanized or disposed of under this Agreement, so long as SHS complies with the terms of this Agreement.
- 8. Representations. The County represents that it has been duly authorized to enter into this agreement by the proper body and that the person executing the same on behalf of the County is authorized to do so. SHS represents that it has been duly authorized to enter into this agreement by its board of directors.
- 9. Term of Agreement. This agreement shall remain in force until properly terminated by either party. Termination shall be effected by either party giving written notice to the other at least thirty (30) days prior to the date of termination. For the purpose of giving notice, the addresses of the parties stated below are sufficient until such time as a party notifies the other of a change in address,

Sealed proposals will be accepted until 4:00 p.m., Friday, January 5, 2001 at the Dakota County Commissioner's Office, 1601 Broadway, P.O. Box 338, Dakota City, NE 68731. Please label proposals "AUDIT PROPOSAL" on the outside of the envelope.

The proposal shall include an offer for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2001 plus two (2) one year extensions at the county's option. The proposal shall include fixed price proposed for each of the three years subject to adjustment by mutual agreement due to extenuating circumstances.

Those submitting sealed proposals should indicate on the outside of the envelope in the lower left hand corner that it is a sealed bid for county audit services.

SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS

1. Dakota County reserves the right to reject any and all proposals received.

- 2. Only proposals received at the location described and in the time frame given will be considered.
- 3. Originals should be completed and manually signed by a partner of the firm submitting the proposal.
- 4. The audit must satisfy the requirements of Sections 23-1608 to 23-1610 R.R.S. Neb. 1943, as amended, and be conducted in accordance with the AICPA Guide for Audits of State and Local Governmental Units and the provisions of the Single Audit Act of 1984 and include the financial and compliance requirements of OMB Circular A-128. In addition, they must meet the requirements as outlined in the Minimum Standards for Political Subdivision Audit Reports Required to be filed with the Auditor of Public Accounts.
- 5. The fees quoted in your proposal and included in the contract will be the maximum paid per hour and in total, unless an amendment of the contract is completed by both parties. The fees quoted should include what the additional cost of a single audit will be.
- 6. The Audit Report should conform to governmental accounting and financial reporting standards and the requirements of OMB Circular A-128. Deviations from reporting standards will be allowed where Dakota County does not follow generally accepted accounting principles applicable to government.

Each audit should be an annual financial and compliance audit covering the entire operations of the county and shall include; a report cover, index or table of contents, auditor's report, appropriate financial statements and supporting schedules, informative disclosures, auditor's report on the study and evaluation of the systems of internal control and auditor's report on compliance with laws and regulations. The three auditor's reports may be bound into a single report, or presented at the same time as separate documents. The audit reports should be typed on letter size pages. The audit report should include a management letter, if appropriate, which includes recommendations affecting the financial statement, internal control, accounting systems and legality of actions and any other matter considered appropriate by the County. The report shall contain an examination of current accounting methods and an opinion as to the desirability of using an accrual accounting method along with an estimate of costs to the county to adopt the accrual method.
